

NOTICE TO TELEPHONE CUSTOMERS

We are planning changes in the rates for calls to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, and changes in the rates for some mainland interstate calls.

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company has filed a new schedule of rates with the Federal Communications Commission which decreases the charges for all dial-direct calls to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, and increases charges for some Long Distance calls made interstate in the continental U.S. The Company has asked that the new rate schedule for U.S. offshore points be The new rates are designed to more closely align rates for calls to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands with the current rates for all interstate Long Distance calls within the forty-eight contiguous states. The charges for some continental interstate Long Distance calls would go up effective September 13, 1977. The combined effect of the above rate actions is designed to provide approximately a zero revenue change in Bell's estimated interstate Message Telecommunications Service revenues for this phase of rate integration.

The new rate schedules and supporting data have been filed with the Federal Communications Commission. Basic charges for initial minutes for all calls within the contiguous forty-eight states remain unchanged. Additional per-minute charges will increase by one cent or less for out-of-state calls up to 431 miles. ■ In order to bring the charges for calls to Alaska and Hawaii more closely in line with the charges for similar calls made between the contiguous forty-eight states, the charges for the average call to Alaska and Hawali (based on past usage) will now be reduced by 29% and 25% respectively. ■ Charges for calls to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will be reduced as a result of restructuring and reducing the rates between the U.S. mainland and these points. Rates will be revised so that they are structured in the same way as the rates for interstate mainland calls. Charges will vary dependent upon the distance covered by the call and by the time of day and day of the week, and dependent upon whether or not the call is operator assisted. These changes in rates for calls to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will result in a decrease of about 24% in the charge for the average call based on prior usage.

New library gets council's okay

South Windsor

South Windsor library officials left Monday night's special Town Council meeting elated and one step closer to the long-awaited move from their cramped quarters on Sullivan Ave.

The Town Council unanimously agreed to apply \$436,000 in public works funds to the construction of a new library. All that is left to do is the formal approval by the federal government

The other project being considered for use of the federal funds was the new fire headquarters on Ellington Rd. Officials found, however, that the firehouse was not eligible for the grant because it was already under construction

Town Manager Paul Talbot will submit the library application by July 12. He said he sees no reason why the use of the funds for the library would be turned down.

Councilman Len Sorosiak, who led the move to use the money for the library, told more than 40 persons at the meeting, "I'm elated over what's been happening tonight. I can't believe we are this close." The council also unanimously

agreed to the larger of two sets of plans suggested by Talbot - a 15,000square foot structure, which will cost about \$831,500.

The library is now operating in 5, 000 square feet of space in the Sullivan Ave. Shopping Plaza. Library Director W. Clayton Massey

told the council the smaller structure (10,000 square feet) would not be in the best interests of the town, because it would be outgrown in five to ten years.

"In a matter of years, building costs will be higher and it will cost more to then add the additional 5,000 square feet," Massey said.

The estimated cost of the library does not include furnishing it. Massey said the present furnishings would fill about 80 per cent of the new structure and the South Windsor Friends of the Library would probably take care of the additional

Three sites were discussed, but the council agreed on building the library by the Planning and Zoning Commisclose to the Town Hall. Massey said

the Town Hall site was best because it was the natural geographic center of the town.

"This is where things will be happening in the future," Massey said. "Plus it has access from the highway to all points in town." Also suggested was a site on Sand



Scallop Appetizers

Tasty scallop appetizers

This is a good time of the year for scallops if you're a lover of that delectable variety of shellfish. And who isn't?

Most sea scallops are harvested 150 miles off shore from rugged ocean going scallop draggers. They're shucked aboard the vessel and the succulent meats are packed in muslin bags and stored in ice

Bay scallops are found in salt water inlets and bays and are much smaller than the sea scallops. They're harvested from small boats using a dredge that scrapes the muddy bottom depositing the scallops in a metal basket. The dredge is then winched aboard, or hand hauled if the fisherman is huskier than his bank account. Brought ashore, the scallops are icked, iced and sold to a whole:

thence to market. Scallops are endowed with an oversize muscle that opens and closes their shells. This action jet-propels them out of the way of such predators as the starfish. This muscle is the only part of the scallop that Americans eat. Not so in Europe, where as an appetizer.

the entire scallop is savored and the shells

are the only part discarded. For the holidays here is a scallop appetizer that has made believers out of many thousands who look to New England, and Boston particularly, as the mecca for seafoods. It's a classic at Jimmy's Harborside Restaurant, famed far and wide for its seafood dishes.

Jimmy's Scallop Appetizers 2 lbs. fresh scallops 4 tablespoons melted butter ¼ teaspoon garlic salt 4 tablespoons lemon juice 4 tablespoons dry sherry Paprika

Combine melted butter, garlic salt and lemon juice. Pour over scallops. Let stand 10 minutes. Drain, saving marinade. Arrange scallops in foil-lined shallow pan. 



East Hartford Police Monday morning arrested Glenn H. Woods Jr., 52, president of the Fairway Estates Inc., on a warrant charging him with first-degree attempted larceny by embezzlement.

Fairway Estates is a 96-lot subdivision off Scotland Rd. About 10 homes were begun on its first street Chipper Dr., last year. All construction stopped this winter due to financial troubles of the firm.

Woods allegedly wrote about \$8,700 in checks with funds from the firm's escrow deposits, police said.

He appeared in Common Pleas Court 12 Monday and was released on a \$500 surety bond for appearance

About 20 families which had been deposits of about \$2,000 each on home sites began complaining about the delays. Many asked for their money back but could not get it. They complained to police and others.

The firm's bank, Jefferson Savings and Loan of Meriden, has brought a foreclosure action. The bank holds an \$885,000 mortgage.

Other officers of Fairway are Gen-Harvey of New York and Eugene Kwessel of New Haven.

Police investigator Michael Breen said other arrests are possible. The investigation is "ongoing."

He said Woods is a senior partner in Enfield Greens Inc., a firm which holds a 50-year lease on an 18-hole golf course in Enfield. There are more than \$300,000 in liens against the Enfield firm from subcontractors. The course is about 18 months away from opening

South Church pastor is keeping the faith

East Hartford Reporter My primary role," said the pastor of South Congregational Church, "Is to help people develop their faith. 'To give them spiritual insight into life, its meaning and purpose."

The Rev. Roger S. Nicholson has been playing this role at the church for the past 20 years. He played the role as the church grew and shrunk in membership, as its members married and divorced, as its youth went off to war, and as members

He quoted an Englishman, J.B. Philips, who said, "We are put into this world to develop Christian character in preparation for a world

"I believe that's true," the Rev. Mr. Nicholson said. "There's got to church to make sure happen.'

Born in Salem

The church's pastor was born in 1928 in Salem, Mass. He grew up there, graduating from Salem Classical High School in 1945 as World War II ended.

He went to Tufts University in Boston to study chemistry and biology. He was preparing to be a doctor.

"I thought I could help people," he said, "and make a decent living. We had grown up in a Depression family - money was important."

But his real interests swayed him from that course. By graduation, he was intent on religion.

He entered Yale Divinity School in New Haven in 1949 to work for a master of divinity degree. He got it

"Another problem, young marriages are collapsing. I recently counseled people after a marriage that lasted only six months. Young ladies and men come to me today who have been married

before. Most of them are pretty cautious. They want to make sure Also, parents have had troubles in

raising their children, especially "My calling today is more problem

oriented, crisis oriented, than it was 20 years ago. I make visits today for more specific reasons. They are not just friendly visits.

"There's a draining of your energies.'

He noted many ministers are now doing just counseling. The Rev. Felix Davis of the Second Congregational Church in Manchester set up a counseling service, he said. And he has had to hire help to keep up with the demand. With an older parish now, the Rev.

Mr. Nicholson has had more funerals. "A funeral drains your energy. It has tension and emotional aspects. There is the challenge of supporting

the bereaved through." He noted that the Rev. William E. Flynn, pastor of the much older First Congregational Church on Main St., has about five times as many

funerals per year. The South Church pastor now brings new members into the church in groups as small as three. Total

'This is a commentary on people's attitudes toward churches," he said. We have got to hunt and dig to cultivate new members. This is a typical problem of mainline Protestant churches.






