

Britain's 'Flying Saucer'

Britain's secret saucer plane, which made a successful first flight off the Isle of Wight Sunday, presented this odd appearance from the air yesterday as it rested on the island's runway off England's south coast. The oval aluminum craft, 30 feet long and 25 feet wide, is designed to skim shove the surface of the water at speeds up to 40 miles an hour. A conventional 450 h.p. engine sucks air in through circular intake at center, pumps it out below to provide a cushion of air for takeoff and landing. Long housing at top and bottom are propulsion ducts for forward movement, with control fins at left ends. Pilot's cabin is at right center. No other details were revealed.
