Carter plans report on summit talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter, back from a successful sixday London, summit trip, tackled a desk full of paper work today and planned to report to the nation on his talks with European leaders at a news conference Thursday.

Carter arrived at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington at 10:20 p.m. EDT Tuesday in a "very happy" mood and said he was struck by the "genuine expression of friendship toward our people" in both London and Geneva.

From all reviews Carter scored personally, not only with the British people but also with many of the European statesmen whom he met for the first time while attending the seven-nation economic summit, the four-power summit tlks and the NATO ministerial meeting.

Carter had scheduled a news conference for 7:30 p.m. EDT Thursday, but moved it up to 2:30 p.m. EDT after learning the evening hour clashed with the second in a series of David Frost interviews with Richard

Carter was welcomed home by First Lady Rosalynn Carter and by Vice President Walter Mondale, who leaves Thursday for a European tour

On the homeward flight, presidential assistant Hamilton Jordan said "this was the first time any of us has really had a sense of the international dimensions of the American presidency."

Carter has an invitation from French President Valery Giscard D'Estaing to visit France in the fall. While making no commitment, Carter said he would try to take up the invitation.

National Security Affairs adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski, summing up results of the economic summit, told reporters that a mechanism for coordinating effective cooperation among the advanced Western industrial democracies had been established for the first time.

He also said the summit reflected a reaffirmaton of the close collaboration between the United States, Western Europe and Japan.

Brzezinski said one important consequence of the summit was that it indicated a beginning of "the restoration of confidence in the West."

The foreign policy adviser said the long gallery where the delegates gathered was hushed when Carter spoke, and every European leader wanted a bilateral talk with him about mutual problems.

"There was no doubt that the unknown former governor of Georgia simply impressed these people by two things: one, he knew his facts, and two, his facts were part of a larger picture which he could articulate effectively," Brzezinski

As for Carter's meeting with Syrian President Hafez Assad, Brzezinski said there is no fixed timetable for a Geneva conference but "with far-sighted and intelligent and courageous Israeli leadership and with realistic Arab leadership think there is a chance of a decent settlement.

However he stressed that no one believes a peace settlement could be accomplished this year even if serious negotiations began within the next several months.

Town lays off highway workers to keep current budget in black

Herald Reporter The Town of Manchester has laid off four employes in the Highway Department. The step was taken to keep the department within its 1976-77 budget, Town Manager Robert B. Weiss told the Board of Directors

Tuesday night. "I don't want to end the year in the red. That has a terrible ripple effect on the community," Weiss told the board. He said that Highway Superintendent Timothy O'Sullivan feels the department can be run more efficiently without the four

"I don't think any department head who feels he can get along with fewer workers should be burdened by more men." Weiss said.

He also warned that layoffs might be required in the Highway and Water Departments for 1977-78. Budgets for both have been reduced from estimated expenditures for the present year, he said.

The Highway Department layoff, which includes one Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) employe and three town-salaried employes, reduces the number of laborers in the department from eight to four.

Director Phyllis Jackston questioned whether the number of supervisors in the department should department workers.

"We continue to hire analysts, and the guy who gets laid off is the one who puts amesite on the road," he

The layoffs had been discussed by the board at an executive session held last November. The layoffs are effective May 24.

O'Sullivan said this morning that he is not sure if the department will ire any further layoffs for the 1977-78 fiscal year. Frank Jodaitis, water and sewer administrator, said that layoffs are a possibility, but he will not know for sure until he has completed analysis of his budget.

Department heads are scheduled to report on Monday what they expect to do to meet the 1977-78 departmental appropriations.

In a related matter, the directors tabled action on two vacancies in the Water Department. The board agreed to wait for a report from Jodaitis on his personnel needs for the upcoming year before acting to fill the vacancies.

One of the speakers at Tuesday night's meeting was Edward Zikus of 113 N. School St., who is one of the four Highway Department workers that was laid off.

that would ban the supersonic Concorde from landing in Connecticut has been signed by Gov. Ella T. Grasso, but a federal court today put the constitutionality of that law in doubt.

Mrs. Grasso, who Tuesday also signed a bill that would simplify the write-in voting procedure for president, now has approved 109 bills this year and vetoed two others.

But today a U.S. District Court judge in New York declared unconstitutional the New York-New Jersey Port Authority's ban on allowing the Anglo-French Concorde SST to land at John F. Kennedy Air-

The decision by Judge Milton Pollack is expected to be appealed by several environmental and communi-

HARTFORD (UPI) - Legislation ty groups opposed to letting the giant transport land here because of the plane's high noise level.

Pollack's ruling came in a suit the British and French filed to force the Port Authority to allow the Concorde to land at Kennedy for a trial period.

Connecticut's Concorde bill would prevent the noisy British-French supersonic from landing at Bradley International Airport, except in emergencies. Bradley is located just outside Mrs. Grasso's hometown of Windsor Locks. The law takes effect immediately.

Although the Concorde is not now landing in Connecticut, the new law will prevent future landings should the federal government decide the supersonic may land in the United

Last year, President Ford's Transprtation Secretary, William Coleman authorized Concorde landings on a 16-month trial basis at Dulles International in suburban Virginia outside Washington D.C.

The French and British have threatened economic retaliation if the aircraft is banned from American airports.

I medium onion diced 1 cup fresh or bottled clam juice 1/4 tsp. dried thyme One 17 oz. can cream-style corn

1 boiled potato, diced cup uncooked, clean, fresh or frozen shrimp 1 cup milk or cream Salt to taste

Paprika Finely chopped parsley Lightly brown the onion in the butter or margarine in a

heavy-bottomed pot, 2-quart size or larger. Add the clam juice, thyme, corn and diced cooked potato and set over low heat. Let simmer for 5 minutes. Add the shrimp, simmer till shrimp are pink and tender. Add the milk and heat again, this time just to boiling. Taste to see if salt is needed. Add only 1/4 teaspoon at a time. Serve hot.

Grissini (Bread sticks) 1 cake yeast

1/4 cup warm water 1 cup scalded milk 2 tbls, sugar 2 tbls, melted butter

34 cup warm water 6 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in ¼ cup water. Pour milk into large bowl. Add sugar, salt, butter and 34 cup of water. Cool til lukewarm and add yeast mixture. Slowly stir in half the flour. Beat till smooth, then add rest of flour. Turn out, onto bread board. Roll to 1/2-inch thickness. Cut into long strips and roll into pencil-shaped strips.

Place on oiled cookie sheets, cover and let rise till doubled. Brush with egg white glaze and sprinkle with poppy seed seasame seed, or coarse salt. Bake in 425degree oven for 15 minutes or till browned.

Who's for hominy?

One of the best parts of my job with the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians, is that as editor of the paper, my husband and I are invited to all the activities Last night we went to our first pow-wow. Now, a powwow is not, as I used to think, a gathering of vise Indian chiefs who sit around in a circle smoking a p-ace pipe. A pow-wow is a party. A wonderful party with singing, dancing, and lots of fry bread and homemade hominy. It was the hominy that was held up as the major attrac-

tion by my new Indian friends. "It's my favorite food!" said one.

'You can't stop eating it," said another. "It makes Southern hominy taste like corn meal mush," said still another. Now to the honest with you, Southern hominy is one of the things I didn't like ... even a little bit ... about the South. To me it's thick and greasy and full of lumps. But

because I want to be a good ambassador here in Choctaw country, I vowed that I'd give Indian hominy a try. The night of the pow-wow was bright and clear and when we arrived in the wooded park a large crowd had

Choctaw social dancers, wearing beautiful beaded costumes, were weaving back and forth in the slow rhythmic dances of their ancestors. They were accompanied by the beating of a drum and the sing-song chant of a Choctaw singer.

Over by the picnic tables a group stood around a huge black iron pot that was suspended over a wood fire. An old woman was stirring the mixture with a long pole and one look over her shoulder told me it was hominy...thick and lumpy with a layer of yellow fat bubbling on top.
"That's chicken fat," she said. "That's what makes
ME fat," she added with a chuckle patting the round stomach beneath her full dirndl skirt.

When the hominy was ready, my friends landed me a bowlful and waited expectantly.

"Mmmmmm," I said as I swallowed the firs mouthful. "Mmmmmm, MMMMM," I said again, hoping I could satisfy them with my second mouthful

They were satisfied and walked off to fill their own bowls. That's when I looked up to see Corrie, a young Indian woman who works in the finance department,

laughing at me.
"You didn't like that hominy. I could tell by the way you swallowed." "How did I swallow?" I asked

Corrie looked around to be sure no one was listening. "The way I do," she said with a conspiratorial grin. "I always eat some to please my mother. But, yuk, I think hominy is horrible. It's thick and greasy and well you know," she finished.

Q. Don't be fuelish, the ads say. As the price of gas goes out of sight, this saying takes on extra meaning. How can I save on gas consumption? A. The most important single element in determining fuel economy of a particular car is the driving technique of the individual behind the wheel. One authority declares that a careful driver should be able to get at least 30 per cent better mileage than an average driver and 50 per cent better mileage than a poor one. Here's some advice from the Office of Energy Conservation and Environment in the Federal Energy Administration:

Start slowly. Accelerate gently except when entering high-speed traffic lanes or when passing. Hot rod driving and jerky acceleration can increase fuel consumption by two miles per gallon in city traffic.

2. Avoid unnecessary braking. And try to anticipate the traffic ahead. When the traffic light far ahead turns red, take your mediately. The light may turn green again by the time you reach the intersection. If not, there's still a fuel saving. In coasting, the car's kinetic energy maintains propulsion rather than the burning of additional fuel There is then less energy to be dissipated in braking. Don't tailgate. This necessitates additional braking, too.

3. Drive at moderate speeds. As your speed increases, so does your car's factor in gasoline mileage. Most automobiles get about 28 per cent more miles per gallon on the highway at 50 miles per hour than at 70 and about 21 per cent more at 55 than at

as traffic conditions permit. On the highway, "seesawing" or repeatedly varying the speed by five miles per hour can reduce gas mileage by as much as 1.3 miles per gallon.

5. Save gas when changing gears. If you drive a car with a manual transmission, run through the lower gears gently and quickly for minimum gasoline consumption, then build up speed in high gear. If you drive a car with an automatic transmission, apply enough gas pedal pressure to get the car rolling, then let up slightly on the pedal to ease the automatic transmission into high range as quickly as possible. More gas is consumed in the lower



Q. Is it possible for someone who's only 29 to have enough credit under Social Security to get disability

A. Yes. Most workers need credit for at least five years of the 10 years before they became disabled. However, the younger you are, the fewer earnings credits you need. If you become severely disabled before 31, you may be eligible for disability benefits with only 11/2 years of earnings credit under Social Security, depending on your touch with any Social Security office. Q. My daughter, who's 12, may need a kidney

transplant. Is it true we can get Medicare help for the

cost of the transplant? A. Yes. You can get help under certain conditions. If you've worked long enough in a job covered by Social Security, you and your dependents can get Medicare to help pay for a kidney transplant, or dialysis, and other health care costs for kidney failure. You should get in touch with any Social Security office as soon as possible. Q. I get SSI checks because I'm 68 and my only other income is a small pension. As of the first of this year, my pension was increased a little bit. I don't think it's enough to make any difference in my SSI checks. Do I have to

report this increase to Social Security? A. Yes. Any change in your income must be reported to Social Security even though it may not affect the amount of your monthly SSI check. All you have to do is call or write any Social Security office and tell them how much your pension amounts to now.

Q. I'm doing a term paper on the Social Security program. I'd like to know if Social Security benefits have ncreased as much as the cost of living has increased over

A Social Security benefits have increased faster than prices. The cost of living, since 1965, has increased by 70 per cent. However, in that same period, Social Security enefits have been increased by 120 per cent.
