eiss orders town budget cuts

Herald Reporter Manchester's Town Manager Robert B. Weiss, expressing fear that the proposed 1977-78 budget could result in a deficit as large as \$1 million, has asked that town department heads prepare plans to cut each

department budget by 2 1/2 per cent. In a letter to the Board of Directors. Weiss wrote, "By this notification, it is not my intent to push the panic button. I do feel, however, that early notification of a potential problem is warranted. Hopefully, the problem will not materialize, but

now is the time to develop contingency plans.

Weiss said that some fixed costs, such as insurance, will exceed budget estimates. Controller Thomas S. Moore said that insurance costs have risen \$115,000 since last year. This is about \$70,000 more than budgeted, he

Weiss also said that revenue estimates in the budget also depend on a rapid rebound in the economy and the timely construction of the J.C. Penney facility.

"If bad luck prevails in all instances, the town could face an overall budget problem of up to \$1 million in the current fiscal year," he

Half of this possible shortfall could be offset by reducing the annual Pension Fund payment to current needs only and by accruing the July 1978 Revenue Sharing payment. He called ment "an obvious stop-gap measure which is likely to result in future funding problems." He also said that the Revenue Sharing step would limit the

Director pleased with results of rehabilitation loan program

The Town of Manchester's rehabilitation loan program is entering its ninth month, and the director of the program is pleased, both with what has happened and what she expects to happen.

"I think we're doing very well. We're keeping abreast or ahead of other towns in the number of applications for the program," Director Marilyn Walsh said.

The rehabilitation loan program was started last December through funding provided by federal Community Development block-grants to the town. Using these federal monies, the loan program provides low-interest, subsidized home improvement loans to homeowners who meet financial and geographical

The program is aimed at encouraging home improvements that might not be undertaken at regular

interest rates. The program offers loans at zero to five per cent, depending on the family's income level. For instance, a family of four with an income level below \$9,625 would qualify for a nointerest loan. If the income is between \$9,625 and \$15,400, the fami-

loan, and, if the income is between qualify for a five per cent loan.

The no-interest loan is actually said. made as a direct payment to the homeowners from the program funds. Ms. Walsh said. There is no involvement with bank processing, and no monthly payments are required. The loan does not have to be paid back until the home is sold or the title is transferred

The no-interest loans, however, are only permitted for insulation or winterization work or for correcting housing code violations. Also, a person who receives such a loan must have less than \$10,000 in assets, excluding the value of the home.
