SUICIDE FATE OF ALL SEIZED JAP OFFICERS

Samurai Code Requires Harakiri If Captured; Chinese Have 700 Prisoners From Taiherchwang.

Shanghai, April 12.—(AP)—A Japanese army spokesman declared today that the Chinese held not a single Japanese officer prisoner.

That ancient code of the Japanese warrior, the spokesman asserted, is motivating the hard-pressed Japanese forces to the utmost.

Chinese have declared 700 Japanese were captured in recent fighting in the Taiherchwang area south of Yehansen.

The Japanese spokesman was asked about 15 Japanese aviators known to be prisoners at Hankow.

He said they were enlisted men, not aviators, and that he did not know whether any officers are among them.

He said he knew of no case in the present war of a Japanese officer committing ceremonial harakiri after capture.

ASKS PATRIOTS OF FRANCE TO STOP STRIKES

Daladier Pleads With Unions To End Tie-Up In Production Of Arms; Number Of Strikers Double In Day.

Paris, April 12.—(AP)—Premier Edouard Daladier appealed today to the patriotism of 140,000 strikers.

He urged them to trust the government to prevent a recurrence of "the old privileges"—apparently his promise to the workers against mass firing or general pay cuts.

He promised their grievances would be settled by legal means and reminded them of the serious international situation made it imperative that there be no interruption in the manufacture of arms.

The Cabinet also approved the premier's plan to ask the Chamber of Deputies for "the Chamber power to rule by decree until July 31 to meet national defense needs and to strengthen the nation's finances."

Anti-Footlocking Tax. Among the announced measures was a proposed special tax on industries producing national defense materials.

Daladier called on Parliament to invest him with decree powers by voting this one-article bill.

The government is authorized until July 31 to take by decree decrees in the Council of Ministers (the Cabinet meeting with President Albert Lebrun) measures which it considers it indispensable to meet the necessities of national defense and to reorganize the national economy.

All deputies of his own Radical-Socialist party and members of the center and right applied Daladier's pledge to keep the wheels of the arms factories turning.

Even Communists joined in the applause of the premier's appeal.

SEE LITTLE CHANCE OF WORLD MARKETS
Wallace Tells Congress The Chances Are 20 To 1 Against Better Conditions

Washington, April 12.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace told Congress today the farmer has a slim chance of regaining in the next decade the world markets he once had.

He estimated the chances are 20 to 1 against a return, within ten years, of world-wide prosperity which would absorb huge quantities of American produce. But the odds are 10 to 1 in favor of a return to the conditions prevailing within the next five years.

The secretary's statements were contained in the record of a House subcommittee hearing on the situation of the 1938 agricultural program, which was held in the House chamber today.

Wallace told the subcommittee, however, these factors might change the picture.

Mitigation of this extraordinary situation, he said, would require "unusual success" of Secretary Wallace's trade agreement policy and the success of the secretary's efforts to secure a "constructive" settlement of the "unusual situation" of the world market.

LABOR BOARD RULING CHALLENGED BY INLAND
Member of "Little Steel" To Take No Steps Until High Court Decides The Legality

Chicago, April 12.—(AP)—The Inland Steel Company, a member of the "Little Steel" group, has challenged a ruling of the National Labor Relations board regarding the company's labor relations.

The board's decision, which was issued last week, held that the company's labor relations were in violation of the National Labor Relations Act.

The company has filed a petition for enforcement of its writ of habeas corpus in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit.
