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Carter addresses nation tonight at 8

Debate continues on gasoline tax

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Carter tonight begins a critical week with the presentation of a gloomy forecast of oil and gas supplies to prepare the nation for his plans on how to grapple with the energy crisis.

Some aides were arguing strongly against the higher gasoline taxes which were believed to be a cornerstone of his program.

Carter delivers a nationwide address on radio and television at 8 p.m. EST to lay a foundation for his energy proposals, which will be presented to a joint session of Congress — also on television — Wednesday night.

Another controversy deals with the federal study of existing federal water projects. At least 30 of them initially were deemed unnecessary and that stirred bitter reaction from

many members of Congress.

The administration has been forced to back off from its early stand. It now appears that at least half of the projects will be continued.

Sources said Sunday that key advisers are urging Carter to drop the proposal for higher federal taxes on gasoline. It was feared such an approach would bog down the package in Congress.

"This is going right down to the wire," one aide said of the decision on whether to impose higher gas taxes.

"It looks like it could go either way," he said of the proposal, which eventually could add as much as 50 cents onto the price of a gallon of gasoline.

Those opposed to the high levy argued it would be difficult to convince Congress to go along. At the

same time, they claimed the size of the proposed increase would not be large enough to curtail car use effectively.

Generally, it is one of the more critical weeks the new administration has faced.

For the first time since he has been in Washington, Carter went to church Sunday without his family. They were at Camp David, the presidential retreat.

He also talked with his son, Chip, who returned from a trip to China with a congressional delegation.

Most of the day, however, was devoted to the energy package and tonight's address.

A cornerstone of the speech is expected to be a CIA study which found that world oil use will surpass production within 10 years. While not yet disclosing details of the study, Carter calls the findings "disturbing."

Consumer advocate Ralph Nader, however, already is questioning the report, claiming it is distorted because it relies heavily on figures from the oil industry.

The package that will be presented Wednesday is expected to include a tax on "gas guzzling" cars and a rebate for those with good mileage.

Explosion rocks Chattanooga

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI)—A "tremendous" explosion today destroyed a five-story building housing a bank, causing millions of dollars in damage and leaving a two-block area looking like an atom bomb went off.

Police said a woman seen near the area at the time of the explosion was unaccounted for, but there were no official reports of injuries. Cause of the blast was unknown.

"In all my 56 years of experience, I have never seen anything like this. It looks like an atom bomb went off," said Fire Marshal Mike Quinn.

"No one had to turn in an alarm on this one. I believe everybody in Chattanooga heard it when it went off," said Fire Department Capt. Harold Wooten.

The explosion occurred in the five-story Siskin Building, which houses a branch of the First Tennessee National Bank.

Jake Gray, owner of a cafe across the street, said, "I thought the world was ending when it went off. It reminded me of the Pacific in World War II."

Gray said he had just sold an elderly woman a newspaper and she was walking toward the Siskin Building. "She had to be killed because she only had time to get across the street when it went off. I hope the poor soul is all right."

Hundreds of police and fire fighters came to the scene of the 4:30 a.m. EST explosion and a four-block area was cordoned off to prevent looting.

Town GOP willing to accept 2-mill increase in new budget

Manchester's Republican party has called for a tax increase of no more than two mills, Town Manager Robert B. Weiss has praised the "team effort" of the budget workshop format, and town directors

have said that they expect an increase this week in budget slicing.

All of these developments occurred as the directors prepare for their second workshop today at 7:30 p.m. on the proposed \$25.5 million budget for the 1977-78 fiscal year.

This budget, proposed by Weiss, would require a General Fund tax increase of 9.43 mills and a Fire District tax increase of 1.23 mills.

"The Republican Party feels strongly that an increase of this magnitude is unreasonable in the face of economic realities," the party statement, released today by Republican Town Chairman Thomas F. Ferguson, said.

"The party also feels that a token reduction of the proposed increase by the party in power will not be a realistic recognition of the difficulties faced by the electorate," the statement said. "Only a real effort to trim every ounce of fat from the

expenditure side of the manager's document can be acceptable to the voter."

The party's statement concluded by asking Weiss and all town employees to re-examine budget requests and "to assist an already overburdened citizenry by keeping the rate increase to no more than two mills."

Members of the board, which has scheduled three budget workshops this week, expect cutting of the budget to increase this week.

Republican Vivian Ferguson noted that little was cut from the budget in the first workshop Thursday night. She said that it is "par for the course" for the directors not to eliminate very much in the early stages of the work.

"But, this board has to take a pretty hard-nosed stand, she said. "We've got a lot to do yet."

Democrat Jack Goldberg said, "My initial attitude is to look where we can save some money."

"It's important for the public to recognize that the directors are taxpayers too. We're not about to be foolish enough to cripple the town by cutting too much or to hurt ourselves by overtaxing," Goldberg said.

Another Democratic member of the board, Robert Price, said, "The best is in store for us," referring to the two largest sections of the budget, Public Works and Education.

Price said he will be interested to hear Weiss' recommendations for the Public Works budget, which is scheduled to be the major topic of tonight's session.

In referring to the Education budget, Price said, "I think he (Weiss) may give us the ball on that one."

Republican Carl Zinsser said, "If we cut the rest of the budget the way

we did Thursday night, the budget is not going to get cut very much." He said that the majority Democratic party is "going to have to get more aggressive" in budget-cutting efforts.

In the first budget workshop, discussion of town salaries was frequent. The 1977-78 fiscal year includes 27, rather than the normal 26, pay days. This results in an automatic rise of almost four percent over present-year salaries.

Regular rise

This increase, coupled with regular pay hikes and step-by-step salary increases, results in a substantial rise in the salaries that are included in the 1977-78 budget.

"The biggest problem is the salaries are high," Mrs. Ferguson said, referring to the proposed budget. "I think the raises are fantastic."

The format for the budget hearings has been altered for this year. In past years, department heads have met with the board to discuss the proposed department budget. This procedure, unless requested by the board for a specific area, will be eliminated this year.

Also, Weiss and other representatives of the town administration attended the first workshop and will continue to attend unless the board objects. In the past, the board and manager have met for a number of sessions before the board met separately for the final session.

Weiss said that he will be "available at the pleasure of the board."

"Preparation of the budget is one of the most important parts of both the manager's and directors' jobs. The more of a team effort it can be, the better off the town is going to be," Weiss said.

Commission recommends electronic mail service

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A federal commission today called for an end to Saturday mail delivery and recommended President Carter and Congress consider instant satellite and wire transmission of letters by the U.S. Postal Service.

It also called for an immediate government appropriation of \$625 million to wipe out the service's operating deficit and for increased federal subsidization though at least 1985.

The commission was created last year to consider possible solutions to growing financial problems of the nation's mail service. Today's report followed six months of public hearings and a telephone poll which showed Americans are willing to give up six-day mail.

As for instant letter communication, the seven-member Commission on Postal Service said it found rival electronic communications to "portend disastrous consequences for the Postal Service" unless the agency gets a share of that business.

Another of the report's major recommendations was that Congress consider amending present law in order to allow private companies to first class mail.

The National Association of Greeting Card Publishers quickly

criticized the plan, charging that first class mail users would continue to be overcharged to subsidize other forms of mail.

"The Commission on Postal Service is, in effect, suggesting business as usual and the public be hanged," said Norman Halliday, the association's public affairs director.

The Postal Service is losing business mail revenue because the government and banks are transferring funds electronically. The service sees setting up its own electronic transmission of mail as a good way to make up the loss.

The commission proposed that the government decide by April 1979 whether the Postal Service should enter the electronic communication field.

The commission said doing so "would most likely succeed in achieving the major economies of a scale necessary to support a system to manage both hard copy and electronic communications."

The commission recommended that Congress abandon the idea that the Postal Service must be self-supporting. It said rates should be made "more sensitive to market conditions" rather than being assigned on a cost basis, as at present.

To help the Postal Service out of its

present crisis and stabilize its long-term financing, the commission recommended that Congress immediately appropriate \$625 million to eliminate the present operating deficit and increase regular appropriations, at least until 1985.

Judge tells teachers to work full shift

BERLIN (UPI)—Superior Court Judge Leo Parsky today issued a temporary restraining order requiring Berlin teachers to work a full day.

The teachers had planned to only work four hours as a job action to demonstrate their displeasure with the way contract talks are going between the Berlin Education Association and the Berlin Board of Education.

Members of the BEA voted 104-56 Saturday to reject the board's latest offer and agreed Sunday night to work only four hours today. They took the same action for one day last Wednesday after voters rejected for

a second time an agreement worked out between the BEA and the school board. The teachers have been without a contract for 18 months. The injunction forbidding the job action requires the teachers to work a full six-hour day in the town's six schools. There are 3,100 students in the school system.

The offer rejected by the teachers proposed a 4.5 per cent salary hike retroactive to July 1, 1976 and a 5.7 per cent hike through the second year.

The contract offered the teachers an additional personal leave day and \$500 severance pay to retiring teachers.

State plans to buy 280 new buses

HARTFORD (UPI)—Gov. Ella T. Grasso today said the state, in an effort to promote mass transportation, was going to buy 280 new buses.

"It is particularly significant that we move ahead at this time with this important phase of our transit modernization program," she said.

"Our determination to promote public transportation is fully in keeping with President Carter's plans to spell out a new national energy policy this week."

She said the buses, which will be used in the Stamford, New Haven and Hartford divisions of the Con-

necticut Transit Co., will replace vehicles at least 12 years old.

Connecticut Transit is a state-owned firm that is managed by a private company.

Mrs. Grasso said the Department of Transportation would advertise for bids for the buses in the next week.

She said the buses will be specially fitted to accommodate the elderly and handicapped.

The new buses will be purchased under a grant that would have the federal government pick up 80 per cent of the expected \$30 million pricetag and the state pay the rest.

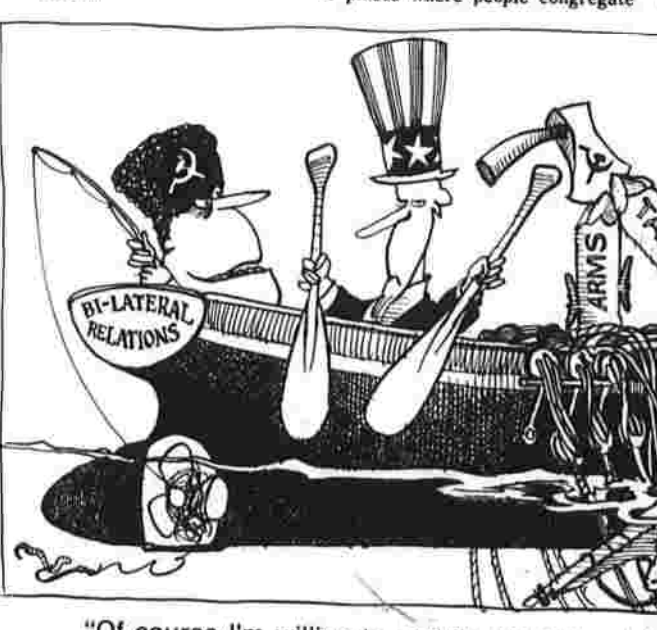
Bottle ban bill not comprehensive enough

Careless people with sloppy habits, who dump their various kinds of refuse at picnic grounds, or wherever they happen to stop, are not going to change their careless habits, whether the public is offended by their litter of paper, foods, fruits, paper cups, drink-cans or bottles.
These sloppy people create jobs for cleaning up after them. If the cleaning is not done, surely after a long while, the rubbish will deteriorate and become part of the soil, but the beer and soda containers will remain whether they be made of glass, plastic or metal.
A sloppy person needs to be fined for leaving this nondestructible refuse, as well as any other kind. Bran is low in sodium

DEAR DR. LAMB - My husband has very high blood pressure and kidney trouble. He has been eating pure bran obtained in one of the health food stores, two teaspoons three times a day, which has helped his bowels.

He would like to know if there is any salt in the bran and if so, how much. He also drinks from three to four glasses of skim milk a day. Is there any salt in the milk that could prove harmful?

DEAR READER - The only reason for concern about salt is its sodium content. Salt is sodium chloride. When the body retains sodium it retains fluid and in people with high blood pressure this may cause an increase in pressure.

How severe the sodium restriction must be in a patient's case depends entirely on how severe his disease is. Many people with modest high blood pressure can tolerate a reasonable amount of naturally occurring sodium in their common foods without any problem at all.

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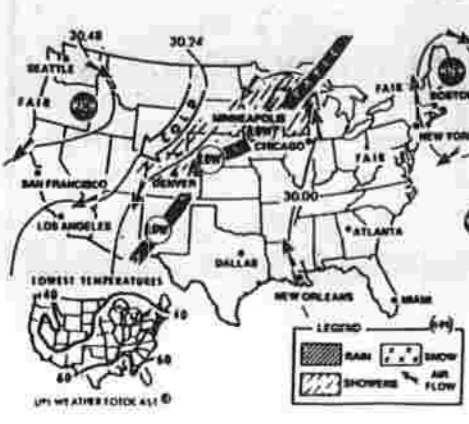

Bran is low in sodium

DEAR DR. LAMB—My husband has very high blood pressure and kidney trouble. He has been eating pure bran obtained in one of the health food stores, two teaspoons three times a day, which has helped his bowels.

He would like to know if there is any salt in the bran and if so, how much. He also drinks from three to four glasses of skim milk a day. Is there any salt in the milk that could prove harmful?

DEAR READER—The only reason for concern about salt is its sodium content. Salt is sodium chloride. When the body retains sodium it retains fluid and in people with high blood pressure this may cause an increase in pressure.

How severe the sodium restriction must be in a patient's case depends entirely on how severe his disease is. Many people with modest high blood pressure can tolerate a reasonable amount of naturally occurring sodium in their common foods without any problem at all. In more severe cases it is wise not only to eliminate adding salt to foods but to select foods that contain little or no sodium.

Natural wheat bran is very low in sodium. It contains only 9 milligrams of sodium in 100 grams (3.5 ounces), according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. A normal healthy active adult normally needs about 2.5 grams of salt a day (969 milligrams of sodium) but the average American may consume 10 to 12 grams of salt a day (3875 to 4650

milligrams of sodium). The healthy kidney simply flushes out the excess along with water to maintain the normal salt balance in the body.

A cup or glass of milk (half-pint) contains 122 milligrams of sodium, far more than the bran. Milk contains the same amount of salt as the cow's body fluids—about the same as for humans. That amount of salt is equivalent to the concentration of salt in sea water.

If a person needs to severely restrict the salt in the diet it will be necessary to limit or eliminate the use of milk. In that case calcium supplements may be needed. There are some brands of low salt milk prepared as special foods that are available in some parts of the country and if your husband needs to go this route perhaps the

dietitian or doctor can help him with what is available in your community.

Fruits and fruit juices are very low in sodium—about two milligrams in an 8-ounce glass of orange juice.

DEAR DR. LAMB—I am a 16-year-old male. I just started doing calisthenics every day. I used to lift and run only. Are the calisthenics building up muscle bulk? Also, will they tone up my

muscles and make them firm? Could you please give me some information on calisthenics?

DEAR READER—It makes a difference what type of calisthenics you do. In general typical exercises strengthen the muscles that you use for that exercise and often the exercises include stretching and use of body parts through the full range of their motion.

Just keep in mind that you can develop terrific arm muscles while your leg muscles wither away if your leg is in a cast and unused. The principle is, if you don't use it you lose it. So, sensible calisthenics help to improve muscle mass, muscle tone, muscle strength, mobility and endurance only of the parts used.
