**Okinawa in News Again****Island Is Major Stop For U.S. Viet Forces**

NAHA, Okinawa (AP) — This Pacific island has become a major supply area for U.S. forces in Vietnam. More than 100 B-52s could operate out of Okinawa, but American forces are currently not undertaking any combat operations from bases there.

This island belongs to Japan. The United States has been using Okinawa and its facilities with a ground of experience in the Korean War, and in the Cuban missile crisis of 1962 when it was rushed to Florida to take any action that might upset leftist anti-Viet Nam war demonstrations in Japan or Okinawa.

By February, Okinawa was handling more cargo in a month than it had in the last three months of 1965.

In March, "roll on" ships were assigned to the island. Within five days, one of the ships leaves Okinawa for Viet Nam with 5,000 tons of cargo loaded in 130 giant truck trailers. The trailers, the trucks and the drivers provide a sort of pipeline motion.

The trailers are loaded in advance in Okinawa and rolled onto the ships. In Viet Nam they are pulled off the boats and taken directly to the places where supplies are needed. All the men are unloading, loading and other equipment needed repair are put on the trailers. When the ship arrives, they are loaded and brought to Okinawa.

In the command compound, two shifts a day, several hundred civilian workers support a steady flow of supplies coming in from the United States and going out to Viet Nam and other Southeast Asian ports.

More than 300,000 items — from paper clips and wrenches to medical supplies and supplies — are stored here. Supply regulations from Viet Nam are fed into the command's computer. If the item is available, it is shipped to the United States. Otherwise an order is dispatched to the United States, usually with a request for direct shipment.

This is perhaps the prime direct supply operation given by Okinawa-based forces to Viet Nam. But there are other active





**Cancer Claims Helen Kane, 'Boop-Boop-a-Doop' Girl**

NEW YORK (AP) — Helen Kane, whose gay little girl's voice made the phrase "boop-boop-a-Doop" a part of the legend, died Friday, 20th, died Monday, at 88, after a 10-year battle with cancer.

She succumbed at her home in Jackson Heights, Queens, after suffering a stroke, television revival of "Three Little Words," a movie in which she sang "I want to be loved by you" to her biggest hit.

Dan Haggerty, her husband, said, "She got a great kick out of hearing her voice coming out loud and clear."

The "boop-boop-a-Doop" refrain that Miss Kane made a part of most of her songs had its birth in 1928 when she was appearing in a New York City Vaudeville Theater. She inserted the line at a rehearsal and it was hit as soon as the public heard it.

"I don't know why I did it," she once told an interviewer. "I might just come out like that."

The voice and Miss Kane's songs will be carried to Hollywood. There Miss Kane has joined the Roman Catholic Church in Jackson Heights at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. Burial will follow at Long Island National Cemetery, she recalled — Miss Kane Pinelawn, N.Y.




