Release of letter questioned

Stephen Penny, a Democratic member of the Manchester Board of Directors, has asked that the board consider the appropriateness of a recent release of a confidential statement to the press.

The statement, a letter from the Human Relations Commission concerning the Roy Thompson case, was released to the press by Republican Director Vivian Ferguson, who consulted with fellow party Directors Paul Willhide and Carl Zinsner before providing the press with a copy.

The letter from the HRC criticized the "lack of candor" of Charles McCarthy Jr., assistant town manager, in his testimony before the commission.

Penny, in a letter to Mayor Matthew Moriarty, expressed concern that the Republican members acted independently, without consulting the entire board or seeking a release of a confidential statement to the press.

His major objection to the action is that such a release of confidential reports could shake the public's confidence in its elected officials.

"If individual members of this board determine for themselves to inform or not certain confidential informants should be publicly disclosed, then the level of confidence which the town's citizens and employees have in their elected officials' ability to keep private matters private will be seriously reduced," Penny said.

HARTFORD (UPI) — The director of Connecticut's welfare program has denied charges he's neglecting welfare fraud and says he gives top priority to investigating possible fraud cases.
State Social Services Commissioner Edward W. Maher Monday also released a report of a two-month computer check that he says has shown 1,200 of 20,000 state welfare recipients may have cheated.

Alcan pipeline talks to be started soon

OTTAWA (UPI) — Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau says negotiations between the United States and Canada will begin soon on construction of a natural gas pipeline down the Alaska highway and he is hopeful an agreement in principle can be reached within a few weeks.
The proposed pipeline would stretch 2,753 miles from Prudhoe Bay in Alaska, through Canada, to the lower 48 states.

Protestors arraigned

NEW LONDON (UPI) — Of seven antimuclear power demonstrators in black robes and gray face makeup, they said they were "death" and the "last tango" but refused to give their names.
Edward Gersh, 29, and John Bach, 30, both of Hartford were charged with resisting arrest, reckless endangerment and criminal trespass by police who said they climbed the 150-foot shipyard water tower at the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics.

Daily pollution data is now available

HARTFORD (UPI) — Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Stanley Pae says information about daily pollution levels is now available by telephone 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
The pollution, along with its index value and health label, will be given for each of the 12 monitoring sites reporting the pollutants' standards levels index in Connecticut, Pae said Monday.

4th Junior Olympics slated for Wednesday

The fourth annual Junior Olympics co-sponsored by Top Notch Foods and the Manchester Recreation Department will begin at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the West Side Oval off Cedar St. and will last to about 1:30 p.m.

Zoning, planning separate

Cummings said last month that he would make such a request. He has suggested a revision because of the recent resignation of town officials who have been involved in business matters that might have raised or did raise conflict-of-interest questions.

Cassano criticizes Ferguson stance

Stephen Cassano, a Democratic candidate for the Board of Directors, has criticized Republican Director Vivian Ferguson for her opposition to a proposal to clarify conflict of interest for Town of Manchester officials.
Democratic Town Chairman Theodore Cummings proposed that the directors establish a charter revision committee to study conflict of interest. Cummings sought the change because of the recent resignations of town officials who have been involved in business matters that might have raised or did raise conflict-of-interest questions.

Government and local business officials supported an application from a local transportation company, Dial-A-Ride of Connecticut Inc., wishing to provide taxi service in Manchester and South Windsor during a public hearing Monday before the PUCA.

Speaking in favor of the application were Alan Mason, human services director, and Susan Hebert, executive secretary of the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce. Ms. Hebert presented a list of more than 20 persons who have contacted the chamber in support of such taxi service.

The application seeks authority to operate three Checker taxicabs from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. seven days a week.

Since the East Hartford Manchester Cab ceased its operations last month, the elderly and low-income residents have experienced transportation problems. Persons also traveling from Hartford to Manchester to work by bus have missed the taxi service which would take them to their destinations.

Dial-A-Ride representatives said they wanted to charge fares comparable to those charged by Yellow Cab of Hartford. Yellow Cab has received a gasoline cost adjustment up to \$1.05 for the first sixth of a mile and Dial-A-Ride representatives said they would seek such an adjustment. They said at first that the fare would be 95 cents for the first sixth of a mile and 10 cents for each additional sixth.

A PUCA spokeswoman said there is no set time limit for a final decision on the application. The three PUCA commissioners making the final decision are Gerald McCann, Thomas Standish and David Harrigan.

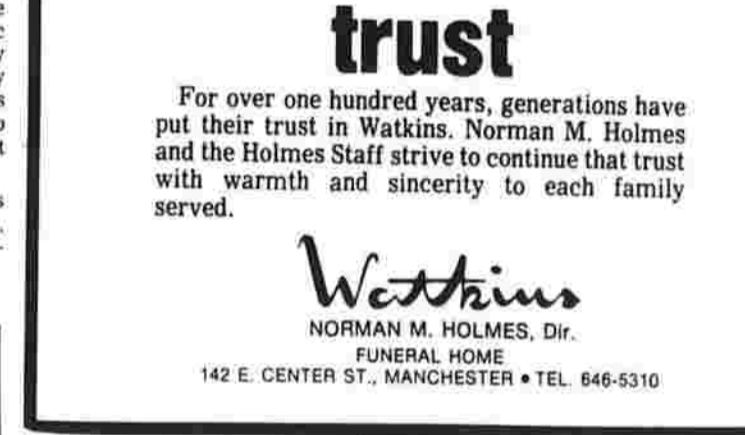

Paperwork heavy for federal grant

By MAL BARLOW

Mayor Richard Blackstone's staff is running a paperwork race to make sure the town gets all of \$3.6 million in federal public works funds aimed its way.

On Aug. 1, Congressman William Cotter told the mayor the town would get the funds through the Public Works Employment Act.

The mayor said then the town would have to make sure all the proper forms for every proposed project were ready in time. Most federal programs give towns about 30 days after a grant has been okayed to wrap up the paperwork details.

But last Friday the mayor got the official notice of the funds and the time allowed for paperwork was much less. All paperwork must be done within 15 days.

"This is the only thing we'll be doing for the next week or so," the

mayor said Monday afternoon as he plowed through papers stacked in front of him.

Blackstone called Michael Valuk, his assistant, back from his summer vacation to help out. Valuk is credited with a leading role in getting the town such a large share of the act's funds.

Town Engineer Charles Sheehan and Public Works Director Arthur Mulligan and their staffs are also making sure of all the projects and paper involved with each.

To make sure all the funds come to East Hartford, the mayor's staff is working on four fairly new uses of the funds.

The new uses are: Street repairing, realigning, and curbing with sidewalks in the 45-acre North Meadows area; a new culvert near Forbes St. between Silver Lane and Ridgewood Rd.; storm sewers in the School St. area; and resurfacing of town streets.

Other projects ready for the funds are:

- A swimming pool, equal to the Lord and Drennan pools, to be built at Hockanum Park for about \$881,475.
Drainage improvements on Tolland St. to cost \$228,232.
Repavement of Tolland St., \$273,602.
Eight tennis courts with paddleball courts at Penney High School, \$358,023.
Improvements to drainage and a lot shed at East Hartford Golf Course on Long Hill St., \$240,474.

Charter Oak Mall zone

Court overrules PZC

Common Pleas Court Judge Frances Allen has ruled the Charter Oak Mall's 60 acres of Silver Lane and Forbes St. is a B1 zone and not a B1A zone.

The ruling means the mall owners need only get a building permit to build new structures. One structure planned but blocked by the Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) is a sixth theater in the Showcase Cinemas complex in the mall.

The PZC in 1974 had voted to make the mall a B1A zone. This meant the

mall owners had to come before the PZC for approval of any new projects.

The PZC in February used its power to deny the sixth theater. Members said then another theater would add too much traffic to an already busy area.

PZC members said part of their reasoning had to do with the I-84 traffic dumped on Silver Lane at the Manchester town line. When and if the super highway is connected to I-86, the traffic on Silver Lane might

be reduced and the theater okayed.

Atty. Herbert Barall of East Hartford represented National Amusements Inc. of Boston, which owns the theater complex and which had sought the sixth theater.

Monday, Barall asked for a building permit to build the theater there soon.

No one at the town's corporation counsel office could be reached for comment on whether or not the town will appeal Judge Allen's decision.

Federal funds control
State Rep. Marjorie Yacovone (D-9th District) has returned from the third annual National Conference of State Legislatures held at the Renaissance Center in Detroit, Mich.

Main gripe of the state leaders is lack of control over federal funds flowing into states, she said.

"We want to be free to spend the federal funds as we see fit," she said. "And we want as good an audit of the funds as we have of state funds. We believe we could spend it better."

Speakers at the four-day conference included Henry Kissinger, former secretary of state.

New voters
Democratic Registrar V. James Dellapipa and Republican Registrar Harry M. Bost reported an extraordinary number of voters registered in the year ending June 1. Of the total of 4,654 registered, 2,295 were Democrats, 588 were Republicans, and 1,851 were unaffiliated.

At voter-making sessions at both high schools May 4, 84 students 18 or older registered as Democrats, 28 as Republicans, and 45 unaffiliated.

The registrars can accept registrations from 17-year-olds who will be 18 on or before Election Day Nov. 8.

New auction forming
School Supt. Eugene Diggs informed Town Council Chairman George Dagon recently the Board of Education voted to turn over to the town 110 tablet arm frames and 146 chair frames.

He told Dagon the cost of refinishing the items with seats, backs and tablets exceeds the prices on new ones. Also, fewer students mean they aren't needed anyway.

"We'll have another grand auction in the spring," said Dick Torrey of the council recalling the town's big auction of surplus May 7.

Land for free
Atty. Herbert Barall told Mayor Richard Blackstone in June a client of his wants to give the town Lot No. 28 on Cobly Dr. near O'Brien School in the North End. The mayor passed on word of the offer to the Town Council July 19 the council referred the proposed gift to its land acquisition committee for study.

A factor in the committee's study will be the loss of property taxes on a piece of land the town may not be able to use.

Release of letter questioned

Stephen Penny, a Democratic member of the Manchester Board of Directors, has asked that the board consider the appropriateness of a recent release of a confidential statement to the press.

The statement, a letter from the Human Relations Commission concerning the Roy Thompson case, was released to the press by Republican Director Vivian Ferguson, who consulted with fellow party directors Paul Withide and Carl Zinsner before providing the press with a copy.

The letter from the HRC criticized the "lack of candor" of Charles McCarthy Jr., assistant town manager, in his testimony before the commission.

Penny is a letter to Mayor Matthew Moriarty, expressed concern that the Republican members acted independently without consulting the entire board or seeking a ruling from the town council.

His major objection to the action is that such a release of confidential reports could shake the public's confidence in its elected officials.

"If individual members of this board determine for themselves whether or not certain confidential information should be publicly disclosed, then the level of confidence which the town's citizens and employees have in their elected officials' ability to keep private matters private will be seriously reduced," Penny said.

"We run the constant risk of this community being seriously damaged by the hasty and ill-considered, or improperly motivated, actions of one or two individuals. No member of this board should consider that he has the license to make decisions in this area for a majority of its duly elected or appointed members," he said.

Penny also said that his statement was not politically motivated because the directors involved were all Republicans.

"My criticism of the approach would be no less forthcoming if three members of my own party had been involved," he said.

Mrs. Ferguson said, "Any communication which affects the citizenry, possibly to their detriment, should never be kept secret. Apparently, there is a lack of understanding on the part of Director Penny as to the purpose of a minority party, who is elected by the people and expected by them to keep the majority from making mistakes."

She said that she felt Penny "was well-meaning in his intentions, but is apparently naive as to what priorities the public has in receiving information. It is the taxpayer who elects us to represent him and he deserves the full story."

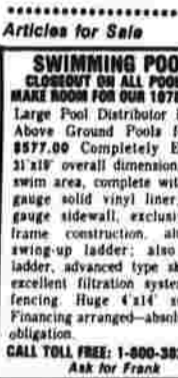
