



The National Aeronautics and Space Administration discovered the problem in 1962, after the Titan 2 was selected as the booster for the Gemini program. Radio data showed that the missle shuddered at a rapid 11 cycles per second between 90 and 140 seconds after launching.

The vibration did not affect the missile's performance as a military weapon, but it was feared it would prevent the Gemini astronauts from readig a biurred instrument panel during the critical lift off place.

The pilots must be able to read the panel instruments because in the Gemini program they fly their own vehicle. If something goes wrong they must take their own escape measures.

Eingineers discovered the surge of fuel through lines leading to the first stage combusion chamber of the rocket created the effect.

Helium gas pressure was increased in the fuel system and vibration-damping devices were attached to the lines.

Kosygin is believed to have warned Ho that, although North Viet Nam's objective i the south is correct, its tactics are dangerously incorrect. The objective - Communist contro of South Viet Nam-could be achieved without the blatant, obvious, and continuing exter-nal support to the Viet Cong Kosygin argued further that war with the U.S., far from be-





Gemini 3

First Plane

For Space

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla (AP)

The Gemini spacecraft which astronauts Virgil I. Grissom and John W. Young rode into the eye of history yesterday was the first true flying machine to enter the space race.

Arter the "crumoty cookie astronaut Cmdr. M. Scott Carpenter chased around his spacecraft, a new process for space food was developed.

A different food container was devised along with a long-nosed water nozzle. The plastic bag has a sealed valve in the top and the nozzle fits snuggly inside. After water has been added, from three to five ounces depending on the type of food, the valve closes to prevent leakage when the nozzle is removed.

This possibility, advanced Wednesday night by scientists at a Jet Propulsion Laboratory news conference, was based on evidence of possible volcanic activity shown in pictures televised by Ranger 9 Wednesday just before it crashed into the 60- mile wide crater Alphonsus.

Alphonsus, in a highland area mar the center of the face of the moon, is the site of red flashes which some astronomers have interpreted as hot gases escaping through finsures in the kinar osust.

Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper, chief of the scientific toam, said many of he thousands of craterlets seen for the first time on Alphonsus floor were not caused by meteorite impact. They can only be the result of volcanic activity," he said.

Suprisingly, the smoothes and hardest areas on the moon seem to be crater rims — where they are spots apparently level enough for landings — and ridges found on crater floors, Ruiper said he believes the floors of lange oraters and many of the meton's broad plains are composed of solidined fronty.
