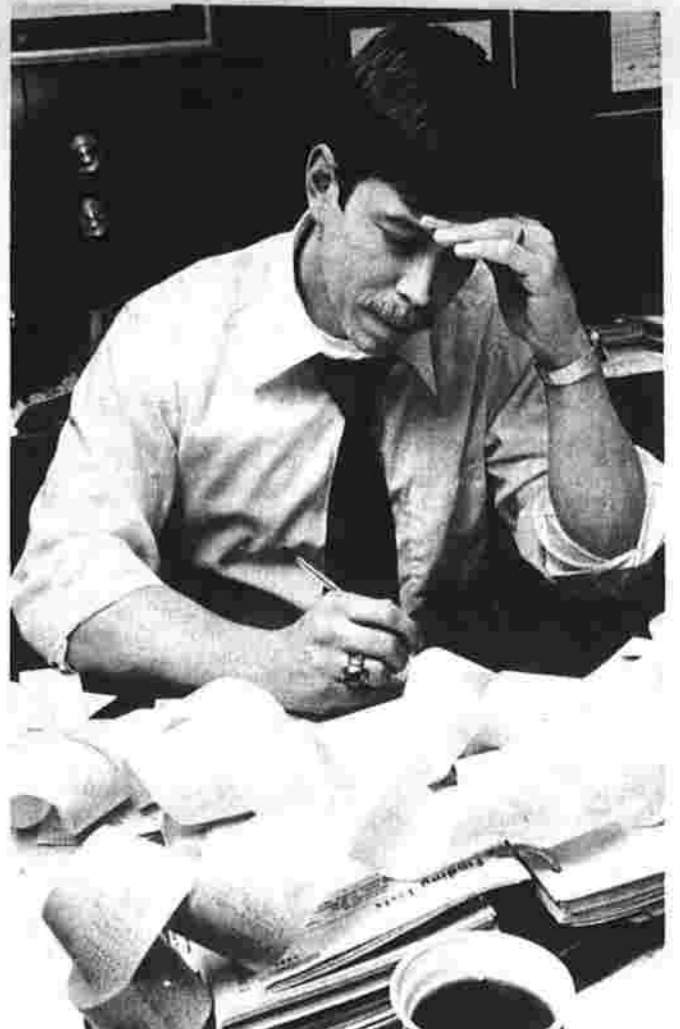

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Rejecting "coercive or self-defeating controls," President Carter today called on government, business and labor to join in the battle against inflation by voluntary restraints.

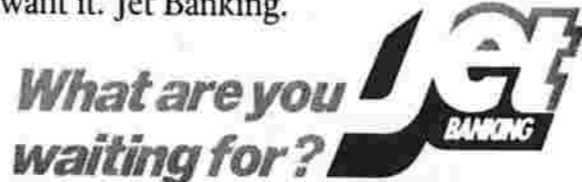

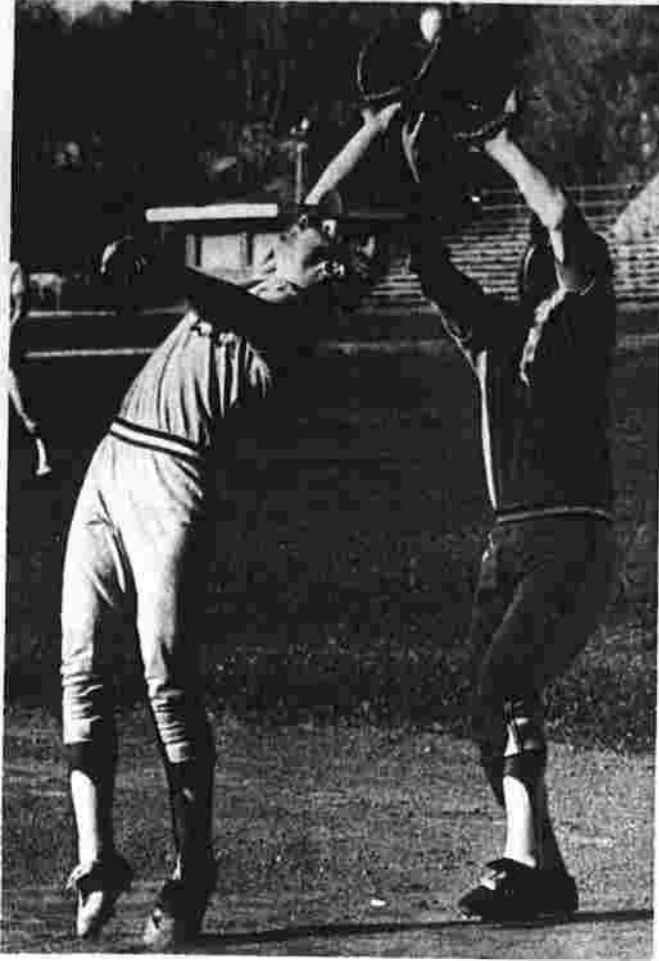

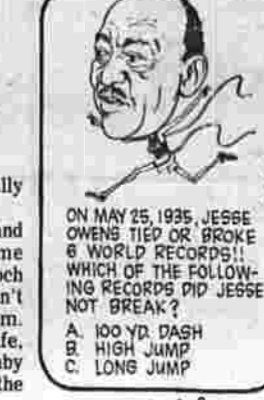

 that amount in July, the first month of the new fiscal year.

More to come?
 The town may receive further funding through the program. Paula Yellman, the town's budget analyst, told the board that Congress is in the process of deciding whether further funding for the program will be granted.

Cuts in the budget proposed by the directors Thursday night included the elimination of a \$1,500 raise for the town treasurer and a \$1,000 raise for both registrars. The decisions on the budget reductions are not final, but many that are proposed at the budget workshops will be enacted before the board presents its final budget in early May.

Other items tentatively cut include a \$1,000 portable public address system for the planning office, a \$1,068 reclassification of a position in the assessor's office, and a \$750 payment to the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

The budget for the Bicentennial Commission was reduced from \$5,000 to \$3,000, and an error and the reclassification of a position in the controller's office led to an \$8,500 reduction in that budget.

Zinsser questioned the town's \$5,500 fee to be a member of the Capitol Region Council of Governments (CRCOG). But, Weiss said that the town should continue to be a member, "even if just for self-defense."

"What CRCOG decides will affect us whether we're members or not," Weiss said.

Mayor Matthew Moriarty, the town's representative to CRCOG, echoed this, pointing to the recent situation involving a proposed dump in Glastonbury near the Manchester line.

The matter was presented at a CRCOG meeting, and, although no formal vote was taken, Moriarty said that he felt better knowing he could attend the meeting and vote if necessary.

Another director, Beldon Schaffer, said that CRCOG makes many decisions on regional transportation.

"We cannot solve transportation of the region on the town level. Hopefully, we're all going to be the beneficiaries of some rational thinking on transportation," he said.

Director Paul Willhide also questioned an increase in the manager's operating budget. The budget for 1977-78, including a separate personnel budget, is \$118,837, compared to the \$102,924 that is expected to be spent this year.

"I think we need to verify why it's 17 per cent higher than this year, which seemed like a pretty rough year," he said.

Weiss pointed to a \$6,000 increase in personal services, primarily salary increases, and \$11,000 in contractual services. Willhide further questioned the contractual services increase, and Weiss said that he would provide more information on that hike at the next session scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday.
