HEALTH Diabetes needs careful test

DEAR DR. LAMB - My doctor told me I was a diabetic after he did a glucose tolerance test. I am on a strict diet - no medication.

Then I read this item in the paper that said the glucose tolerance tests are usually wrong and should not be used to make a diagnosis of diabetes.

I have begun to wonder and would like your opinion. DEAR READER - The comments you read in the paper need to be put into proper perspective.

It is true that many false positive tests do occur. This is often because the patient has not been properly prepared.

It also depends on how severe the test results are. If the values go very high and stay very high in a properly prepared patient.

**UConn faculty okay pact**

STORRS (UPI) — University of Connecticut faculty have virtually ratified their first ever contract with the state, the president of the UConn chapter of the American Association of University Professors said Sunday.

Anthony DeBenedetto, a UConn chemical engineering professor, said the pact has virtually been ratified even though final vote tallies have not been completed.

He said of the approximately 350 professors at the main campus at Storrs who voted on the contract last week, about 90 per cent voted to approve the agreement.

The votes from faculty at UConn's five branch campuses will be compiled as the results arrive at Storrs by registered mail today. There are about 1,000 faculty members at Storrs and another 400 teachers at the branches.

Benjamin Brockman, vice president of the UConn chapter of the AAUP, discounted the chance the vote from the branches could reverse the apparent trend.

"I don't see it as remotely possible to change the vote," said Brockman, a UConn associate English professor. He said the contract will be sent to the legislature later this week for action.

The tentative agreement provides a five per cent pay hike retroactive to Jan. 1, an annual \$500 cost-of-living increase and a 3.5 per cent annual increment for all faculty whose performance is judged satisfactory.

The two-year pact, reached April 4 after several months of often tense negotiations, was the first contract worked out between the AAUP and the state since the legislature gave state employees the right to bargain collectively.

The proposed agreement came three days after a legislative deadline for submission of state employee contracts.

UConn officials have been assured by legislative leaders that the pact will be considered during the current session if it is received during the next few days.

**Gasoline tax hike predicted**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Finance Committee Chairman Russell Long predicts President Carter's April 20 energy message to Congress will include a major tax on gasoline producers and some increases in the price to encourage both production and conservation.

Long, interviewed Sunday on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press," predicted the Carter energy plan would be a "balanced program" which also includes a boost for home insulation. But Long said he did not think Carter would propose a big increase in the gasoline tax.

Long said he would support a \$500 tax on automobiles using a lot of gasoline "if the President finds the courage to recommend it."

Long also said he thinks Democrats eventually will muster the six to eight votes needed for approval of President Carter's \$50 tax rebate plan.

He admitted, however, the plan would not pass if the vote was held immediately.
