Avis stock fight moves into federal courts

HARTFORD (UPI) — The battle for stock of Avis Inc. enters a federal district court in Hartford today with three bidding companies, a court-appointed trustee and directors of the rent-a-car company each hoping for at least partial victory. District Court Judge M. Joseph Blumenfeld was considering an application by trustee Richard Joyce Smith for an order to sell 3.7 million shares of Avis to Norton Simon Inc. of New York for \$20.25 a share. Smith holds the shares, representing 47 per cent of Avis, for International Telephone and Telegraph Corp., which is selling the stock as part of a 1974 divestiture agreement with the U.S. Justice Department. Smith's application to accept the Norton Simon bid is complicated by two competing bids, as well as a request by the Avis board of directors asking the court for a delay in the sale of the trustee's shares. 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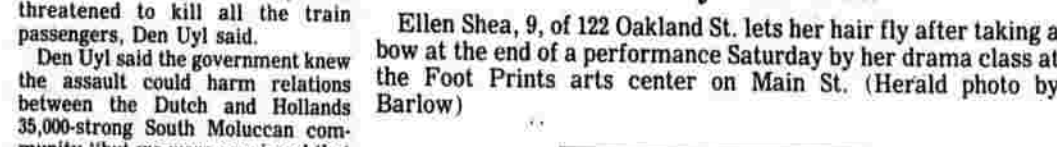

She thinks nation ready for first woman president

GREENBRAE, Calif. (UPI) — At 82, India Edwards, once the top woman in the Democratic Party, thinks the right time may be soon for the nation's first woman president. "Maybe I am wrong, but I could well be that the first black to be president will also be a woman — Rep. Barbara Jordan of Texas," Mrs. Edwards says. "I would gladly work for her." If President Ford had picked Anne Armstrong (then ambassador to Britain) as his vice presidential running mate instead of Sen. Robert Dole, Ford might have beaten Jimmy Carter. Mrs. Edwards knows politics and knows women. On Thursday her birthday will be celebrated in Washington at a gathering of oldtimers at the Women's National Democratic Club on the occasion of the release of her book, "Pull No Punches." Once she told Harry Truman that someday she might write her memoirs, and Truman said, "Good, and pull no punches."

Moluccans mourn six terrorists

ASSEN, The Netherlands (UPI) — South Moluccans mourned their six dead terrorists at religious rites Tuesday, then buried them in a common grave near the site where they had held 51 Dutch hostages on a hijacked train for 19 days. Metal barricades cordoned off the mile-long funeral cortege route from Assen's South Moluccan Evangelical church to Boskamp cemetery. Police kept close watch on the procession of six hearses followed by several cars carrying relatives. An estimated 3,000 Moluccans walked behind the vehicles. Several buses transporting elderly or lame Moluccans brought up the rear. Johan Manusama, "president" of the self-styled South Moluccan republic in exile and Mrs. Josina Soumouk, one of the two South Moluccan intermediaries who tried to negotiate a peaceful end to the train siege, made graveside speeches. In The Hague, Premier Joop Den Uyl told parliament the government decided to have troops rescue the hostages following a message by the intermediaries brought from the train Friday. The message had said, "There are only two things on our mind — our departure abroad or death," and threatened to kill all the train passengers, Den Uyl said. Den Uyl said the government knew the assault could harm relations between the Dutch and Holland's 35,000-strong South Moluccan community "but we were convinced that failure to act would have had even graver consequences." Police reinforcements were called out to head off possible violence at the burial ceremonies.

Diplomatic impunity galls average citizen

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Nothing is quite so galling to the average citizen as the sporadic but recurring evidence that the scales of justice in our imperfect democracy are not evenly weighted in favor of the rich and powerful.
We chafe at the spectacle of millionaires who pay not a penny of income tax. We seethe at the sight of an unrepentant Richard Nixon profiting from his crimes.

Many astonished But even the most cynical Americans would probably be astonished to learn that thousands of people in this country can literally get away with murder — not because they are above the law, but because they are beyond its reach.
In Washington and New York alone, more than 20,000 men, women and children connected with diplomatic missions from other nations enjoy absolute and total immunity from U.S. civil and criminal prosecution as a result of an antiquated 1790 law that Congress and the Carter administration are now working to change.

That's style, of course. But Thompson also has substance. He came out for a balanced budget and for government reorganization. He came out against new taxes. He is an advocate of what Gov. Pat Lucey of Wisconsin called about "younger blood" in the party. Anderson was courteous. He said there were "fine men in the statehouse, in the U.S. Senate and in the House as well."

Black immunity

The present blanket immunity, which extends from ambassadors to the lowliest household servants of embassy personnel, can have tragic consequences for Americans unfortunate enough to become entangled with diplomats shielded from legal action.
Three years ago, for example, a prominent Washington physician was permanently paralyzed from the neck down as a result of a traffic accident in which her car was rear-ended by an auto driven by a cultural attaché for the Panamanian Embassy.

Protection needed Under some circumstances, Americans injured by these individuals can sue the foreign embassies which employ them. Congress and the administration are now searching for some mechanism to guarantee compensation for the remaining handful of potential victims.
Sen. Charles McC. Mathias Jr., R-Md., Rep. Joseph L. Misher, D-Va., and Rep. Steven J. Solari, D-N.Y., who sponsored legislation to clean up the diplomatic immunity mess, deserve considerable credit for their concern. So does the administration.

Reporter describes effects of undergoing hypnosis

By KEN CAFARELLI BOSTON (UPI) — My hand hung limply about a foot above the arm of the easy chair, apparently floating of its own accord. I couldn't decide. Had I been hypnotized or not?
There had been none of the ritual I had been conditioned by countless books and television programs to expect — no gold watch dangling from a chain, no blinking lights, no loss of consciousness.

"Hypnosis is a process which enables a person to perceive reality in an altered way," said Frankel. "The track record in the treatment of alcoholism or drug addiction is very dismal," he said.
Nor can hypnosis be used to enable a person to do something he would not normally be able to do anyway.
"Hypnosis does not help you transcend your limits. It does not give you a new skill," said Frankel, who was recently elected president of the International Society of Hypnosis.

The lighter side: Up the down escalator

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Increasingly late, members of Congress have been accusing the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of nipping.
On lawyer went so far as to make public a list of occupational hazards he said OSHA had found in congressional offices.
The list included a suggestion that certain desk workers wear hard hats lest they get banged in the head by file cabinet drawers.
OSHA, however, denied making any such inspection and complained that the list was a giggling attempt to embarrass the agency.
It is difficult for a layman to tell where giggling leaves off and nipping begins. But authentic or not, the list has served to make those of us who work around the Capitol much

more conscious of the perils that lurk about us.
Following are a few of the dangerous conditions I have observed and corrective action that might be taken to meet safety standards:
HAZARD — Correspondents covering the proceedings in the U.S. Senate sit at long counters on round, backless stools, the type of furnishings known as Truck Stop Renaissance.
During a speech by, say, Senator Jackson, two reporters sitting side by side could easily become drowsy, simultaneously begin to nod to port or starboard, and bump their heads together, causing minor concussions.
REMEDY — Stools in the congressional press galleries should be equipped with lap and shoulder straps that would keep the occupants in upright positions during soporific oratory.
At the least, occupants should be required to wear crash helmets.
HAZARD — Several escalators in the House office buildings are inadequately marked, raising a risk that someone headed downstairs will mount an "up" escalator by mistake. Or vice versa.
Some of these escalators are in little-used stairwells, so that anyone making such a mistake might be stuck there for hours before being rescued.
REMEDY — Redesign the escalators so they will operate bidirectionally, like elevators. Or equip each escalator with an emergency telephone. Or, following the precedent of having operators on duty in automatic elevators, hire a crew of escalator operators.

Ole Man River mighty slow

SWANVILLE, Minn. (UPI) — A bottle, with a note in it, tossed into the Mississippi River was found 15 miles upstream 29 years later.
Joel Getz, 12, of Eagan, recently found the bottle while visiting relatives near Swanville.
The corked medicine bottle was thrown into the river by Shirley Barnes of Long Prairie on June 1, 1938. Miss Barnes was 11 at the time. Now she is Shirley Bartlett, a retired teacher, of Gold Beach, Ore.
Joel found it near the bank of the Swan River, a Mississippi tributary which runs through his

grandparents farm.
Mrs. Bartlett said she doesn't remember exactly when she threw the bottle into the Mississippi, but thinks it was during a class trip to Little Falls. Her parents still live in Long Prairie.
The note in the bottle said: "Whoever finds this bottle, please write to Miss Shirley Barnes, Route 3, Long Prairie, Minnesota, and tell me about yourself and I shall return a letter and we may start a life-long acquaintance and correspondence."
Joel hasn't written to Mrs. Bartlett but says he will.

SST ban reimposed

NEW YORK (UPI) — The U.S. 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals Tuesday reversed a lower court ruling and reimposed a Port Authority ban on Concord SST operations at Kennedy Airport.
In maintaining the ban, the three-judge court sent the case back to U.S. District Court Judge Milton Pollack for hearings to determine the reasonableness of the 13-month ban.
In the decision written by Chief Judge Irving E. Kaufman, the court said: "In the event that the evidence does not support a finding of unreasonable delay, we nevertheless believe it is in the interest of all concerned that this interminable strife be brought to an end."
The appellate bench urged the Port Authority "to conclude its study and fix reasonable noise standards with dispatch."
In his ruling in May lifting the ban, Judge Pollack said that the Port Authority ban, imposed in March 1976, was illegal because it conflicted with federal supremacy in the matter.

Coffee crop improves

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Coffee drinkers can expect increased supplies on the heels of a sharp recovery in world production this season, but the 1977-78 crop will remain 9 per cent below average, the Agriculture Department reported Tuesday.
The department made no prediction on future prices, but increased supplies appeared to offer hope for relief for consumers.
Wholesale and retail coffee prices are still rising, with the wholesale average reaching a record \$3.96 a pound in May compared with \$3.96 a year earlier.
The department's Foreign Agricultural Service, in its first estimate of the 1977-78 crop, forecast production at 70.4 million bags.
That's up 14 per cent from the small, 61.5 million-bag 1976-77 crop which was cut by a freeze in Brazil and sent prices soaring to record levels.

Explosive noise means George is playing

EAST LONGMEADOW, Mass. (UPI) — A loud whistle followed by an explosion echoes from George Ditomassi's office. The Milton Bradley Co. vice president is playing with one of the new games again.

Ditomassi claims the firm's newest games — two nonvideo electronic games — are the "once in a lifetime" variety and should start a major change in game manufacturing worldwide.

The games — Comp IV and Electronic Battleship — aren't on store shelves yet, but Ditomassi says consumers will soon be able to purchase the games and "buy their own minicomputers."

Electronic age

"Games have all generally been the same kinds of games for years. But now, in the age of electronics, a lot of excitement is being generated — initially by video games, and a lot of the old concepts are no longer true. The mother no longer makes purchases of games without family consultation like she did before 1975 because of the price of video games," he says.

"So now the age of electronics — the age of the minicomputer — is here in toys and games," Ditomassi says. "And the concepts of the video games can also be used in nonvideo games."

He says the Comp IV game, a small pocket calculator shaped device, "is actually a small computer" that randomly selects three, four or five digit combinations, and players then try to find the numbers in sequence.

Many possibilities

Ditomassi says the game has about 700, three-digit possibilities; 3,000 four-digit combinations, and 37,000 five-digit numbers. Players can compete against each other by entering a specific number or can compete against the computer.

"This allows you to challenge a computer and it's a very competitive type of thing alone or in a group. And there's a certain mystique about putting a computer in somebody's house," he says.

"We began to watch very closely

what was happening in video games because \$50-\$150 purchases were being made by consumers who probably would have spent that money — or a good portion of it — on games or toys," Ditomassi says.

Play value is secret

"Good play value is the secret of a game. You want people to go back and play it time after time. There's no way you can put a value on that kind of entertainment.

"But we found that the video games were very simple and had very little replay value. They can be mastered in three or four months and probably aren't played to any great degree after that."

Ditomassi says game manufacturers felt "there was a basic problem" with any game "that cost that much money and is not being used after a few months." So Milton Bradley, the world's largest manufacturer of games, set out to find a less expensive electronic game with a higher replay value.

'Lone child syndrome'

MB was also interested in the "lone child syndrome."

"There's a smaller family unit today than ever before. So we needed a game that the lone child can play and one that had repeat value," Ditomassi says.

"We're excited about what we came up with. We're an old, conservative company so it's good for us to get excited. We didn't want to force these kinds of items on the market. We waited and I think that's good, too."

The second new game is Electronic Battleship, an electrical version of the company's board game that sells one million units annually. It's played the same way, with one player trying to find and sink an opponent's fleet of ships but with the added dimension of sonar noises, missile sounds, explosions and flashing lights.

Non video game

"This is the hottest nonvideo game in the country and the hottest product we have, and it's not even on the market yet. Once a lifetime you get a response like this," Ditomassi says.

Both games, which will sell for under \$30 and are powered by nine volt batteries, were shown at a New York city toy fair in February, and Ditomassi says his phone has been ringing since with questions about them.

Comp IV will be on sale nationwide sometime in June, while Electronic Battleship will appear in seven test market cities in the fall, he says.

"So there will be two new items on the electronic market that have tremendous replay value and are not gimmicks. They're true games," he says.

"This opens a whole new category of games, and more companies will be going into it. The state of the electronic games art was so simple and undeveloped with the first generations of video games. It's much more sophisticated now."

MCC adds theater course

The program has a four-fold purpose — to prepare students for transfer to a theater major program in a four-year institution, to provide vocational skills for students interested in a theater career, to help prepare students interested in teaching, and to offer other students opportunities for theater activities as an avocation.

Theater courses are open to all full-time, part-time and special students. Students will take 20 courses to complete the curriculum and will be encouraged to participate in MCC productions.

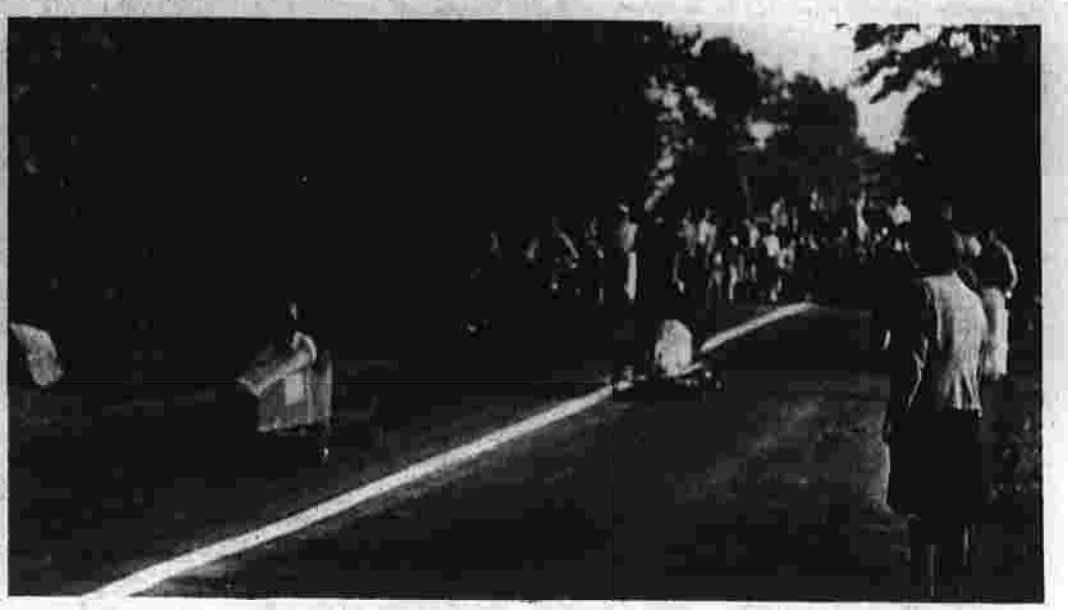

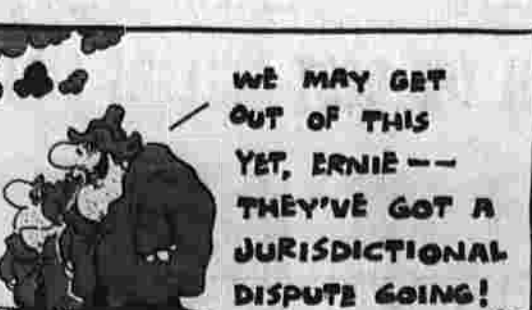

**Washington window:
Voting and cheating**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A visitor from Chicago was talking recently about the reaction in his town to the Carter administration's proposal to permit voters to register at the polls on election day.
"They'll have busloads of people going from precinct to precinct voting all day long," he said. He said "even" the city Democratic machine's own people were appalled at the opportunities for fraud presented by the administration proposal.
"Vote often and early"
His argument was that election day registration would make it easier for crooked politicians to steal elections by sending out platoons of volunteers and hirelings to "vote early and often."
Apparently, it did not occur to the visitor that there might be another way to deal with the problem of ballot box stuffing. Chicago could crack down on dishonest election practices. Easy to say and hard to do, perhaps, but other cities where election fraud was once common have done it.
For example, one simple expedient was recently suggested by Mark Green, director of Ralph Nader's Congress Watch project. He proposed adopting a system used in India — requiring election day registrants to dip a finger into a bottle of invisible ink that shows up under a special light. It takes several days of scrubbing to eradicate the ink, so no one could vote twice on the same day without being detected.

Someone would find a solvent
Naturally, someone probably could find a quick solvent for the indelible ink used to mark new voters and still try to beat the system. It is possible that the only foolproof way to end election fraud would be to end elections.
Which leads back to the point of the election day registration proposal.
Its purpose is to get more eligible citizens to vote. Surveys repeatedly have indicated that more Americans would vote if they did not have to register in advance of election day. This data was supported in several states where election day registration was in force last year.
The question raised by the Chicago visitor is whether the risk — he would say the assurance — of more fraud than now exists outweighs the advantages of increasing voter turnout, which will fall below 50 per cent in the United States soon unless the current trend is reversed.

Variations or reasoning
If Congress accepts the argument that the registration plan is impractical because of the fraud threat, some interesting variations on the same reasoning might be cited.
For example, the national 55 mile per hour highway speed limit was imposed in an effort to reduce the amount of gasoline that is wasted by driving at higher speeds. Some gas is being saved by drivers who have cut back their speed. (So are some lives, but that, amazingly, seems to be a side issue.)
But the 55 limit is being violated, perhaps more widely than the 55 and higher limits of the past. Does that mean speed limits should be abolished or that the goal of gasoline conservation is impractical?
This same kind of question can be asked in many other areas where laws attempt to improve society. Does the existence of some evil makes it impossible to achieve some good?

JFK Jr. to take part in island survival test

HURRICANE ISLAND, Maine (UPI) — John F. Kennedy Jr. will spend three days alone this summer on a small island with no food and only one gallon of water, one book for every meal and a Euell Gibbons book on edible wild plants.
The late President's 16-year-old son — whom many still remember as the tyke saluting his father's funeral procession in 1963 — has signed on for the 26-day Outward Bound summer wilderness survival course in Penobscot Bay.
"He will be spending most of his time on the water sailing in a 30-foot open pulling boat," which must be rowed, school development director Pen Williamson said. "This will be his floating classroom for most of the course."
Williamson said the goals of the unique program on the rock-ledge Hurricane Island of Rockland are to boost self confidence and instill an awareness of other people by personally challenging the students.
Williamson said the program also calls for rock climbing and working at least three days on the island's boat rescue station. He said the students manning the sta-

tion often assist the Coast Guard when boaters run into trouble.
"The three-day solo is the only part of the program where survival means anything at all," Williamson said.
"During the 72 hours they are placed on the island, the students are given no food, one gallon of water, a couple pots for cooking, one match for every meal and a book Euell Gibbons wrote for Outward Bound about 10 years ago.
"Besides providing a survival test, the three days alone are just as important as a period of contemplation," Williamson said.
"Most of the students who come to Outward Bound have never spent that long of a time completely alone. We think it is a valuable experience to have," he said.
Williamson said the highlight of the program is a four day cruise along the coast of Maine. He said the students determine what the objectives of the trip should be and do all of the navigating, sailing and rowing.
When the students return from the sailing trip they have one last personal challenge to meet, Williamson said — a six-mile marathon run.

Suit seeks \$3 million

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — A Massachusetts man injured in 1972 when an American Airlines DC-10 was forced to land after a rear cargo hatch blew out, has filed suit seeking \$3 million in damages from the airline and two aerospace firms, McDonnell Douglas and General Dynamics.
J. Kenneth Wylie of Wilbraham, Mass., said he suffered great pain because of the incident and has developed a tear of tiring which forced him to give up his job with an insurance company — a job that had required frequent flying.
In his suit filed in U.S. District Court Wylie said the aircraft was "defective, negligent and improper" in its design and manufacture. Wylie said the skill of the pilot enabled the plane to land safely.

Dad is king on Father's Day, and somehow, through the years when thoughts of food and dad come together, the menu usually includes steak.



King Dad Steak

"King Dad Steak" as it is called, is sherry-marinated top round steak, broiled to perfection. The recipe was specially developed in the test kitchens of the National Live Stock and Meat Board. They estimate that more than 73 million pounds of beef will be served on Father's Day.

1 beef top round steak, cut 1 to 1 1/2 inches thick
1/2 cup sherry
1/2 cup soy sauce
1/2 cup salad oil
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 1/2 tsp brown sugar
2 tsp ginger
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 tsp hot sauce
4 tps. cornstarch
1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
1/2 cup sliced green onions
Mix together sherry, soy sauce, oil, lemon juice, brown sugar, ginger, garlic and hot sauce in small saucepan. Cook slowly 10 minutes; cool. Place steak in plastic bag; add marinade and tie securely. Refrigerate 24 hours. Remove steak from marinade, reserving marinade, and place on grill over ash-covered coals or on rack in broiling pan so surface of meat is 4 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at moderate temperature to rare or medium (25 to 40 minutes, depending on doneness desired), brushing with marinade and turning occasionally. Carve in thin slices, diagonally across the saucerpan and cook slowly until grain. For sauce: Stir remaining thickened, 2 minutes. Serve sauce marinade into cornstarch in over sliced steak. 10 servings.

Growing older

"Koldifteen yaysay V'yayachol." That's Hebrew. It means, "Let all who are hungry eat (with us) and eat." We submit this as a good slogan (in any language) for the Title VII (nutrition) Program of the Older Americans Act. Thanks to the National Aeronautic and Space Administration (NASA) the program may literally become fact. No older American will ever go hungry. A dream will come true! Most of our senior citizens know about the nutrition program. It calls for one nourishing, hot meal a day for every older American. No means test is required. Nutrition centers throughout the country carry the program forward. Enter NASA. We all thrilled at the space flights. Many of us wondered, "What did the astronauts eat way above the sky?" We also wondered, "What benefits would accrue to mankind and womankind from these millions of dollars spent on space exploration?" We ask, "How does NASA increase the return on the national investment in aerospace research?" We have a report on one successful new project. It is called "Meal System for the Elderly." The pilot food-for-the-elderly program was conducted by scientists at NASA's Space Center in Houston, Tex. In cooperation with The Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs (LBSA), United Action for the Elderly (UAE), and the Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences

Food for all older Americans

(TRIMS), NASA has developed a meal system for the elderly designed to be "acceptable, nutritious, shelf-stable, convenient and easily transportable for home preparation and consumption." NASA explains the program as follows: "This pilot program is an additional service for the many elderly who cannot be reached by other meal systems. The program has particular applicability to the rural elderly who are almost entirely beyond the reach of current meal programs — either congregate or home delivered." NASA and the cooperative experts prepared 21 menus. We submit two of them as examples. MENU 12 Boned Turkey in broth sweet potatoes green beans mixed fruit chocolate milk MENU 17 Beef almondee spring vegetable soup chicken pilaf vanilla pudding chocolate milk All 21 menus are equally interesting. The meals can be sent by mail. They can be delivered to nutrition centers. They can be part of the "Meals on Wheels" program. All the elderly recipient needs to do is open the package and warm the meal. But hold your appetite. There are steps to take before we spread our napkins across our chests. Congress must amend the Older American Act to put this show on the road. They must pass Senate Bill 519 and House Bill 3003. These bills are the "National Meals on Wheels Act." They include provisions for a three-state demonstration and evaluation of the NASA meal system concept. Write your own congressman and senator. Demand that they vote for bill HROB and bill S519. Now let's get back to dreams of good food. The NASA meals were tested and tasted in Texas by seniors aged 60 to 80 over an eight-month period. The eaters approved 95 different food items which now make up the 21 menus. Nearly all of the elderly users found the food tasty and satisfying. But suppose the "Meals on Wheels" bills passed. What then? Would you know which seniors are most in need of the food program? In many states there is most in need of the proposed food program. The NASA "Meals System" tested well in Texas. It will test even better when Congress gets the results of the proposed three-state demonstration. All 50 states should be ready to handle the plan effectively.

Treatment for food mass

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have a problem with my stomach — three golf-ball-sized phytobezoars to be exact. I am not mentally ill — I hope — so have not ingested any hair or other matter. After my gastroscopy in January 1975 I ate anything that a normal person would eat. No solution to my problem is forthcoming other than surgery. I cannot survive another operation. The surgeon has said so and I know so. I'm 5 feet 7 and weigh 90 pounds. I'm a widow of 60 and live in an apartment with two cats and hold down a full time job. Do you know of any medicine I might take that would dissolve these things? Right now I'm afraid to eat, period. Puree mostly. DEAR READER — I suspect that the phytobezoars were formed from eating oranges. This problem occurs in a number of people after having an operation on the stomach — or cutting the vagus nerve to the stomach. They are masses of food fibers that are not digested. You are fortunate that these masses are in the stomach, and not obstructing the small intestine. Among the foods that cause these are oranges (but not orange juice), figs, coconuts, apples, green beans, sauerkraut, berries, potato peel and brussels sprouts. These foods should all be avoided after surgery on the stomach. The oranges may be chewed but the fibrous sacks re-fill with digestive juices and pectin to form masses. You might have the same problem with grapefruit. Those in the stomach can be broken up and washed out our water supply. We had a well drilled with a rotary drill 120 feet deep. Our pump is 10 feet from the bottom. When we boil this water the stenil gets white and chalky from the calcium in the water. We would like to know if that would have any effect on our health. DEAR READER — No. The calcium won't hurt you. Some authorities think it might help you. With such a deep well you are not likely to have contamination from surface drainage, but for most home dug wells I would recommend having the water tested for possible contamination. The well must be adequately removed from any and bacterial source such as barn yards in rural areas. Anyone who wants to have water tested could check with the nearest public water department or county health office and find out how to get this done in his community.

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Social Security

Q I work as a barber in my own shop, but when business is slow I also do some house painting. Do I need to make \$400 in each of these activities to get Social Security credit for my net earnings from them?

A No, if you are self-employed in more than one activity, take into account profits or losses from each of the activities when you figure your total net earnings. This means a net loss in one business will affect the amount of credit you may receive for the net earnings in another.

Q I understand that there are special reporting rules for ministers. Is this true?

A Yes, members of the clergy report their earnings as if they were self-employed even though they may be employed. For further information, you should call us here at the Social Security office in East Hartford.

Q Do wages in kind, such as meals or a room, count for Social Security purposes?

A Under some circumstances, but not for household work or farm work, where it becomes difficult to determine the value of wages in kind.

Q I've worked in my husband's store for a number of years and he's been deducting Social Security from my salary. Now a friend tells me that work done for your husband is not covered under Social Security. Is this true?

A Generally, work done by a wife for her husband or a husband for his wife, is not covered by Social Security. But if your husband's business is a corporation rather than a sole proprietorship, your work could be covered. Call us and we'll go over the facts with you.

Q Is it true that blind people need less work to get disability benefits?

A People disabled by blindness don't have to meet the test for recent work under Social Security. Blind people need only a quarter of coverage for each year since 1950, or they figure their 21 if later, up to the year they became blind. A minimum of 1 1/2 years of credit is needed.



Police officers are chasing an armed robbery suspect down the street when he reaches his own home and ducks inside. May they go in after him, or must they first get a warrant? The question involves the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution, which forbids "unreasonable search and seizure." Educators reject staff cut lottery

The East Hartford Board of Education said Tuesday night it doesn't want a lottery system in the policy on staff reductions.

When Jerry Ingallina made the motion to discount the lottery system, Dorothy Carey said, "I think

we should spend more time on other possible options." Jerry Marcus, assistant superintendent for personnel, and Eugene Diggs, superintendent, explained the random selection earlier in the meeting, citing its advantages and disadvantages. "Though this system seems to be the most unpopular of the teachers, it's the most objective," Marcus said. Diggs felt the random selection

system would best insure a balanced staff. However, Mrs. Carey said the disadvantages of the lottery system far outweigh the advantages. The majority of the board agree, supporting the demise of the lottery 7-1. A question was raised as to the legality of a vote taken when the board is meeting as a committee, when a second motion was offered by Joyce Ruggles. When it was determined the

motions were to give direction to the administration on forming a policy, and not actual recommendation actions, discussion continued on the Ruggles motion.

Again by a 7-1 vote, the board directed the policy be written to include tenured and nontenured teachers as one group. Board members agreed seniority should be a factor, but not necessarily the ruling factor.

Mrs. Ruggles said, "I want to keep good young people on staff." The East Hartford Education Association chief negotiator, Peter Mahler, reminded the board earlier in the meeting of a contractual clause stating "seniority shall be a factor." Diggs said he would have to go to the corporation counsel for a legal opinion after the board approved the Ruggles motion. Diggs and Marcus, who explained

the plan for staff reduction and recall during the workshop, asked the board for additional opinions on the document. "We need direction to see what you want included in the policy so we can begin to develop policy and administrative guidelines," Marcus said. The board will continue the discussion June 27 after a special finance meeting.

East Hartford debut set for a new sport — hocker

A new unisex field sport called hocker will be unveiled in East Hartford at McAuliffe Park at 7:15 tonight.

Hocker blends basketball, soccer and volleyball into a unique sport that its inventor, Judge John Henry Norton of Fairfield calls, "a game with a minimum of whistle, a maximum of hustle, and scoring ac-

tion all the way." Both Sports Illustrated and Sport Magazine are publishing stories on the new sport in the next few weeks. A half dozen national physical education and coaching journals have articles in the works. The stories say males and females can play it together. It is near injury free, though rugged. Triple-zone, double-crossbar goals add excitement, with scoring permitted from either side of the goals. It is unexcelled as a conditioner

with stress on continuous running. Its simple rules permit instant players, even those with limited athletic skills. Parks and Recreation Director Frank DeGregorio said he has confidence in hocker's future. He announced a league will be formed next fall. "It's terrific," said DeGregorio. "Kids immediately enjoy playing it. Costs are low. Its low violence will bring down insurance."

Hocker is played with a 16-inch diameter rubber ball that can be kicked, dribbled, slap-passed or butted. Nine-member teams divided among males and females can play. Judge Norton developed the game as a sport that his large family could play together. He and Mrs. Norton have five adopted Asian orphans as well as nine children, for a grand total of 14. "We field-tested it over the years," the judge said. "Now, we know it's ready for nationwide play. There's already encouraging reaction from TV stations. Before the year is out, we expect hocker to be taking off with boys and girls, young and old, novices and superstars."
