School Aid Top Issue for Incumbent

Incumbent State Senator Andrew Repko of Willington is urging his constituents to re-elect him with a vote of 70 percent.

Repko cites increased state aid to education as the number one priority problem facing the legislature.

He will also propose a \$4,000 exemption for the elderly with no strings attached.

He ranks reversing the present formula for road aid as fourth in his priority list of legislation for Tolland County.

Retirement income is legislation primarily in the field of retirement income for state employees, he explained yesterday.

When asked what his pet legislative interests were, Repko listed a three-plane priority platform, which would alleviate discrepancy in retirement credit.

He also proposed eliminating the rule forbidding state employees to participate in politics.

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Democrat Calling for a 'New Voice'

"A new voice in Tolland County," and "a man who does his homework" are the words most frequently used in the campaign for Robert Houley of Vernon, the Democratic candidate for State Senator from the 35th District.

Houley is aiming his "new" appeal against veteran legislator Andrew Repko who is seeking his second term in the State Senate after serving six terms in the House of Representatives.

Houley speaks out strongly about what he feels the issues will be before the legislature, and how the legislature can best serve Tolland County's needs.

This growth causes problems, he points out, and must be met with planning and a thorough background in local government, according to Houley.

He points to the country's rapid growth rate, noting it is the fastest growing area in the state.

Major problem to come before the legislature will be fiscal, Houley predicted in a recent interview.

How can we start appropriating funds for programs without a realistic revenue program shows we can afford it," Houley questioned.

He feels the long range income producing needs of the state must be considered, not merely stop-gap methods.

Mrs. Ray Ewald also denied that the land was given to Humphrey. "It was paid for," she said. "I wasn't given to Hubert, I know that."

A Minneapolis grand jury indicted several milk companies, including Ewald Brothers, a milk trade association, several distributors and a milk drivers union on Jan. 24, 1963. They were charged with entering into a conspiracy to prevent a number of stores from selling milk below the price dairies charged for home delivery.

All the defendants pleaded not guilty—no contest—in the criminal action and on March 2, 1963, were fined \$3,000 each.

Ray Ewald, who with his wife had executed the lake-side property deed, was not named a defendant in the criminal case. The civil suit named his brother, Dewey Ewald, who was president of the dairy, \$467,700 because he added to it or because it has appreciated in value, or both, the Ewalds said.

### Attorney Says 'Eric Galt' Had Plastic Surgery

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP)—An attorney says a man who gave his name as Eric Galt underwent minor plastic surgery before the assassination last April of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The lawyer, Bennett Olan, denied Tuesday to give details of the surgery performed by Dr. Russell C. Hadley except to say it was of the type which would not greatly change his appearance.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has reported Eric Galt was an alias used by James Earl Ray, now facing trial in Memphis, Tenn., on a charge of murdering King.

Olan said he thought the operation was performed three or four weeks before the assassination on April 4. "It may have been on the 4th or the 11th of March, I forget which," he said.

The surgeon referred all questions to Olan. The lawyer said he believed Galt sought out Dr. Hadley through the Los Angeles County Medical Association. At any rate, Olan said, Galt told the doctor the association had recommended him.

Olan said the case didn't stand out in Hadley's mind, but he added, "As soon as we discovered who the patient had been, the case was reported to the FBI."

The attorney said that as far as he knew, Hadley has not been subpoenaed to testify in the Ray trial.

"I don't believe," he said, "that what he did was relative to the case."

He said only one person, author William Bradford Huie, has been authorized to see the records of the treatment, and no one else would be allowed to examine them without authorization. Huie was engaged by Ray to write his story.

### Vernon Carruthers Challenges Allen To a Debate on the Issues

With the election six days away, Thomas Carruthers, Republican candidate for State Representative, is challenging his opponent, Gerald Allen, to debate the issues.

Asserting that he had tried to stir his opponent to open discussion of the issues facing the people of Vernon at this time, Carruthers said, "I guess the only way to determine his position on these issues, if he has one, is to get him before a group of people and ask him."

Carruthers cited the issues as being, "the horrible, continual pollution of our once beautiful Hockanum River, state aid to education, up-rating of the state tax base and the distribution of state aid to small towns."

The Republican candidate said he will meet his opponent before church groups, clubs, coffee parties, picnic parties, or "anyplace that he desires at any time convenient to Allen."

Carruthers said he will let his opponent choose his own rules.

Water Pollution Bill

Concerning the problems of pollution of the Hockanum River, Carruthers charges Allen with voting against a Republican sponsored anti-pollution bill that would have set a deadline for ending the discharge of contaminants into the Hockanum.

"Perhaps the reason Allen voted against it was that it was sponsored by Republicans," Carruthers said. He noted that although the bill was not perfect, it provided for immediate action to attempt to stem the pollution of the Hockanum and other Connecticut rivers and streams.

Further noting that the bill provided for reimbursement by the state to private industry for initiation of pollution control, Carruthers said, "This was a bill that would not have put a great financial burden on any industry, and would have saved our Hockanum river from pollution."

The bill would have set a deadline for private industry to initiate steps to curb the discharge of pollutants into the state rivers and streams. If the deadline were not met, penalties would have been assessed.

"On the other hand," Carruthers said, "those firms taking the initiative in installing pollution control would have been reimbursed by the state to

### U.S. Planes Maintain Raids on Panhandle

They, making their way through the weather, were the number of missions was only five less than the total of 138 Monday and that was the most in nearly a month.

The planes reported damaging three bridges, but "much of the damage assessment was hampered by morning ground fog and later cloud cover," the Navy said. It added that 20 fires and 22 secondary explosions were also reported including hits on fuel and ammunition stores.

Plots from the east in the northern half of the demilitarized zone and destroyed or damaged about 30 bunkers, military supplies and other structures were reported to have landed within 100 yards of the North.

A military source said Gen. Creighton W. Abrams Jr., commander in chief of U.S. forces in Vietnam, was due back "fairly soon" from his hurried trip to Washington to confer with President Johnson. But the source said Abrams might stop off in Honolulu to confer with Admiral John S. McCain Jr., the commander in chief of American forces in the Pacific.

Military sources said Johnson apparently summoned Abrams to Washington to ask the general what effect a bombing halt would have on the military situation in South Vietnam.

While enemy ground forces generally continued to be low, a force of 11 boats and 200 North Vietnamese planes landed in the North.

data concluded that the atom consisted of about 30 particles, some of them short lived.

But Alvarez and his research team, exploded this theory in 1960 at Berkeley with the discovery of a previously unknown particle, called Y, that was even shorter lived. They were awarded the Nobel prize for this discovery.

Alvarez was born in San Francisco, took his Ph.D. at the University of Chicago in 1955 and has been on the faculty of the University of California since 1956.

From 1960 through 1963 Alvarez worked in radar research and development at the Charles and Johanna Busch Institute of Technology in Boston. He then spent two years at the nuclear research station at Los Alamos, N.M.

When Nobel laureate Ernest O. Lawrence, the inventor of the big cyclotron, died in 1960, Alvarez succeeded him as director of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory. He had been deputy director since 1954.

Osage graduated as a chemical engineer from the Norwegian Technical University at Trondheim in 1925 and after further study at Zurich, Switzerland, moved to the United States. He took his Ph.D. in theoretical chemistry at Yale in 1928, was a research instructor at Brown University in 1929 and in 1930 became an assistant professor at Yale. Since 1940 he has been J. Willard Gibbs professor of theoretical chemistry at Yale.

Alvarez at his Berkeley home, said "I'm deeply gratified and highly excited to think that I could receive this honor."

He became the seventh Nobel prize winner associated with the University of California's radiation laboratory.

After learning of the award, Alvarez canceled reservations to fly to the National Space Center in Houston for conferences about high energy cosmic ray particles.

"I'll stay here and talk to some of my boys," he said. "Maybe one of them is on his way to becoming a laureate, too."

Told what research he was cited for, Alvarez replied, "Good, now I can tell my wife."

Osage, contacted in Pasadena, Calif., where he is attending a meeting of the National Academy of Sciences, said, "Well, it is hard to say just how I felt when I was told. Obviously it was a bit of a surprise."

"I would think of the prize—I often thought of the prize as I worked," he said. "But always the thought was in the back of my mind."

Osage reflected for a moment, then added: "I suppose I feel the way I did last year when one of my colleagues, Manfred Eigen, won the award. I feel pleased, just pleased."

Asked if he thought the award might result in changes in his work or activities, Osage said: "This is hard to say. On the other hand, I don't foresee any major changes—except I might have a little more power or influence afterwards."

### Vernon McCusker Lauds Allen

Former Vernon Mayor, Thomas J. McCusker, today praised State Representative Gerald Allen for his record in the Senate. McCusker defended him against charges made by his republican opponent, Thomas J. Curran.

"The claim that Allen has a record of 'one-two-three down the party line' and allusion to lack of knowledge of what goes on in the town or problems of the state, are absurd," McCusker said.

McCusker continued, "When I compare Jerry's outstanding performance in the last eight years to the well-advertised obstructionism and lack of political leadership of his opponent here in town, the choice for me is clear, return Jerry Allen to an even greater role in the next legislative session."

For all of his adult life, McCusker noted, Allen has given himself to outstanding public service. He served three years as a director of the Chamber of Commerce; two years as a Rockville alderman; four years as a commissioner of the Zoning Board of Appeals; four as a member of the Insurance Advisory Board; and most notably for the last eight years as Vernon's state representative.

McCusker further notes that Allen's experience and ability earned him the post of House Chairman of the Public Utilities Committee.

"How well he did his job was best told by a fellow Representative, a Republican from the 4th District, Robert D. King," McCusker said.

McCusker quotes Rep. King as saying, "Although on the other side of the political fence, Jerry has been most cooperative with me in getting needed legislation out of the committee of which he is House Chairman, and on time. He is a fine public servant and the town can be justly proud of his service as an outstanding given."

### Air Medal

### Candidates of Both Parties Cite Concern for Elderly

Candidates on both sides of the political fence expressed concern today for security payments now going to the nation's elderly.

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff said of retired Americans who receive less than \$100 a month on Social Security: "That is not retirement. That is abject poverty. We must do more."

Lowell P. Weicker of Greenwich, Republican candidate for Congress, also said the older U.S. citizens are suffering. He blamed it on "the Johnson-Humphrey inflation."

In a talk prepared for a campaign visit today to Bridgeport, Weicker said, "An administration that gives with one hand and takes with the other does nothing to solve the problem of either the elderly or the poor."

He promised to throw his efforts into locating out unemployed workers rather than taxes in the struggle against inflation.

Weicker opposes incumbent Democrat Rep. Donald J. Irlwin in the Fourth District.

Ribicoff is campaigning to retain his Senate seat against GOP opponent Edwin H. May Jr.

Shaping his ideas for an audience of the Connecticut Council of Senior Citizens in Waterbury, he wrote: "In 1968, we cannot expect any person over 65 to survive on less than \$1,200 a year."

The Junior Connecticut senior aid about \$2.3 million Social Security recipients draw minimum benefits which, for the worker who goes on the rolls at 65 or later is \$85. "About 4 million Social Security beneficiaries still live in poverty," he added.

He called for improvement in the benefits, which he called "the biggest anti-poverty program in the United States," to be met to full for five months and expanding prosperity.

On Tuesday, May, criticized Ribicoff for voting against an amendment which would have provided federal funds to set up local groups to help enforce the law.

Each group, he said, would give the police "more eyes and ears into the ghetto" and ball games.

The council returns this support in services to the Bolton Girl Scout community: leader training sessions for all volunteers, conferences and workshops, filmstrips, a monthly newsletter and suggestions of a field director who works directly with the volunteers plus the services of camp directors and specialized advisors. The funds also support the operation of the Bolton Community Chest.

Mrs. Dixon explained that each Girl Scout costs the community \$10.14 a year "for programs for her leadership, for training for her leader, for a camp to go to and a training director to run the camp, for telephone and typing paper and telefax and tires, and for the \$1.00 and one thing that make Girl Scouting possible."

### Mishaps Kill 5 in State

Three persons died in separate crashes within six hours of each other on Interstate 84, and two other Connecticut deaths were attributed Tuesday to violent accidents.

One of the dead was a Stamford boy, missing since Monday when he was hunting. His body was found by bloodhounds near his home.

Early today a car carrying five persons crashed on I-84 in Hartford, killing a young couple from Massachusetts and seriously injuring the other three.

Dead were Antonio Quinones, 25, and his 23-year-old wife, Enastasio. Their 14-year-old son, Antonio, and two others were listed in poor condition at Hartford Hospital. Police said the car veered out of control and whipped into a guard rail. Several of the passengers were thrown from the vehicle, according to investigators. The car rebounded upright and burst into flames.

Another crash on I-84 killed a 42-year-old Roman Catholic nun and injured three other women.

Sister Catherine Ann, 43, of St. Francis Convent in New Haven died when the car she was in crashed in flames at the foot of an embankment in Wallingford.

Police said a tire in the divided highway caused the car to swerve over the bank and crash into a bridge abutment.

The three other nuns, all from the same convent, were helped from the overturned wreck and did not suffer serious injury, police said.

The car swerved, according to investigators, because of a tire lying in the roadway. They assumed the fire fell from the trunk or rear deck of the vehicle which contained on.



War Vignette: Howard Titus Loked His Job

CON TITUS, Vietnam (AP) — Howard Titus has his job. He's an engineer with a French place of equipment. He stays in an employer in Laos and the pay is pretty good, too.

But the place where Titus works could be a distraction to an industrial safety expert at one of the company's plants back home.

The place is Con Titis, the U.S. position below the demilitarized zone on the very front porch of the war. Enemy gunners have attacked it with hundreds of artillery rounds.

"When I joined the company I knew I'd be doing a lot of traveling," says Titus.

"I also knew I'd come to Vietnam, but I didn't think I'd end up in a place like this."

His world at the moment was one of faded bags and bunker timbers grayed by sun and rain. The pervasive dust, which turns to sooty mud as soon as it is cleared.

"It's getting to see a war from the front seat. It's sort of an adventure."

Titus is a bachelor from Westport, Mass., and a graduate in electrical engineering at Northeastern University. He met in a hitch as army Army Signal Corps officer in Okinawa, and then joined Southern Associates of Nashua, N.H., the maker of the secret, ultrasonic detection gear he has followed to Vietnam.

At Con Titis Titus is resident expert to a team of Army technicians operating the new piece of classified equipment. It's an on-and-off job that often goes around the clock.

Otherwise, there's a tape recorder for music and an occasional bridge game for diversion. His meals and a shower nozzle hooked to a 35-gallon drum of water make for comparative luxury. Now and then a C ration must fit the military majority that dwells on particular meals—ham and lima beans. For a break there's a jeep trip now and then along the dirt road to Vietnam to the big Marine base at Dong Hoi, 18 miles away.

No telling Titus as a civilian by the looks of him. He wears standard GI issue. The Army program he works under has seen that he has an M16. The redneck has cultivated a red mustache, and like many others, he's watching his State-side pot belly yield to the slender waist.

It wasn't too quiet when Titus arrived at Con Titis last June. "There were a lot of people here last week. My nerves were nearly shot."

"But I got to thinking the probability of my being all right was maybe better here, than way, dodging Boston traffic," he says.

The school must steadily improve its safety education program in order to remain on the Honor Roll. Some of the required activities for schools are an active student safety organization; safety bulletin boards and displays; instruction in pedestrian, traffic, recreation, fire, school, home and holiday safety; preparation of student posters emphasizing safety and making accident statistics more meaningful; safety assemblies and broadcasts.

Not Satisfied On Rec Issue, Says Director

Democratic Town Director William Fitzgerald again has called on Mayor Nathan Agostinelli to "explain his actions" concerning the alleged election leading to the Oct. 8 resignation of rec Director William Doyle.

Boyle, in his letter of resignation, charged "harassment and interference" by town officials, without naming them. Fitzgerald last week identified the two as Agostinelli and Town Director William Schaller, both Republicans.

Boyle had charged also that "the two town officials" had used their political influence to try to get two of their friends appointed to rec department jobs.

Town Manager Robert Weiss, on Oct. 9, said that he knew of no instances of "harassment and interference," and that the two public officials he did not name (they) only asked Boyle to explain why two long-time rec employees had been discharged from their part-time jobs.

Last Friday, two Manchester policemen identified themselves as the two former part-time rec employees who had been discharged. They repeated Weiss' statement that there had been no harassment and interference.

They explained that Agostinelli and Schaller had asked Boyle to meet with Weiss, to air the reasons behind the dismissals. They stressed the point that they wanted to quash "the undue criticism of Agostinelli and Schaller."

Fitzgerald's open letter to town directors follow:

"This is my fourth request to Mayor Agostinelli asking him to state whether or not he attended a meeting with Mr. Boyle and to tell us the subject matter of that meeting. To date I have heard nothing from the mayor and his silence daily increases my suspicion. I have received many telephone calls from taxpayers who wish the mayor and Director Schaller to answer the following questions, so that the reputation of all of Manchester's town directors will be clear and there will be no blemish on the record of any elected official."

"I was there any other secret meetings held by Mr. Boyle, the mayor and any other member of the Board of Directors?"

"Have there been any meetings with any other department head on administrative matters?"

"If the two policemen involved where improperly discharged by Mr. Boyle as they claim, why was this not brought to the attention of the entire Board of Directors, instead of being handled by the mayor and director Schaller alone?"

South Windsor 2 Chairmen Ask Yes on 5 Questions

Two more town officials today endorsed a "yes" vote on the five referendum questions appearing on the ballot in the Nov. 5th election.

Harry Anderson, chairman of the Board of Education, and Mrs. Louise Evans, chairman of the Conservation Commission, in separate statements approved the referendum questions and called for voter approval of the questions on election day.

In his statement, Anderson emphasized the amount of time which town agencies have spent on site selection and evaluation of the town's own water supply. He called for a "yes" vote on Question 4. This considerable study, said Anderson, has led the Board of Education to the conclusion that the Newers Hill site should be a combined high school and community activity center.

Anderson stated that a favorable vote on the questions is needed to insure for sound growth in a rapidly expanding community.

Mrs. Evans stated, "Passage of the two questions will see us two steps closer to accomplishing our share in the provision of a safe and wholesome town. The third question implements mandatory changes in our town charter."

Mrs. Evans went on to say that the Conservation Commission strongly supported Question 4 "for the valuable open space it would provide adjacent to a future high school."

While the future use of the land to be purchased under Question 4 has not been determined, said Mrs. Evans, it is highly probable that a portion of it will be reserved for future open space and recreational use.

The Questions

Question 1 calls for approval of \$75,000 bond issue for a secondary sewerage treatment plant. According to town officials, up to 80 per cent of this amount could be reduced by state and federal grants.

Question 2 calls for the approval of \$75,000 bond issue for extension of the sanitary sewer system to an area of town where an acknowledged health hazard exists.

Town officials point out that bond issues of this type are not included in a town's total bonded indebtedness, and would not adversely affect the town's borrowing power.

Question 3 calls for the adoption of the recommended town charter amendments. These are primarily of a house-keeping nature.

Question 4 calls for approval of the purchase of 120 acres of land between Barber Hill and Niederwerter Rds. It has been sold to town officials.

Book Review

ANTIMEMOIRA By Andre Malraux, Holt, Rinehart, & Winston. \$10.95

These amply, swaggingly accurate who keep shifting from one corporation to another (and one semi-inductive suburb to another). The modern, obscure European origin, is a very minor writer under the name Malraux. The novel never makes the grade among the trendy, blonde, baritone-voiced lilies of the country club set.

Then there is Richard, their son, who passes his 11th birthday during this story, a puny boy and escapee in 1944 (told in reverse order).

His interviews with Nature in 1948 and 1956 (also told in reverse order), and with Chinese leaders Chou En-lai and Mao also are a part of the story, but tend to the long-winded and argumentative. He describes his earliest meeting with De Gaulle, but not his later ones.

Handicapped in between these items are such things as a haunting reminiscence of his father and grandfather, visits to museums during his globe-trotting, an airplane flight 40 years ago over what might have been the ruins of the Queen of Sheba's palace, and a long, boring description of a documentary film which one of his friends was trying to make, about an early adventurer in Indo-China.

Malraux's style—as readers of his "The Voices of Silence" will recall—ranges from the florid to the elliptical, and frequently leaves the reader bewildered. American readers also will be at a handicap in grasping many of the allusions, implications and inferences in the realm of French history, politics and literature.

In short, this is not an easy book to read. It takes patience. Some will find their patience rewarded. None will not.

GREEN COBBLER MOON. By George Leaning. Viking. \$11.95

Henry, a boat-type with an affinity for insect mounds, is the swiftest hero of this novel. He keeps her cozy but popular acreage going.

The novelist also had led a million dollars for construction of a parish house, and the dedication is about to take place. Henry's fiancée (both are in their 30s), is publicity director for the diocese, is involved in the plans for the ceremony.

The plot weaves rather uncertainly around ominous rumors that when the bishop arrives to make the dedication, speech he is going to shake up the parish.

There are lots of comic effects. They include Henry's troubles with the manuscript he is ghosting; a witch-like landlady; a young reactor who gets drunk, and one of those affably arched episodes in which a man gets caught in an exposed place without his clothes.

It is an odd sort of novel, difficult to classify. It may strike some readers as being quite hilarious. It may strike other readers as utterly quaint, like an old comic valentine that has turned up in the attic.



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Men's May Be Getting Worse Women's Voting Record Seen Steadily Getting Better

BY JOY MILLER, AP Women's Editor. In spite of chronic finger-pointing and shrugging by politicians and political pundits...

More women these days are becoming involved in politics far beyond voting. Mrs. Benson is happy to point out. "Women have perhaps been slower than they should have been, but partly it has been because they haven't been encouraged...

When women were given the vote, the major parties immediately doubled the size of their committees and created women's posts in connection with the school boards, alderman, county clerks, city managers, and mayors.

After the 19th Amendment was passed, the first election year was the historic occasion for the girls, but only about 25 per cent of them had the grumpiness to exercise their right. It is those help things that the polls often were situated in the lack of political and social education...

Over the years increasing numbers of women have become voters until the 1968 election when, according to the Department of Commerce, more women voted than men: 54.8 million women to 50.7 million men.

The rub, of course, lies in the percentage. There were 65 million women in 1968, compared with 52.8 million men, which means that 88 per cent of the women voted in 1968 compared with 83 per cent of the men.

But however you look at it, women are becoming an ever more potent power at the polls. All kinds of people from politicians to school boards are generally more women voted than men: 54.8 million women to 50.7 million men.

They think they have come up with some new ideas. They are surveying, observing and analyzing to discover how she arrives at the decision to do whatever she does in the voting booth.

Women voters, they say, think for themselves (although district wives let it be known they voted the way their husbands did), not all go along with their spouses even though they're in the booth.

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

The trustees expressed "reticence to... to introduce the element of fear" and ordered the university president to try to "dissuade and otherwise discourage those who would jeopardize the free conduct of university affairs."

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Hospital Bills Seen Tripled In 21 Years

By NEIL GLENNIE, AP Labor Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Hospital bills have more than tripled and doctors' fees more than doubled in the past 21 years, according to a government report.

The overall rise in medical prices during the period was 30 per cent greater than the general rise in living costs, the Labor Department said today.

With an overload of patients, physicians in some cases have tried to discourage the practice of making house calls by raising the rate for such service to a level that few patients are willing to pay," the report said.

The shortage of doctors and other medical personnel was cited as a major factor in the rise in medical costs, coupled with a rise in demand because of medical insurance that has made better care available to millions.

Drug prices have remained relatively stable, according to the report. The report said that since 1946 hospital rates have risen 100 per cent, while the cost of living has risen 50 per cent.
