The Man of the Mission. In 1952, this page had something to say about Dwight D. Eisenhower.

These are the one hand, an abiding of the thing called fear, and on the other, the peace of faith and trust in his fellow human beings.

He has already demonstrated, we wrote then, his peculiar talent for creating about himself an atmosphere in which Americans have felt themselves lifted up above the sordid pettiness, the unworthy anguish, the poisoned suspicions of our time and are able to look the world in each other—in the eye again.

Or, as we phrased it another time, back in 1952: "He has a healing faith inside him which is strong because there is also inside him an absence of fear, and his faith, in both the good and the evil of our times, to our hope, and to our peril, a wise talent for accentuating the good and neutralizing the evil which is suggestive of true greatness."

We who wrote this in 1954, have, we must confess, a most uncomfortable feeling as, in 1956, we see some expression and extension of such sentiments quite close to an almost manful veneration of the man, Eisenhower.

The qualities we sensed in him in 1952 were, however, qualities which were somewhat lacking in the man, Eisenhower.

Even some of the hard-boiled correspondents who cover him regularly have ventured to single out a certain "goodness" as his main principle and his main policy.

That this has been the accomplishment of a human being can be proved, easily enough, by the fact that he has made mistakes.

But the main intent, and the main drive of the man have been visible, and they have not only been almost visibly necessary to a people too long accustomed to having most of the thinking of their leadership done behind closed doors.

Do they want to create a peaceful security for the new nation of Israel? Does anyone expect the Arab to be anything but a peaceful neighbor?

25,000 Miles a Year: Modern-Day Circuit Rider Spreads Word by Automobile

Andrew (Special)—When Lela Anderson was a Illinois farm girl she lived in an "itinerant world" and was seldom able to go to church. Now the nationally-known "Pigskin Circuit Rider" has traveled around the globe.

During her first 3-year circuit, she visited 332 churches in 38 states. Members of 123 other churches attended the home mission meetings led by the Rev. Miss Anderson in her work with the division of Christian Education of the Congregational Christian Church.

The Rev. Miss Anderson is visiting churches in North and South Carolina, Alabama and Boston. She is keeping church records and assisting with reference books and other mission material, offering suggestions as to how other churches have solved similar problems.

Three Questions

The three questions which church groups most frequently ask her are: "What can we do to improve our work in the home?" "How can we reach out to people who do not go to church?" and "What can we do about the problem of the young people?"

The Rev. Miss Anderson believes that if you get the answer to the first question, you also answer the second question.

Teacher who learns to teach better will attract and hold the interest of her students. Her job as a circuit rider, she believes, is to help other teachers do this.

Since taking care of equipment takes up a large part of her job, she is marked with a sign, "I sometimes envy the early circuit riders who carried it all in their heads."

Garden in Car

Transferring the circuit rider's farm heritage are seen in vegetable and flower gardens lining the rear windows of the "Circuit Rider" station wagon.

While space has been carefully utilized to accommodate 1,500 pounds of mission-wares, vegetables and bulbous specimens, the Rev. Miss Anderson has made the corners of the car for things that make a home.

As she put it: "When they asked me to do this work, I realized I wouldn't be able to have a garden. And I'm the kind of person who likes to get roots in deep."

So she improvised. And she has had a garden in her station wagon for 10 years.

"It's a small garden, but it's a garden," she says. "I've had tomatoes, eggplants, and a small oven, operating from the battery by a converter, which will cook a meal while she's driving."

Tucked away are an ironing board and a clothes closet.

Usually, she stays with church families during her visits. However, during an occasional lull between appointments, she has slept in the car.

"Shopping in a supermarket, a weekly routine, is the average woman's rare treat. Even when she has only one car of food to purchase, she scans all the shelves and treats her purchases with great care."

During her first 3-year circuit she ate 300 church meals. Most of these, she added, were pot-luck dinners, which she enjoys very much.

Not Born Lonely

However, her life as a contemporary circuit rider has not been too lonely, since 65 people have traveled with her at one time or another.

A permanent companion and assistant now is "Peter Piper," a parakeet given her two years ago by a group of church school teachers led by two men who felt "ought to have a male traveling companion."

"Peter Piper's" job is to entertain children while mothers and fathers attend the small group meetings in which Miss Anderson does most of her work.

He has over 100 words in his vocabulary. He has used sentences which she has recorded.

A new sentence was added to the list yesterday when Mrs. Martin Baker, church school superintendent greeted him.

"Peter responded, 'Is God glad to see you? Peter Piper likes you Peter. Blesses God and God bless God.'"

The explosion, believed caused by coal dust, blew out the inclined entrance of No. 4. It hurled one man through a window, smashed nearby buildings and shook the surrounding countryside.

For a while there was danger the fumes waiting through the tunnels would launch off another explosion. Later, officials said this danger had been lessened.

The Springhill coal fields have been described as one of the most dangerous in Nova Scotia because of the gas fumes. In 1915, a mine blast at Millerton, Alta., cost 198 lives. Springfield itself suffered a mine-disaster in 1941, when 123 miners were killed.


