Shoe pact praised

AUGUSTA, Main (UPI) - Taiwan's action Tuesday in signing an agreement limiting its shoe exports into this country has been hailed by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, as a first step to help the nation's shoe industry. The agreements are designed to limit importation of the cheapest footwear, and free a portion of that market for American manufacturers. Korea is expected to sign a similar pact within a week, Muskie said in a statement from Washington

Muskie called the agreements "a good first step, and particularly significant because they represent our government's first good faith attempt to help the U.S.

The orderly marketing agreements were negotiated at arter, who rejected a proposa to impose a system of tariffs and quotas on shoe imports. Muskie called it "crucial" that the agreements are watched carefully to assure proper implementation and to "make sure that other nations which produce shoes do not try to move into the market freed by these

Muskie said the U.S. shoe industry has suffered from years of neglect by the government, but "now it appears a beginning has been made. We should make certain that we build on this beginning."



Butterflies

It's a pleasure on a warm, sunny summer afternoon to sit back and watch the colorful butterflies flitting across the yard. These creatures with their quick movements and flashing color have long fascinated persons of all ages.

Butterflies are day-flying insects of order Lepidoptera, a name derived from the Greek words lepidos for scales and ptera for wings. There are approximately 120,000 species of butterflies worldwide, 10,000 of which are found in North America.

As is true of all insects, butterflies have three main body segments; i.e., head, thorax and abdomen, three pairs of jointed legs and one pair of antennae. Most have two pairs of

Only butterflies have scaled wings. These scales are nearly uniform in shape and almost completely cover the wings in overlapping rows. When handled, the scales rub off as colored

Butterflies vary in size, shape and coloration. The smallest is the Zizula gaika of India, which has a wing span of little more than one-half inch while the largest, the tropical female bird-wing butterfly, Rapilio alexandrae, posses a wing expanse of ten in-

Although some butterflies, for example the satyrs and cabbages, lack vivid coloration and patterns, others such as swallowtails, monarchs and admirals offer the observer bright colors and intricate patterns. Some tropical species such as Morpho menelaus and Urania fulgens are fluorescent blue and

All butterflies feed upon nector and pollen as adults. Each has a long proboscis, or tongue, that is coiled much like a watch spring. When needed for sipping nector from inside a flower, the proboscis quickly unwinds, sometimes matching the in-

sect's body in length. Butterflies develop by complete metamorphosis characterized by four distinct stages; i.e., egg, larva, pupa and adult. The eggs vary greatly in size and shape, ranging from smooth and spherical to flat and ribbed. The eggs may be laid singly, in small clusters or in one egg mass, either randomly or in a definite pattern. Eggs laid during the summer usually have a thin coat. while those that pass the winter have a thicker coat for protection. Most

eggs hatch in a few days. The larva, or caterpillar, hatches from the egg and immediately begins consuming food. It feeds actively until it reaches the pupal stage which takes anywhere from a week to several months

Vermont constable brings new life into an old job

By ROD CLARKE ARLINGTON, Vt. (UPI) — With his trim mustache, husky build and Smokey the Bear hat, Charles Farrell looks like a cross between TV detective Frank Cannon and the

And, like them, he enforces the

But there the similarity ends. Farrell, the constable in the small southwestern Vermont town of Arlington, has breathed new life into a job often considered an anachronism in these days of SWAT teams and computers.

Cuts delingency

He has done it by dispensing a brand of "home-grown justice" he says has cut the juvenile delinquency rate in town at a time when juvenile crime elsewhere in the country is soaring.

Three years ago, Farrell tried out a new approach in dealing with young criminal offenders.

Instead of ordering them into court to face the stigma of a criminal record, he began giving them a chance to work off the punishment byperforming community service. Work out punishment

"We shovel snow, rake leaves, pick up cans and bottles, clean the roads," Farrell says.

'The kids appreciate it, and the word has gotten around that if you're caught, you're going to work.'

The system has two-fold benefits, Farrell maintains. First, he says, it gives a young offender a "second chance" - an opportunity to escape having a criminal

Swift and sure

And, it assures would-be offenders that their punishment will be swift and sure.

"The court system hasn't always worked in that regard," said Farrell, noting juveniles are often stigmatized with a criminal record, and yet walk away without actually

being punished. "I don't think court does anyone any good."

According to Farrell, the program hasn't resulted in a single complaint. "All the proper procedures are followed. Everyone's rights are

protected." Moreover, he says, the parents of many of the youngsters he has picked up later called to thank When a juvenile is arrested, Farrell reads him the mandatory

> He admits the plan would not work with seasoned criminals but has nearly a 100 per cent success rate

with first offenders. "There's never been anything but good come of this," he says. "Not only hasn't there been an in-

crease (in juvenile crime), if anything, it's contributed to a decrease.

No stranger to law

Farrell, now 46, was no stranger to law enforcement when he was elected 1st Constable. Before he moved here 12 years ago, he was a police officer in Great Neck, Long Island, N.Y.

Farrell admits his juvenile program wouldn't work in larger communities with established police departments.

Its very strength, he says, lies in the fact that he knows everyone in the community, and they know him.

Farrell says that close relationship coupled with the fact that the constable is "the only law enforcement officer who is elected" - instills public confidence and discourages abuse of office.

"Each year, he (the constable) has to stand the test of the people," he







Educators must act on appeal

Vernon

The Vernon Board of Education will have to decide Monday, whether it will challenge a state ruling con-

cerning special education costs.

The Vernon board has a policy which limits certain special educa-tion payments and State Education Commissioner Mark R. Shedd ruled he policy illegal. His ruling was upneld by the state Board of Education

The local policy was adopted a year ago. It calls for limiting tuition payments for students placed out of he system by non-town agencies for other than educational reasons. The local board limited these payments

In a letter to Vernon school officials, Shedd said the state board still believes that the position taken by the Vernon board, in regards to he full payment of education costs "for the child in question," is im-

The state board reasons that since local school officials agree that the student needs special education and that the placement is suitable, then the board should pay the entire cost. Shedd cautioned, "In effect, the action taken by the Vernon board may result in the child's exclusion or exemption from school privileges without the statutory approval, and

contrary to law." He contends that the local board East Hartford should, if it disputes the cost of the outside school, review it with the

The difference of what Vernon has agreed to pay and the total cost for the student in question would be \$6.-000 or \$7,000 for the current school
