

(UPI) -President Carter, awaiting a report on the cause of the dramatic jump in joblessness among America's black youths, was spending the Labor Day holiday weekend today at Camp David with his family. Press Secretary Jody Powell told reporters before Carter's departure from the White House that Carter was "deeply concerned" over black teen-age unemployment and has asked top adminstration advisers to find out what can be done about it.

MEXICO CITY (UPI) -Hurricane Anita, once packing 185 mile-an-hour winds, fizzled out in northeastern Mexico today, but its floodwaters and torrential rains flattened one fishing village and reportedly killed three farmers. Newspaper reports said the season's first hurricane claimed its first three victims when floodwaters from the San Marcos River drowned three farmers near Ciudad Victoria, 75 miles inland and 175 miles southwest of Brownsville, Texas.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Agriculture Department Friday estimated 1977 world coffee production at 69.9 million bags -14 per cent above last year's small crop of 61.1 million bags which sent prices soaring. The new estimate was slightly below a previous forecast of 70.37 million bags. For Brazil, the world's leading coffee producer, production is expected to be 17 million bags. That's nearly 80 per cent above the freeze-damaged 1966 crop but still well below the average of about 25 million bags before a 1975 freeze.

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) -Israel has unveiled an ambitious and controversial plan to set up strings of new Jewish settlements, primarily on the occupied West Bank of Jordan, to double the nation's population by the end of the century. Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, 49, author of the plan, gave a general outline of his proposals on nationwide television Friday.

Penney environmental case listed for trial on Tuesday

The trial of the court case that affects the proposed industrial park in Manchester has been scheduled for Tuesday at 10 a.m. in Hartford Superior Court.

The case - the Manchester Environmental Coalition vs. the state Department of Commerce - involves a suit filed by the plaintiffs, who say that Edward Stockton, state commerce commissioner, granted approval of the J.C. Penney Co.'s proposed catalog distribution center without properly weighing its en-

vironmental effects. The Penney facility, which would cover more than two million square feet, would be the major occupant in the town's proposed industrial park, planned for a 393-acre site in

Atty. Anthony Pagano, who, along with Atty. Bruce Beck, represents the plaintiffs, said Friday that he does not expect the case to go

forward Tuesday.
Pagano said that he and his partner were not informed that the case had been placed on trial list. He said that they have not yet completed their discovery, a legal step in which one side seeks pertinent information about the other party's case.

Pagano said that they would not be ready to proceed with the case this Tuesday.

Atty. Ronald Castleman, who represents the Manchester **Economic Development Commission** (EDC), the planning agency for the park, said that he and other defense attorneys are ready to proceed. Attorneys representing the EDC

Penney signed a contract with the Town of Manchester for about 160 acres of the park property. The contract was contingent upon the land being ready by Sept. 1, but the firm has said that it is willing to extend that deadline because of the court

The company, however, has not said how long it is willing to wait for completion of the trial.

Attys. Beck and Pagano indicated that part of the delay in completing

their discovery is because some of their clients have been involved in property settlements with the town.

These clients, who own property within the proposed park site, had been involved in a first legal action against a zone change granted for the park. The zone change appeal was denied by the state Court of Common Pleas and Supreme Court.

Some of the clients have reached a settlement with the town on purchase of their property. Part of the agree-ment included a clause that they drop all involvement in legal action against the park.



Canal treaty ceremony set

WASHINGTON (UPI) - At least two dozen Western Hemisphere leaders will be entertained by the U.S. government next week at glittering social functions and ceremonies honoring the signing of the new Panama Canal treaty.

President Carter has invited the Latin American, Caribbean and Canadian rulers - a collection described as unprecedented by State Department officials - to counter conservative domestic opposition by dramatizing international support for the controversial treaty.

The rulers will participate in ceremonies Wednesday night hosted by the Organization of American States at the Pan American Union during which President Carter and Panamanian ruler Omar Torrijos will sign the treaty.

Before they leave, all the presidents and prime ministers will attend a White House banquet in their honor and each will confer privately with Carter.

NEW YORK (UPI) - A judge has charged that the three district attorneys involved in the "Son of Sam" case are "impeding the judicial process" in a squabble over who will get the first crack at trying the mass murder suspect.

Justice Charles R. Rubin, an administrative judge in Brooklyn, said Friday that judges in the Appellate Division of State Supreme Court should resolve a growing dispute among the district attorneys.

'It's getting out of hand. Something has to be done," Rubin said. "My own feeling is that with their interest in the orderly processes in the court system, the presiding justices of the appellate divisions ... should sit them down and tell them to quit wasting money, stop impeding the judicial process and get the show on the road'



CB Convac

CB prices are going haywire

By INK DIPPER

The other morning over coffee with some of the members of our CB club we got talking about the retail pricing of both mobile and base stations. It is confusing because there are so many different prices.

It appears the manufacturers overproduced. In an earlier column we mentioned that E.F. Johnson was screaming to high heaven about the influx of imports, primarily from Japan. Johnson said they were going to ask the International Trade Commission for relief in the form of quotas and duties. This is what the television industry did, and the ITC granted their request.

The strange part about this action is that when the imports of television sets dropped as a result, the Japanese electronics industry turned the manufacturing facilities that were idle over to manufacturing CB components. This could be why imports represented only 79 per cent of the units sold in the United States in 1975, and went up to 92 per cent in

Meantime, Johnson did file their petition with the ITC last week. They said that CB imports had caused a severe dislocation in employment, reduced the amount of capital available to the CB industry, and seriously eroded the profits of the CB manufacturing companies.

We made over \$5 million in profit in 1975 and only \$260,000 in 1976," one executive at Johnson told us. "We're responsible for 80 per cent of the United States CB production. That will give you an idea of what is happening in the industry.'

Pathcom and Motorola also do their manufacturing in this country. They are mentioned in Johnson's petition as having been badly hurt, too, by the imports. Pathcom, as a matter of fact, have been forced to reduce their work force by 600 employes, nearly one half their nor-

mal employment roster. The Gallagher Report, a confidential newsletter that goes to business leaders, says the problem is product proliferation, regardless of where the CB units are coming from GE is now trying to decide whether they are going to stay in the business. There are 40 companies in the business, according to Gallagher, and more than 105 different brands.

It is obvious that all these conflic ting forces are causing the confusion at retail level. Prices are going crazy because the manufacturers have to raise money in order to produce their new lines. They are banking on a return of better profit margins with fancier units that sell for higher

In order to achieve this, they're selling present 23s and 40s at a loss many times. Good name units like Hy-Gain, SBE, Pathcom, and Panasonic can be bought for prices unheard of a year or two ago. The off brands sell for peanuts.

It is a tough battle for these guys, but in the opinion of this writer it is a great time to buy a new 40 channel unit. Most important, though, is to remember that buying from a dealer you know who is going to remain in the CB business is where the safety

He can, and probably, will, give you as good a price as you'll get at a discount house or department store, and he'll be there to service what he's sold you. The supermarkets

The same thing holds good with off brands. They got into CB to make a fast buck, and now that the heat's on. they it be j we say now is the time to buy a good name unit that you know will last at a price that's a bargain.

Stamp to note Articles of Confederation

This stamp will be released Sept. 30 at York, Pa., to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the drafting of the Articles of Confederation. (This was not the Constitution - that came years later.) York was called York Town in those days and it served as the nation's capital from Sept. 30, 1777, until June 27, 1778.

The founding fathers had left Philadelphia in haste due to the hot breath of the British. They settled in the Old County Courthouse in York Town and there drew up the Articles which served as the written form of government until the ratification of the Constitution in 1789.

The "guiding principle of the Articles of Confederation was to preserve the independence and sovereignty of the states. The federal government received only those powers which the colonies had Drafting the Articles of Confederation

recognized as belonging to the king and parliament.

This document was found to be too inflexible to meet the needs of a growing country. For one thing, unanimous consent was required for any amendment so it eventually burst its bonds.

At this interim capital, the Continental Congress received the news of Burgoyne's surrender after the Second Battle of

Freeman's Farm — the turning point in the Revolution. From York Town was issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation and here the Congress received Von Steuben and Lafayette and made them major generals.

Ben Franklin's press was carted here

from Philadelphia and set to work making \$10,000,000 worth of currency, later to be known as not-worth-a-Continental.

The stamp shown is to appear printed in intaglio, with red lettering; the figures are brown on a tan background. The five men are not supposed to be anybody in particular - the USPS wisely decided not to risk a hassle over that.

If there are any plate block collectors left, after the beating they've taken with multitudinous numbers, they will be happy to hear that this stamp will have only
