WASHINGTON (UPI) — To leading Republicans, President Carter's energy policy imposes a burden on the poor, intrudes on free enterprise and is "defeatist" in nature.
That review of the administration energy policy emerged Friday night in a half-hour television debate by Republican spokesmen to respond — free of charge as a public service by ABC-TV — to Carter's three energy telecasts between April 18 and 22.

Rebates, public works and recovering economy

Several weeks ago, President Carter reversed his stand on the tax rebate of \$50 per person he promised earlier in the year. The Congress quickly concurred. The reason: Improved economic recovery did not require this multi-billion dollar infusion of money into the economy. Friday the government reported that unemployment has dropped to 7 per cent in April, indicating also improved economic recovery and more hiring by private industry. Will the President and the Congress reconsider recently enacted the massive public

works jobs program which is intended to create public service jobs to cut unemployment? Will they trim it back now that the private sector is making substantial and steady progress in reducing unemployment? Or will the President and the Congress dump public works billions of dollars into the country to further fuel inflation which, according to last Thursday's Wholesale Price Index, is now at a 13.2 per cent annual rate? Don't hold your breath, for in politics what is sauce for the goose is not necessarily always sauce for the gander.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mencken was right. After cutting politics "unqualifiedly ratty, raffish, sordid, obscene, and low down," he bade us not to forget "its high capacity to soothe and tickle the midriff, its incomparable services as a maker of entertainment." In Mark 9:14-29 we find a revealing truth about ministering to another's needs. The disciples had undertaken to heal a demon-possessed boy, not out of true compassion, but just to prove to others that they could do it. Seeing their failure, Jesus severely rebuked the disciples, and in love reached out and healed the boy Himself. Later He reminded His disciples that the demon could only be removed by prayer. Too often we attempt to help others, not out of Christian concern, but with the hidden motive of proving our importance. Falling into the same trap as the disciples, we forget that all ministry comes from God. But by praying for those we are concerned about we tap the Lord's power and guidance while keeping ourselves in line. When we look at Jesus' ministry to those in need, we are overwhelmed by the appropriateness of His love. He looked at a person not as one of a group to be stereotyped, but as a unique person with unique needs. And He responded to those needs not according to the guidelines of a doctrine of formula, but according to a love uniquely given. When we are overawed by the task of ministering to others, as we often are, we too often isolate ourselves in the safety of a rigid dogma, or perhaps "cop out" by leaving it to the know-how of the professional. Federal lawmakers want action

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Senate Majority Whip Alan Cranston is a very patient man. He is also a team player, eager to help President Carter achieve administration goals on Capitol Hill. But there are limits to Cranston's patience and to his willingness to defer to Carter's wishes. And when the administration sent an HEW official to testify against an adoption bill Cranston has been working on for six years, the California senator exploded. Obstacles The bill would provide federal assistance to promote the adoption of an estimated 120,000 children who linger in foster care and institutions each year — in large measure because of bureaucratic obstacles to adoption. In the past, one of his chief sponsors was Sen. Walter F. Mondale. At a Senate hearing recently, Asst. Sec. Arabella Martinez of HEW said the Carter administration sympathizes with the objectives of Cranston's bill but wants to delay action for a few more years until a comprehensive review of all federal social service programs can be completed. "Unacceptable" snapped Cranston. "This is not new legislation for us, even though it may be for you. I understand the desire of a new administration to take a new look at the problem, but we're talking about thousands of children who need help now. And we're not going to wait." The clash between Cranston and the HEW official illustrates one of the major sources of continuing tension between Congress and the new administration. After eight years of frustration under veto-happy Republican presidents, Congress has accumulated a huge backlog of legislative proposals it is rushing to

act now that a Democrat is in the White House. Off and running The lawmakers hit the ground running in January, leaving Carter and his inexperienced new team scrambling to catch up. "They didn't have a handle on anything," grumbled one House leadership source. Time after time, congressional committees were forced to postpone scheduled hearings on various bills in order to give the administration a chance to figure out its position on the issue in question and find someone who could testify. Not all bad Sometimes, the results were amicable — as with the new Carter proposal on food stamp reform, which dovetails fairly nicely with legislation that has been in the mill on Capitol Hill for the past couple of years. On other occasions, however, the results were completely unsatisfactory from the congressional viewpoint. Key Democrats in both the House and Senate were furious at the administration's hastily developed advocacy of a new minimum wage package that falls far short of what both organized labor and its supporters on the Hill had put together through long negotiation and bargaining.

Marriage is a "Rite"

Protestant church

I was recently asked in writing, "Why isn't marriage considered a sacrament in most Protestant denominations?" The answer is that Jesus did not "ordain" it. The Protestant church in general has only two "sacraments"; another branch of the Christian church has seven, and still another has nine.

Of the former he said, "This cup is the new testament in my blood; this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye show the Lord's death till he come." (I Corinthians 11: 25-26)

This I believe, is why most Protestant denominations have only two sacraments. Such a question is sometimes asked by a Protestant who feels a bit cheated because other branches of the Christian church have more sacraments than we do.

Out of the mouths of babes

When I was young, one of my fears was the punishment for sin that was in store for wrong-doers. I had vivid pictures of pitchforks and smoke, fire and thirst. Since then my views on heaven and hell have changed but then I took the picture of hell literally.

I wish that I had the calm assurance of the younger walking home from Sunday School after a discussion of Satan and the next life. His friend asked him, "What do you think about all this devil stuff?"

Then, and only then, did the portal open and the king was laid to rest among his fathers. "It's nice to visit but good to be home"

Of late I have been attending various of our area churches from time to time. It has been encouraging to find such friendliness and such reverence in the congregations. Each service has been different but they all have been wonderful.

In one church we experienced a "Godspeed service" for the members who were leaving town. It is common to have a "reception for new members" as they are welcomed into the life of a particular church but there is rarely a formal "goodbye."

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Collectors' Corner

Stamp will mark Lindbergh's flight

This stamp is to be issued near the take-off spot of the historic flight that will have its 50th birthday on May 20th. First-day orders should be addressed to Postmaster, Garden City, N.Y. 11530.

Lindbergh was a pilot of mail planes in his early days — flying the first one from St. Louis to Detroit in 1926. After 50,000 miles and 1,500 hours of this type of aeronautics, he decided to try for the Raymond Orteig Prize of \$25,000 (for a flight from New York to Paris) that had been dangling since 1919.

A group of St. Louis businessmen helped defray the cost of constructing a 220-horsepower monoplane. He set a transcontinental record with this, the Spirit of St. Louis, in early May 1927.

A few days later, in what has been described as a fuel tank with wings, he took off from Roosevelt Field and made it 33 hours later to Le Bourget Airdrome in Paris, and as he got out, said: "I am Charles Lindbergh."

Lindbergh's accomplishments were not

limited to this one epic flight as he continued to work for progress in aeronautics.

Two months after the Paris flight he was off on a tour that was to take him to every one of the 48 states. He did this to emphasize the dependability of aircraft. He missed only one of 82 pinpointed stops. (A Maine fog slowed up one flight).

He traveled more than 22,000 miles and proved that airplanes could keep to schedules the same as railroads.

After this he went on a goodwill ambassador tour of Mexico, Central and South America, and the Caribbean Islands, reaching many areas that had never been seen by plane. To find his way, he sometimes would have to swoop low over a railroad station to read the name of the town. When landing facilities were questionable he would "drag" the field — that is fly low back and forth to look it over and drive back the crowds.

In the 1930s he got himself a flying partner. Anne Morrow Lindbergh left her sheltered life as a poetess and learned to



be a radio operator and licensed pilot. She accompanied Charles on extensive exploratory flights in a pontooned plane over the wilds of Greenland, Labrador and Iceland. They came back with the report that it was feasible to set up and operate regular airline routes over the Atlantic.

Another birthday

The very next day after the Lindbergh stamp there will be a commemorative released in Denver for the centennial of Colorado's statehood. It will show a white coultine against the background of the Rockies.

See the color picture on the front page of Linn's for April 25.

Also on the same page, the four set-tenant butterfly stamps that will be released June 6 at Indianapolis — Swallowtail, Checkerspot, Dogface, and Orange-tip. They look just great. All of these new stamps are 13-centers.

CB Convac

Rescue groups fighting for members

This morning, while driving to work, and listening to my CB, I heard a "10-three three." I had just arrived at the parking lot, so I listened briefly to the responses. As you'd guess they came quickly.

I had a meeting, so I couldn't wait to learn what followed, but it occurred to me, as I went to my office, that CBing is virtually the only means of contact with the outside world from the isolation of the highway. And its values are truly underestimated.

How many other listeners heard that call? There is no way of knowing. A "10-33 Traffic!" can bring a lot of folks on the dead run. Some will know what to do in an emergency. Others won't.

Upon the one who gets there first will rest the terrible responsibility for one or more lives, perhaps.

If that samaritan is a member of an ALERT or REACT team, he or she knows how to handle the emergency as a result of his or her training.

If, on the other hand, the first person to arrive is untrained, and this is possible because CBers are a compassionate and generous group of folks, valuable time may be lost.

REACT alone claims to have handled 55 million emergency calls since 1962. Twelve million of these were auto accidents. And reports from across the nation indicate that CBers acting quickly have cut as much as 17 minutes off the response time scene. The point to all this is that between ALERT and REACT there are approximately 3,500 teams of trained and informed CBers.

REACT was the first organization of its kind. The Radio Emergency Affiliated

Citizens Teams were created to monitor CB channels for emergencies and then to forward the messages to the proper authorities.

ALERT (Affiliated League of Emergency Radio Teams) was former later with generally the same objective.

However, both began to branch out into more direct emergency help. And, soon, they become competitive. Both struggled for additional members to beef up their total rosters. Both of them started with grassroots teams, and grew as these local groups developed and joined into national organizations.

Meantime, another organization formed as CBing became a flood: American CB Operators Association. Organized primarily as a lobbying group, and an expediter of solutions to governmental problems affecting CBers, ACBOA had a formidable membership list.

A merger has just been completed between ALERT and ACBOA. Officials say the new combination makes ALERT a larger organization than REACT. Meantime, the fight goes on. And, the guy who put out the 10-33 hopes that one or the other teams gets to him and expedites meaningful help.

To fully utilize the CB phenomenon, REACT and ALERT (including ACBOA) should join hands to create emergency grids that would mean a trained team member could respond to a 10-33 immediately and render the kind of assistance that is truly meaningful.

Additionally, the combined efforts of these organizations could spread their training and information tracts throughout the CB world so that "help on the way" means skillful and knowledgeable hands are at your service.
