Worst air disaster in history

Official blames Pan Am pilot

SANTA CRUZ DE TENERIFE, Spain (UPI) — Provincial governor Antonio Oyarzabal said today that the worst aviation disaster in history occurred Sunday because a Pan American 747 turned into the path of a Dutch KLM 747 roaring down the runway at 186 miles per hour for takeoff.

Oyarzabal said 562 persons were killed in the collision and subsequent explosions so fiery that the asphalt runway melted. He said 72 of the 634 persons aboard the two jumbo jets survived the accident but that some of them were in critical condition.

The U.S. Embassy put the death toll at 599 and the Spanish Aviation ministry put it at 559. Oyarzabal said official figures showed that the KLM plane carried 244 persons, mostly Dutch tourists, and that all died. The Pan Am plane carried 390 persons, mostly American tourists from Los Angeles, and that 318 of them were killed and 72 survived.

The worst previous air disaster was the crash of a Turkish airways DC10 near Paris on March 3, 1974, when 346 persons died.

The Spanish news agency Cifra said the flight recorder tapes of a conversation between the Pan American pilot and the control tower showed that the pilot apparently misunderstood the tower instructions to stay on a taxiway and turned onto the takeoff runway by mistake.

Pan Am spokesman and aviation experts said it was far too early for the contents of the so-called "black box" to be studied since that required sophisticated equipment not available on Tenerife.

U.S. Embassy press spokesman Ed Harper said a 41-member team of the U.S. National Transportation Safety Board has arrived to help Spanish authorities in the investigation.

The governor, speaking at a news conference, said "The key point is whether the KLM crew had been given orders to take off."

The governor said it had been established as fact that the control tower told the KLM plane to go to the head of the runway and the Pan Am plane to taxi to a standby position.

"Both planes took to the runway," he added. "The collision was head on."

Survivors said the KLM plane hit the Pan Am plane on the side just behind the first class section.

Oyarzabal said the cause will eventually be established by the investigation in which the black boxes of the two planes — both found in the charred rubble spread over a 200 yard stretch of the runway — and tape recording of the conversations between the control tower and the pilots will be used.

Oyarzabal said that the crash occurred on the runway. "The KLM plane was on it first, then the Pan Am plane," he said.

The KLM plowed through the Pan

Am 747 and disintegrated in flames as it slid along the runway. The Pan Am jet was also destroyed by the fire.

Oyarzabal said that "95 per cent of the bodies are charred beyond recognition" and that identification is impossible in most cases.

Air minister Gen. Carlos Franco and International Air Transport Association president Manuel del Prado y Colon, who is also the president of the Spanish airline Iberia, attended the briefing.

The officials were asked about ground fog.

Del Prado first refused to comment, but later said there was fog. "But visibility was not below accepted minimum standards," he said.

"All communications are taped and those tapes are now a part of the secret judicial investigation," Del Prado said.

Supreme Court to hear Nixon tape controversy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court today agreed to decide whether tapes of Richard Nixon's conversations, used to help convict his closest White House aides of Watergate offenses, may be publicly distributed.

The justices will hear arguments next fall or winter on the former president's objections to further publicizing of the recordings played to the jury during the 1974 trial.

The issue will be decided later by written opinion.

In the interim, in accordance with a decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington, arrangements have been in progress mass marketing of the tapes pending conclusion of the lawsuit.

U.S. District Judge John Sirica had barred distribution until Watergate

defendants had exhausted their appeals.

But the appeals court ruled this was not serious enough and noted that none of the defendants themselves had objected.

Nixon contended his personal privacy was invaded by placing the tapes in private hands "to be played at cocktail parties and in satiric productions."

But the appeals court said, "The embarrassment Mr. Nixon anticipates is largely that which results whenever misconduct or questionable conduct is exposed."

The material does not encompass all that was subpoenaed from the White House at the time of the trial — only what was heard in the courtroom.

Texts are available in bookstores throughout the country. Other conversations remain confidential.

Sirica was told the National Archives could distribute the tapes to the public for \$3.75 to \$4 per one-hour cassette reel or \$5 to \$5.75 per one-hour tape reel.

Brezhnev warns Vance on human rights issue

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev warned Secretary of State Cyrus Vance today that President Carter's human rights campaign has intruded into Soviet internal affairs and could make impossible "the constructive development of relations between the two countries."

Brezhnev, according to the Soviet news agency Tass, gave "an appropriate appraisal" of Carter Administration actions "which do not square with the principles of equality (and) non-interference in the internal affairs of each other."

The Soviet leader at the start of three days of U.S.-Soviet talks said failure to observe the principle of non-interference could make "the

constructive development of relations between the two countries impossible."

At the same time, Brezhnev stressed Soviet willingness to make a concerted effort at easing U.S.-Soviet strains and finding "mutually acceptable solutions" to such complicated issues as the search for a new strategic arms agreement.

Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin previously warned Vance in Washington that a series of U.S. actions violated the non-interference principle contained in a 1933 agreement establishing diplomatic relations and reaffirmed in 1973 in an agreement between former President Nixon and Brezhnev.

The U.S. delegation had no im-

mediate comment on the Tass report but confirmed that Vance had presented Brezhnev with two proposals for the talks.

The Tass report was characteristically convoluted but its essential warning about the Carter human rights campaign was clear.

At a news conference Sunday, Vance told newsmen that he did not intend to raise the issue at the talks, but was prepared to explain that Carter did not seek to single out any individual nation on human rights.

Despite the implicit threat, the Soviet leadership remained outwardly cordial, both at the talks and at a luncheon for Vance hosted by Gromyko at a guest house in the Lenin Hills overlooking Moscow.

HARTFORD — Accidents took the lives of at least eight Connecticut residents over the weekend, including two boys whose homemade raft broke apart in Stamford Harbor.

HARTFORD — The executive board of the Connecticut State Employees Association has endorsed a master agreement to be voted on next week by 30,000 state workers. The pact calls for at least \$26.83 more per week for each worker as of July 1, 1978 and a dental plan to take effect in 1979.

BRISTOL — Connecticut authorities today planned to determine whether a handgun used to kill cafe operator Joseph Rich is the same weapon allegedly found in the possession of three Bristol residents arrested in New York in possession of Rich's car.

WEST HARTFORD — Seventy-one nonunion workers hired to replace strikers at Colt Industries factories will be on the job in place of lower-echelon union workers whose positions they won. Their jobs were one condition of an agreement ratified Saturday, ending a 10-week walkout. The displaced unionists will be hired as openings develop at the plants.

Directors predict budget cuts

Members of the Board of Directors today predicted sizeable cuts in the budget proposed by Town Manager Robert E. Weiss.

"I expect the board will cut the budget substantially," Mayor Matthew Moriarty Jr. said. The proposed budget, which calls for a 10.6 per cent increase in the budget to \$25,531,305, "is by far the largest increase I've ever seen," the mayor said.

He said that most departments in the town government can expect a cut in the dollar figure proposed in the manager's budget.

"Everybody will have to share the burden," he said.

Phyllis Jackson, a member of the board, said, "I think it's unbelievable that they (the town administration) would present a budget of that size."

"I don't know how they feel the people of Manchester can come up with that kind of increase," she said, referring to the 9.43-mill increase that would be needed to cover the cost of the budget boost.

"I do hope people come to the budget hearing and let themselves be heard," she said. The public hearing on the budget will be held Wednesday, April 6 at 8 p.m. at the Waddell School.

Mrs. Jackson also expressed concern about several departments requesting new staff.

"That business about telling the department heads to get along on last year's budget must have been a farce," she said. Weiss had requested that department heads submit reports on how it would affect the department if no budget increase was granted.

She pointed to the town clerk's office, which she said has not increased its staff in her five years on the board.

"If one department can do it, what's wrong with the other departments?" she asked.

Pascal Prignano, deputy mayor, said that the board will have to take a careful look at the entire budget.

"It's the highest request I can recall. I was a little surprised at the increase that was requested," he said.

Prignano said that he has not yet studied the manager's proposal and, thus, is not sure if the full increase is justified.

Another director, Carl Zinsner, said, "We've got to chop at least seven mills from this budget. We just can't afford this kind of mill rate."

He compared the town's budgeting with a financially strapped person who might be car shopping.

"When he goes out to buy a car, he doesn't start looking at Cadillacs. We have to start looking at Fords and Chevys, not Cadillacs," he said. "What you can't afford, you just can't buy."

Zinsner said that the increase in the budget has nothing to do with the town's work in the development of the industrial park. He said that he has heard some concerns raised about that subject.

"One has nothing to do with the other," he said. The cost of the park would be paid for through the bond issue approved at the March 15 referendum. Thus, none of the park cost is appropriated in the budget.

He also proposed that the directors consider returning the budget to Weiss for his immediate reactions on where cuts should take place.

Moriarty said that he expects Weiss or a representative of his office to be present at all the directors' budget sessions through April and early May. The board has until May 7 to complete its budget proposal, according to Controller Thomas S. Moore.

In the past, the directors have met individually with each department head to review budget proposals, Moriarty said. This year, however, he expects that the manager's office will be represented at each budget session and that department heads will be consulted only when it is considered necessary.

Town planner to retire

J. Eric Potter, Manchester's town planner for the past 8 1/2 years, will retire at the end of this month "to take life a little easier." But, in retiring, he is probably going to make life a little tougher for some fish swimming around in southern waters.

Potter, 65, said that he doesn't have any set plans for when he hangs up his ruler and rolls up his maps. "I'm going to take advantage of retirement and take life a little easier," Potter said. "I'll probably head south where the climate's a little warmer and the fishing is better."

He was, in fact, originally attracted to Connecticut because of its warm climate — Warm, at least, in comparison to Alberta, Can.

Potter worked as a planner in the Canadian province from 1953 to 1962, when he left to become the town planner for Windsor.

"There was a better climate here than in Alberta," he said. "I got rather tired of doing field inspections at 40 below zero."

His work in Canada centered around long-range planning. He worked on the creation of new towns that would develop because of natural resource discoveries, such as oil deposits.

Before World War II, he was a surveyor with the British Government. During the war, he served in the Middle East as a geodesic surveyor with the Royal Engineers.

He returned to the town government less than a week later, however.

"I think my skills and talents are best suited to a community rather than fragmented across the state," he said at the time of his return to Manchester.

He compared his work in other areas to what he's found in Manchester.

"Planning in a large English town is a much older concept. There isn't the local public interest that you find in an American town," he said.

Manchester residents take zoning matters "more personally, which is understandable," he said.

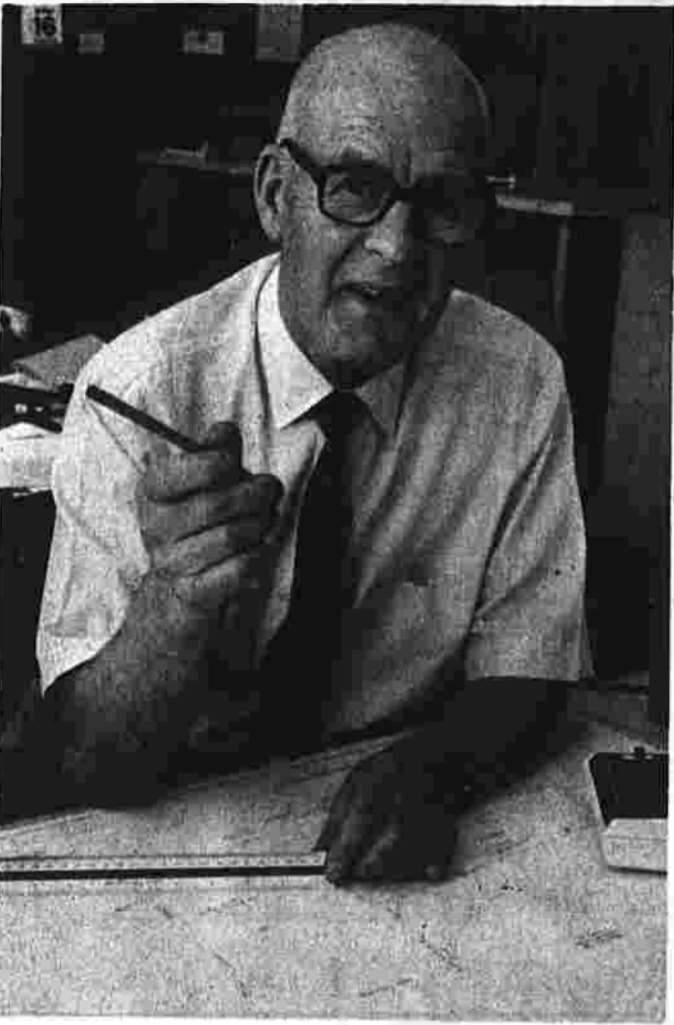
"The majority have the classic New England complex. They have a real interest in the land," he said.

He spoke of the people in Edmonton, a city that was primarily made up of immigrants while he was there.

"They were not so much concerned with what's going on in the next field. In America, it becomes a matter of extreme importance," he said.

While looking ahead to his retirement and those southern fishing spots, Potter also has some fine memories of Manchester.

He said that one of the best parts of his time here has been "becoming acquainted with the Manchester resident and working with a very fine group of people in the town hall."

Comeback for the Peace Corps

By Martha Angie and Robert Walters WASHINGTON (NEA) - The Peace Corps is about to make a comeback—but this time it won't be dispatching volunteers to far corners of the globe to tout the virtues of American ingenuity, chemical fertilizers and hydroelectric generators.

But those were the days of unlimited American self-assurance, a trait which manifested itself in the belief that the Peace Corps would make its greatest contribution to the underdeveloped or "emerging" nations by imposing on them our values, our systems and our technology.

Nixon suspicions Along came President Richard M. Nixon, with his suspicions about the archtypical Peace Corps volunteer, a college graduate with a liberal arts degree and a liberal political orientation.

Nixon restructured the program in a fashion that drastically reduced the use of such "generalists" and replaced them with middle-aged, technical specialists from government and industry—the kind of people who wouldn't cause any political trouble after they returned home.

Prohibited by law from killing the program, Nixon did his best to mortally wound it. In 1967 and 1968, the Peace Corps had about 15,000 volunteers in the field today that number is approximately 8,000.

Bell sounds a bit sore about mess

WASHINGTON - One of the most engaging men in Washington is a former lawyer named Jack who retired at the ripe old age of 50 "because I found myself hustling to make money I didn't need."

Jack does some free jobs for poor folks who need legal advice, works as a volunteer at a couple of charity institutions, raises roses, and collects oddies and oddsies on the high cost of living for us working stiffs. His findings so far have convinced him that in too many markets there is an unwritten collusion among sellers to fix prices in violation of antitrust laws.

Recently, he made a study of 16 automobile dealers in the Washington area. He found that for identical or similar models, prices at all these dealers varied by no more than \$12. "Some coincidence," says Jack.

Jack also invaded the super-markets. There he discovered that prices for peanut butter, hamburger, sugar, and bread were identical. Prices for a number of other food items varied by only one or two cents.

I mention Jack's altruistic efforts - he could afford peanut butter at \$25 a pound—because Atty. Gen. Griffin B. Bell has discovered what he calls "lock-step" pricing in industries dominated by a few large firms.

Price-fixing, however disguised, is one big reason for continued inflation, of which we were reminded the other day when the Carter administration announced that consumer prices in February rose 1 per cent, the fastest one-month increase since September 1974, when we had double-digit inflation.

Follow suit Bell claims common price increases are being passed on to consumers by means of price fixers. We have heard that kind of talk before at the Justice Department, and nothing happened.

Tone abdominal muscles

DEAR DR. LAMB - going to have sore Having recently undergone surgery to repair bilateral inguinal hernias, I am trying to find information on short and long-range health and exercise programs that will build up the abdominal muscles' strength properly, yet not damage the surgical repairs.

I'm wondering if there is any danger to my children if she does. Several years ago she had an operation for skin cancer and was given a clean bill of health for that.

At the beginning you should simply learn to contract your abdominal muscles. You can lie down on your back and suck in your stomach muscles and tense them in this position. Learn the feel of your abdominal muscles contracting.

Don't overdo it at first or you will have sore belly muscles. I would suggest no more than 10 contractions at a time to start with, no more than one such exercise period a day until you are sure you are not
