HARTFORD - A bill establishing a new code of ethics for Connecticut state officials has been approved by the House and sent to Gov. Ella T. Grasso. It is proposed, but it is tougher than the existing code.

HARTFORD - A special committee, composed of four members from each legislative chamber, will wrestle with the sensitive issue of dividing up the state's \$20 million education grant

HARTFORD - The Connecticut Senate has given final legislative approval to a bill that would force able-bodied welfare recipients to work on community projects. The plan was a rider to a bill that would hike welfare benefits 10 per

HARTFORD - The future of Chief State's Attorney Joseph T. Gormley remains in doubt as Connecticut's top judges delayed until July 1 a decision whether to reappoint him. However, Robert Hurney, Middlesex County prosecutor, will not get another term. Dr. Marcus declined to add recommendations to his report, so board members could stay objective while studying it.

After Dr. Marcus presented his report, Mrs. Jean McEvers, president of the East Hartford Education Association, urged the board to postpone consideration of the layoff plans until fall. She said teachers don't feel staff reduction is necessary at this
