A case for tax incentives

Every time a major tax reform bill is before Congress, mail from the folks back home runs heavy. Last year, during the months preceding passage of the Tax Reform Act of 1976, correspondence was said to be two-to-one in favor of closing those notorious and much-misunderstood "loopholes" known as tax shelters.

Depending on how you look at them, tax shelters are either a method used by the wealthy to evade payment of taxes or they are a legitimate way to encourage private individuals to put their money into activities that would otherwise be financed by public funds.

Tax-free municipal bonds are a classic economic mechanism used to induce the private sector to invest in projects vital to the public's welfare. "Every time we vote for a water and sewer bond issue, we are voting for the use of a tax incentive to attract the funds needed to refurbish our water systems from private individuals," points out John J. Loughlin, vice president of an investment firm.

The broad issue, is the question of private versus government funding of public projects. And it is one touching on an number of challenges facing the nation — improvement and construction of mass transit systems, housing for the elderly and people of low income,

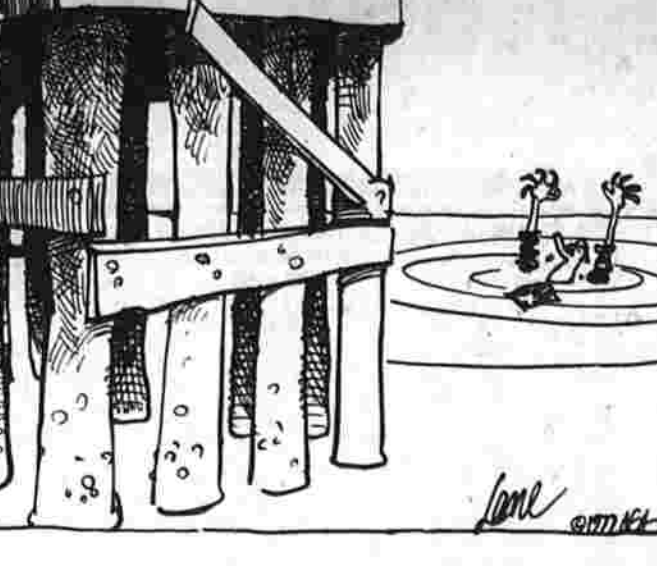
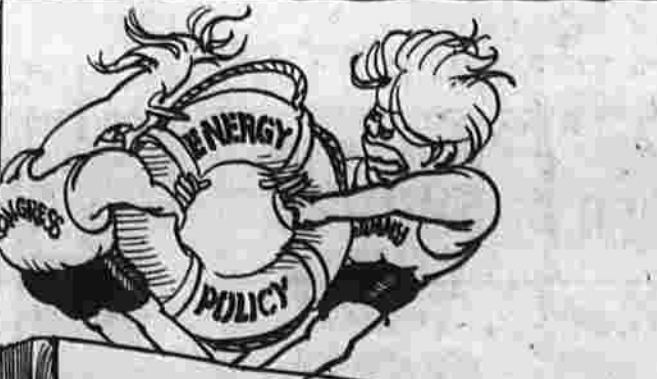
Solicits public support for MCC Day Care Center

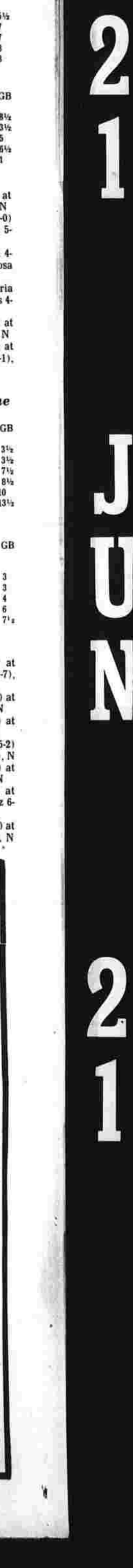
