# Crime and justice course starts in Herald Saturday

Advocates of more prisons overestimate the benefits and underestimate the economic and social costs of their "lock 'em up' philosophy of crime control.

This observation is made by Jerome H. Skolnick, director of the Center for Study of Law and Society, University of California at Berkeley, and coordinator of the Courses by Newspaper series, "Crime and

Professor Skolnick's introductory article appears Saturday in The Herald.

Recognizing the immense pain and suffering caused by crime, Skolnick emphasizes there are no simple solutions to crime in modern

"Locking up more criminals for longer times is a panacea that in the long run won't work because of enormous political, social and economic costs," he says.

'Not only are prisons economic burdens, but the evidence strongly suggests that prisons serve as 'schools for crime' that build up resentment and alienation among in-

The recent emphasis on law enforcement hardware is not only backward looking and unproductive, but it also has serious implications for civil liberties in a society that values freedom, due process, and democracy, Skolnick believes.

'To focus on punishment as a

"Only by coupling law enforcement with societal reforms to bring about a more egalitarian society can modern Americans hope to realize a safe and democratic nation," he

To reduce crime rates, Skolnick believes we must alter the social and economic bases of crime - discrimination, poverty and unemploy-

Because these barriers to equal opportunity are rooted in America's recent experience with slavery, the criminal justice dilemma here is unique, according to Skolnick.

"One reason other nations with dense urban populations don't have similarly high crime rates is that they lack the social divisiveness bred in America by our recent experience with slavery and our cultural diversity heightened by massive immigration," he says.

"For example, in Japan, a country with a homogeneous population, the law is viewed as the voice of moral authority by the majority, and not as a tool of oppression as it is by many Americans," he says.
