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#### Right-winger scores upset victory

# Begin pledges peace effort

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) - Rightwing leader Menahem Begin, the upset victor in Israel's national elections, today said he would go to Washington as soon as he is named prime minister to confer with President Carter on Middle East peace proposals.

Begin, whose rightist Likud bloc ended the Labor party's 29-year domination of Israeli politics in Tuesday's election, also said the forthcoming change of government would not curtail peace efforts because "the entire nation craves

Begin's victory brought angry Arab reaction. The official Damascus radio said Begin's win means "the area is heading towards war," because the rightist leader "refuses the idea of a Palestinian state and rejects any withdrawal from oc-cupied Arab territory."

The official Syrian newspaper Al Baath called Begin "an extremist and a terrorist." Begin led a Jewish underground group, the Irgun Zvai Leumi during Israel's 1948 war of independence

Begin told newsmen, "It will be a pleasure and a great honor to visit President Carter.

"We shall have many, many topics to dwell on and we shall do so as free men with a sense of responsibility for the future of our nations," he said.

Begin said the victory of his Likud bloc was "a superior act of democracy." The Likud won 41 seats in the next parliament, a gain of two compared with the 18-seat loss suffered by Labor, which will be left Aviv after the executive committee member parliament. of the Likud endorsed his appeal to all parties except the Communists to join a wide-ranging coalition.

'We have only a few weeks to deal with this problem," he said, calling for the installation of a new government by June 13, as required by law.

Labor party leaders said it was unlikely they would join Begin's proposed coalition, but Likud sources said they expected to put together a government representing at least 70

Begin spoke with reporters in Tel votes, a clear majority in the 120-

The extent of Labor's unprecedented defeat came as a surprise to Likud politicians as well as almost everybody else in a country that has seen no other party in con-

trol since Israel was founded in 1948. Politicians and newspaper editorials agreed the Likud victory was due as much to the 38 per cent inflation rate and a series of strikes as well as to the readiness of Labor to give up occupied Arab land in

## Begin is described as honest, truthful

The upset victory of Mehahem Begin's right-wing Likud bloc in Israel today brought a favorable reaction from Manchester resident Michael Dworkin, who had a personal interview with Begin nearly four years ago in Israel.

The Herald printed a report of that

Dworkin said he believes the changeover in leadership will be for the "betterment of the whole country." He thinks the Israeli people will welcome Begin's leadership.

Dworkin called Begin a "very honest and truthful man" who has the "greatest respect" of the people of Israel. Dworkin said Begin is not hawkish and believes in having a true peace, but his approach is hard line.

Begin's style is to "negotiate with a very strong hand and without fear.' Dworkin said he believes the Arabs have more respect for this kind of approach. He said Begin "understands the Arab mind.

Dworkin said he thinks the people of Isreal are realizing that this is the type of approach which will have to used for a lasting peace. "All these years of compromise made them realize "accommodation was not the only way for peace.'

Begin does not believe in bowing down to anyone, Dworkin said. Dworkin thinks the future of the Mideast looks much better now than before.

Dworkin said he believes there will be more freedom of the press in Israel under Begin, resulting in a more open government. He said the press had always been censored by the government of Israel.

As far as the economy of Israel, Dworkin said, Begin believes in the free enterprise system. He believes overnment should keep out business, which Dworkin said will be better for the economy of Israel.

As far as Begin's ability to form a national unity government, Dworkin said, Begin is used to compromising as leader of the opposition parties for

Housing officials study Spencer St. project bids

A Killingly contractor is the ap-parent low bidder for construction of the Manchester Housing Authority's (MHA) 40-unit elderly housing project on Spencer St. Keenan & Navarro Builders, Inc. submitted a price of \$682,000 for the work, the lowest of the five bids opened

Tuesday afternoon. David Deakin, deputy commissioner of the Department of Com-munity Affairs (DCA), predicted at the bid opening that a contract should be signed within ten days. The MHA meets tonight at 7:30 and is expected to accept the Keenan & Navarro bid. The firm bid \$597,000 for the

project's basic construction and \$85,-000 for other work --primarily road construction -that is also needed for the housing project. The firm also bid \$6,500 for one alternate item, a community room fireplace.

The entire bid fireplace option, is \$48,500 more than the \$640,000 DCA grant for the project.

The Town Board of Directors voted earlier this year to fund any overrun costs involved in the project. This will probably include the \$48,500, plus other expenses such as administrative costs and architectural

The funding will come from various sources. The town has already set aside federal Community Development and Revenue Sharing funds to cover overrun costs.

Those persons attending the Tuesday bid opening seemed pleased with the results.

"It appears they (the MHA) have gotten good bids," Deakin said. He said that his office will now wait for formal notice from the town of its intention to fund additional cost, a notification he called "merely a for-

The town has already sent a letter expressing its intentions, but DCA also needs a copy of the minutes from the Board of Directors meeting when the vote was taken.

Deakin said, "I don't see any reason why we can't sign a contract in a week to ten days.

He said that the groundbreaking could take place immediately after the contract-signing. The entire project will take about eight months once construction begins, he said.

The total estimated cost for the 40unit project, including land purchase is about \$950,000.

Edmond Fidrych, DCA's housing program specialist, said of the bids, 'I'm pleased. It looks like we're going to get the project under way.'

Pascal Mastrangelo, chairman of the MHA, also said that the bid prices were about what the authority had expected.

John Navarro, of Keenan & Navarro, said, "We're in a position to start as soon as we get the O.K." He said that his firm has built eight elderly housing projects in the state, including work in Stafford Springs, Putnam and Preston.

It has taken over three years to develop the Spencer St. project. The Town Board of Directors approved the site at its Jan 15, 1974 meeting.

HARTFORD (UPI) - Once lawmakers approve the budget, they will barely have time to catch a breath before being hit with a nonstop stream of major bills that must be handled within the next three weeks.

Although lawmakers hope to complete work on the \$1.9 billion budget today, they still have to deal with several major pieces of legislation before the constitutionally-mandated June 8 adjournment date.

The major bills that will have to be acted on include:

- Liquor pricing laws. Both the House of Representatives and Senate have passed bills to eliminate the state's so-called fair trade laws that allow liquor manufacturers to set the House and Senate.

shelf prices in Connecticut. But the House must still approve changes made by the Senate.

- The "bottle bill." The measure to ban throwaway beverage containers was approved by both the House and Senate but in different forms. A petition has brought the House measure to the floor of the Senate, which will have to adopt it and send it back to the House.

 Government Reorganization. The plan to consolidate more than 200 state boards, agencies and commissions into 21 departments has been approved by a legislative committee, but still must be passed by

Ethics legislation. Comprenensive plans to set a new ethics code for state officials, legislators and lobbyist almost died because of a parlimentary technicality, but was rescued by petition. It must still be approved by both chambers.

"Blue laws." Legislation to reinstate the traditional restrictions on Sunday commerce, struck down by the courts last year, still has not gone before either the House or Senate. The legislation's future is doubtful

- "Quits and fires." Bills that would eliminate unemployment benefits for persons who quit their jobs or get fired have passed the

Senate, but still must go through the House. Gov. Ella T. Grasso has refused to say if she will sign the bills if they reach her desk.

- Education Equalization. A measure to double the state's grant to public schools has yet to be acted on by either house, although money for it is in the budget. The bill is an attempt to give students in poorer communities the same educational opportunity afforded pupils in

- Higher Education. A bill to revamp the state's system of administering higher education awaits action by both the Senate and the

Though a civilian, he flew in the Pacific Combat Theater to help American pilots refine their operating techniques.

Lindbergh helped bring the jet age to commercial air travel, as technical adviser in the airline industry. And he saw the space

An obscure professor named Robert Goddard, years before he became known as the father of American rocketry, theorized that rockets could fly to the moon. Lindbergh was one of the few who took him seriously. He went to a foundation and gained financial support for Goddard's experi-

acceleration to advances in avia-Goddard never lived to see rockets send men to the moon. But Lindbergh did.







Key Lime Pie

Many recipes have been passed around for the sweet and tangy Key Lime Pie, but this version by Ken Willis pastry chef at the Sonesta Hotel, is probably the easiest

The filling is comprised of only three ingredients which are blended together in a matter of seconds. Total preparation to include the crumb crust and the topping will take only a few minutes, yet the end result of flavor and firm, creamy texture give the appearance of a complicated, fussed-over dessert

Averaging four Key Lime Pies each day, Willis uses a firm whipped cream topping, reserving the egg whites from the filling for his many other recipes. He suggests, however, that the Key Lime Pie is equally appealing with a meringue topping, and especially impressive if all five egg whites are used.

Key Lime Pie 114 cups graham cracker crumbs 1/3 cup butter or margarine

11/2 cans (14 oz. size) condensed milk

2/3 cups lime juice (fresh limes are preferable)

Few drops of green food coloring Melt butter and mix thoroughly with graham cracker crumbs. Press firmly on the bottom and sides of 8-inch by

9-inch pie pan. Separate egg yolks and set aside whites. Beat egg yolks ightly with fork and add condensed milk. Add lime juice and stir to blend evenly. Pour filling into crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. Cool complete

ly and garnish with whipped cream. Optional method using meringue topping: 5 egg whites

3 tbls. sugar Dash cream of tartar

#### Arrowheads

The collection of Indian arrowheads and spear points currenty on display at the museum was given by Dr. Constantine Zariphes, a Manchester resident. The display represents a wide variety of sizes and shapes as well as materials and

Hunting was the dominant means of obtaining a livelihood in seven out of seventeen Indian culture areas of North America. These hunting areas covered at least half the total area of the continent, encompassing most of Canada and Alaska and the middle United States. In addition, hunting of wild game was practiced to some degree in almost all other areas of North America, even where farming supplied 80 per cent or more of the

Although land hunting methods varied from location to location, the bow and arrow was probably the universally most popular weapon. The thrusting lance was also very popular, while the spear-thrower was apparently used more by those Indians living in the far northern and extreme southern regions.

Each of these weapons consisted of a shaft and striking end, called an arrowhead or spear point depending upon the type of weapon to which it was attached. This striking end was usually separate from the shaft, either pointed for pentration or wedge-shaped and sometimes equipped with barbs to make

Before white men made iron available, almost any material that was sharp or could be sharpened, including stone, horn, bone, shell, slate and copper, was used for point construction. In New England, chert, flint and other quartz minerals were often used. These materials flaked uniformly when chipped with a rock or horn or bone chipping tool and although the process was a slow one the end product was accurately and

The size of the arrowhead varied according to its use, with the smaller points most appropriate for hunting birds and small animals and the cut to a point or kept blunt for bird
