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In making the disclosures Sunday, Carter's energy chief, James Schlesinger, agreed there were technical advantages to a deal in which Alaskan oil would be transported to Japan in exchange for Japanese-bought supplies from the Middle East

costs, Schlesinger said President Carter considers the idea undesircable.

"There will be no exchanges," Schlesinger said in a television interview (NBC-TV's Meet the Press). "All of the oil coming out of Alaska will have to be shipped to the United States. This will have the advantage of increasing pressure of the companies to bring pipelines from the West Coast into the interior part of the country.

Education since 1974. He confirmed this morning that he will not run for another term on the board. His present term expires in 1978, but with the staggered terms of the board, he would have been running this fall.

In his letter, Willhide cited the time constraints of his job as his main reason for not running again. "I would not be able to devote proper attention to the town directorship if I were elected," he said.

He did add, however, that he might run again in the future. Willhide expressed disappointment in not being able to run in November.

"This fall the Republicans have an excellent opportunity to win. The townspeople have had six years of giveaway operations, which have produced substantial tax increases with no tangible improvement in services," he wrote.

"We have the same old sidewalk, pothole, bad water, poor traffic flow, and sewer problems, which the op position (the Democratic party) will undoubtedly attempt to hide behind

the facade of J.C. Penney," he wrote. Willhide is the first Republican director to announce that he will not seek re-election. Minority Leader Vivian Ferguson will run again, and the third party director, Carl Zinsser, has not yet announced his plans. Zinsser said this morning that he will make an announcement within the

next two weeks. Both Mrs. Ferguson and Zinsser said that they were somewhat sur-prised by Willhide's decision.

'It was murder," one prisoner screamed at the time. But Gary Henman, an assistant to prison warden George Wilkinson, said Sunday the prisoners have recovered from the shock of the tragedy and are no onger claiming the guards "murdered" the five men. The atmosphere here is normal again," Henman said.

A handful of reporters were allowed to survey Compound G, which housed 80 men, only hours after it had the newsmen were allowed inside in part to give the inmates an opportunity to release their pent-up

Initially, they (the inmates) were very vocal because of the panic. I think the inmates said things they really didn't mean," Henman said. "It was a natural reaction Wnen you're hurt, you immediately strike out." At the time, most of the inmates claimed the fire started because of a faulty electrical connection. Since

A federal board of inquiry will question about 200 of the prison's 837 immates. The closed-door federal investigation is expected to continue for at least "a couple more days" and could take "several weeks," Henman said. He noted the tragic prison fire would not have occured four or five years ago.
"It was just concrete, bar windows and a little paint

then. Nothing that could burn," he said. "But we tried to make it a nice place to live for the prisoners with carpeting and paneling. It was the modern, attractive fire-resistant paneling

that melted during the fire and produced a toxic smoke that killed the five men and sent scores of prisoners to the 'Sometimes, you just can't win," Henman said.



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Rules for adoption relaxed for singles

HARTFORD(UPI) — Single people who wish to adopt children are finding it easier to do so in Connecticut, where past restrictios on single parenthood are being

"It's far better that they be adopted by single parents than not to be adopted at all," said one official at the state Department of Children and Youth Services. Ken Keller, DCYS program director for adoption, cited statistics showing adoptions by unmarrieds increased threefold in Connecticut last year. Eighteen single persons adopted kids last year compared with six in 1975. Although it was never illegal for single persons to adopt children, adoption agencies generally are reluctant to turn over kids to unmarried people.

"We felt that it would be best to place the children in two-parent homes," said Louise Leavenworth, coorlinator of adoption services at Child and Family Se vices, Inc., a private adoption agency in Hartford Marge McBride, a Cromwell teacher who is trying to adopt two girls, said some singles who have adopted kids were raised in single-parent households themselves.

Brook contamination apparently cleared up

A Manchester business located on the Hop River has reported substances being dumped in the water for three weeks, but the problem has not occurred this week. Carbon Products Inc., of 218 Hartford Rd., has informed health officials of the problem, but an employe at the firm said Friday that the company has not notified any foreign substances in the water this week. But, for the three previous weeks, the problem was a steady one, according to the employe. The substance resembled kerosene or gasoline and had a strong odor, the employe said.

Also, during the period, there was dye occasionally being dumped in the river brook, the employe said. Ronald Kaatz, principal sanitarian for the town Health Department, said that his department has traced at least part of the problem to a storm drain on Pine St. that empties into the Hop Brook. Kraatz said the substance traced to the storm drain

resembles a cutting or lubricating oil. But, to trace the actual source of the substance is a more difficult problem, he said. There are no records to show what might be flowing into the storm drain, he said. To find out, it actually requires someone to crawl inside the drainage system to spot the flow of the substance

"It's a dangerous situation," Kraatz said. Carbon Products Inc. said that it has also referred the matter to state health officials, although no one from the state involved in the complaint could be reached Friday.

side St. was recently approved by the town Planning and Zoning Commission. The developer has installed curbs, But, this curbing does not meet the bituminous curbing that the town has installed along the road. The land along the side of the road juts out about a foot when the town

curbing begins.

The Highway Department has put a roadblock at the side of the road to warn motorists of the problem. O'Sullivan said that the department will solve the problem permanently once construction work begins to elocate a culbert at the site. The two separate curbs will be joined together, creating a smooth curve along the

side of the road, he said. Walter Senkow, town engineer, said that he expects pids for the culvert work to be opened sometime in August. He did not have a definite date on when work a



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NEW HAVEN (UPI) - Leaders of major Vietnam peace groups blasted Congress this weekend for subverng President Carter's amnesty program. In a meeting at Yale Law School, the former anti-war

eaders expressed their distress with a bill introduced by Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif. They said Cranston's measure would "subvert" Carter's pardon authority. Under the Cranston proposal, military review boards would determine which pardoned veterans would b allowed to receive educational and medical benefits. One peace leader said the military review boards are he same ones that handle disciplinary matters. He said the bill would give them the power to be both "prosecutor and judge."

Carter has announced that special review panels should

have the power to upgrade discharges for some 450,000 veterans. The President also granted unconditional amnesty for draft resisters. Mrs. Louise Ransome, former director of the National Council for Universal and Unconditional Amnesty, said Saturday Cranston's bill was "very vindictive and dis-

"A veteran with an unfavorable discharge is 100 per cent unemployable. He may need medical help. And because he can't find work he ends up in prison," she said. "It (Cranston's bill) is an attempt to subvert the President's pardon power





Congress blasted by peace groups

NEW HAVEN (UPI) - Leaders of major Vietnam peace groups blasted Congress this weekend for subver-ting President Carter's amnesty program.

In a meeting at Yale Law School, the former anti-war

leaders expressed their distress with a bill introduced by Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif. They said Cranston's measure would "subvert" Carter's pardon authority. Under the Cranston proposal, military review boards would determine which pardoned veterans would be allowed to receive educational and medical benefits. One peace leader said the military review boards are the same ones that handle disciplinary matters. He said the bill would give them the power to be both "prosecutor and judge."
Carter has announced that special review panels should

have the power to upgrade discharges for some 450,000 veterans. The President also granted unconditional amnesty for draft resisters. Mrs. Louise Ransome, former director of the National Council for Universal and Unconditional Amnesty, said Saturday Cranston's bill was "very vindictive and dis-

"A veteran with an unfavorable discharge is 100 per cent unemployable. He may need medical help. And because he can't find work he ends up in prison," she said. "It (Cranston's bill) is an attempt to subvert the President's pardon power.


