





The Sandbags Of Saigon terest which makes it imperative for American soldiers to die in the jungles of Vietnam is, of course, the character of the native regime which is on our side. It is certainly no worse than its own native opposition and may be much more civilized. And it also has to be said

that its character, however repugnant to us, is not a determining factor in American policy. The South Vietnamese on our side could be angels or they could be devils, and the requirements of power politics policy would not care too much which it happened to be. Nevertheless, there are times when our own allies make us feel sick, and

make us wish we were able to denounce whole Vietnam involvement as something unspeakable and intolerable. That is a luxury Americans and their government no longer can afford. They and suffer all its horrors and its embarrassments until some turn of events or some outside help of some kind makes extrication without loss of face or word possible.
But let those who would make, out

of this grim and horrible necessity, some kind of a virtuous, holy war stick their noses, for a moment, into the fact and atmosphere of a Seymour Topping dispatch to the New York Times today. "The military rulers of South Vietam," writes Correspondent Topping from Saigon, "imposed stringent measures on the population today to enforce iscipline and curb war profiteering Senior officers of the National Leadership Committee stated that Vietcong errorists, corrupt officials, speculators and blackmarketeers would be shot without trial if there was tangible proof

"At the central marketplace of Saigon, soldiers erected sandbag emplacements that would permit firing squads to carry out public executions with maximum publicity.
