The new rules of war promulgated by Defense Secretary McNamara have a basic simplicity which is most welcome. in essence, they make our side the umpire as well as one of the participants. And, as we have been making the rules, we have been holding, rightly enough, that it is sinful and illegal for an aggressor to shoot, but noble and righteous for anybody repelling aggression to

This is clear and definite as far as it goes, or until it crosses an international boundary. At that point, however, a small but troublesome question arisesone which has not yet been clarified by our imaginative new strategists. When, in order to punish the aggressor, we shoot and bomb him on his own territory, is he entitled to shoot back at

Is he entitled to use anti-aircraft fire against our bombers when, in their miscion of justice, they are over his own territory? Does the enemy have any legal or moral right to resist when, to punish him for his aggression, Mr. McNamara's bombers fly over him and drop bombs on him?

As far as we can reason it out, it is going to have to be declared to be just as sinful for the enemy to resist our punishment for aggression as it was sin-ful to commit aggression in the first place. And we presume Secretary Mo-Hamara intends to punish any resistance is may encounter in North Vietnam as

rigorously as he intends to punish aggression in South Vietnam.

In making and enforcing new rules of war like this it is important, of course, that one makes sure one remains the umpire.
