No Good Luck Wish At All? It begins to appear that, with some elements of the press, our incoming President is not going to have even the beginning of the traditional honeymoon.

Whatever he does seems fated to be, in the judgment of some commentators, the wrong thing.

This discontent with the incoming President seems sharpest among the gentlemen of the radio and television networks, but some of the gentlemen of the New York Times and other distinguished newspapers seem to share it too.

This feeling of discontent seems based primarily on a suspicion that Mr. Nixon and his aides are scheming to outfox the gentlemen of the press by trying to manipulate them instead of submitting to their ideas of what makes the best kind of news.

The best kind of news, for some of them, is that which comes from a public figure who has been pressured and hounded into blurting out some indiscretion, or into contradicting his own hypocritical self. For such gallant representatives of the media, twisting darts into the hide of the public official is one way of expressing and upholding the freedom of the press.

For such as these, there is only one potential course on the part of Mr. Nixon which would satisfy them. That would be for him to appear and how his position, try to fight for some public understanding and appreciation of whatever his own real views and objectives may be.

For a time, this portion of the media which has always had trouble loving Mr. Nixon was complaining that the new administration seemed about to build a wall between itself and them, thus holding all information out of their reach.

But when, this week, Mr. Nixon decided to hand the media a great big handsome news story, on a platter, embelliahed with all kinds of new approaches to the business of announcing the members of a Presidential Cabinet, what was the

These same unhappy correspondents and commentators began accusing the President-elect, not of suppressing the news, but of stage-managing it for his own prestige and political advantage. They inferred, some of them, that he was, presumptuous creature, managing the media instead of letting the media manage him. Perhaps, indeed, they feel that he has tricked them into letting him be his own master of ceremonies tonight. Couldn't they yield him that privilege cheerfully, as if they really wished him a little good luck, just for the country's

Our Winter Takes Shape

It never fails, and it was a certainty when those whopping November rains flooded all the small ponds up over their dams again. Severely cold weather has to wait, every year, for the ponds to be full. This year, the stage was set early. And the result has been the earliest severe cold spell of many seasons.

We are afraid that the whole pattern of the winter has been decreed by these early circumstances. The extreme cold will relax its early grip, and let us have comfortable, if brisk, Christmas shopping weather. But the weather by New Year's will be stormy and treacherous, and in January there will be one, and probably two, intense cold spells in which the mercury will go down to 20 below for several nights in a row, each time. Pipes will freeze and fruit and shrub buds will blast, and the only predictable comfort will be that it will all probably be too cold for those germs from tropical Hong Kong to negotiate any more passages from one patient to another.

That is the way it is going to be, and it sounds severe enough. But at least it is the kind of primitive challenge we human beings' can still handle, in spite of all our modern handlcaps, as we have been handling it ever since it called for hanging some extra skins across the mouth of the cave.

The Quiet Majorities

In a courageous statement, the Na tional Association for the Advancement of Colored People has urged Negro mod erates to speak out against excesses by black extremists. The message speaks to while citizens as well, for the present stoge of progress with the racial problem calls for both white and black moderates to stress the better instincts of

merican society. "A small minority of black extrem sts," says an editorial in the NAACP magazine The Crisis, "professes disdair for all 'white values' while at the same time invoking and utilizing, as instruments of controversy, the worst prac-tices of the most benighted stratum of white society, to wit, obscene name-call ing, threats, intimidation, suppression of opposing views and violence." This outspoken minority, the editorial

ontinues, has obscured the vast majory of blacks, who seek integration, opose violence, and want to achieve equa y through legal means. Partly this is ecause the news media focus attention on the most outrageous militants, ast partly it is because too few Negro leaders have forcefully expressed the iew of the majority of their race. "Negro leaders have traditionally been

eluctant to speak out publicly in opposition to other black spokesmen. But the time has come for speaking out loud and clear lest the entire race be brand ed as hate-mongers, segregationists, adocates of violence, and worse," the editorial said. "The time for sincere or muted voices is past. The extremista must be answered promptly and forthrightly in the name of the majority."

Just as the majority of Negroes has been maligned, we would add, so has the majority of whites. Not that there are no grains of truth behind the charges of "white racism." Certainly our society has grievously mistreated Negroes in he past, and this history leaves its vestiges today. Certainly even decent whites are not immune to doubts about unfamiliar classes or races; the test of decency is whether such doubts are generally overcome.

The majority of whites, however, is hardly represented by those who voice racial ill will, or by those who would stir ill will for their own political purposes. As with the black extremists, the rociferousness of this group has tended to drown out the quiet majority. As in the black community, the white moderates must leave no doubt that such loud voices are unrepresentative. Indeed, the white community should perhaps be especially vigilant about its extremists. Simply because whites do predominate, white extremism can do more iamage than black extremism. With their sense of commitment, white moderates too often tend to write off all

of their own race as beyond redemption The time has come for more counter ailing voices, like that of Dr. Sterling W. Brown, president of the National Con ference of Christians and Jews. He re cently complained that a "third society" of responsible whites and blacks has com prised "the most forgotten and neglect d persons in recent years" -those who avoid extremism and merely want "Negroes to pursue their own destiny in dig nity, with the friendship of whites."

This emphasis on good will is especial pertinent now that most legal barriers to racial equality have fallen, and further progress depends on the actions of inlividuals of both races. Today the dif ficulty is not so much a lack of good intentions on either side as it is finding the means and the courage to live up to intentions that already exist. In challenging Americans to live up to their good intentions, it's well to stress

what those intentions are: That very few Negroes want to tear down American society; most want to join it. That only a few whites want to keep blacks from joining; most want them to become part-Further progress will not come from

excoriating all members of either race for the sins of some. It will come from recognizing and exploiting the substantial capital of good will shared by decent Americans of all colors, - WALL STREET JOURNAL

UNITED NATIONS, N. (AP) -The U.N. General Assembly's 126-nation main political committee approved three key resolutions on disarmament late Tuesday.

One resolution, approved 112 0, called for an investigation into the threat to mankind of bacteriological and chemical warfare. Secretary-General Thant would make the study aided by experts in the field. The committee voted 109-0 to approve a resolution hailing the prospect of top-level discussions

between the United States and the Soviet Union on limiting both offensive and defensive nu clear delivery systems. The third resolution, approved 108-0 called on the 18-nation Ge

neva Committee to work out a treaty banning underground nu clear weapon tests. All other types of tests were banned in the treaty agreed upon by the big powers in 1963. The committee still has to act



Inside Dope Big Question On Wall Street

By JOHN CUNNIFF P Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP) - The bi stock market investors never have liked uncertainty. Custom arily, when the prospects are mixed between good and bad the tendency has been to sell out rather than risk losing out. As a result, many millions o dollars have been wiped from

Imagine, then, the torment Wall Street these days over the matter of using inside informa-tion. Traditionally this has been the grist of the market. But federal regulators now say beware

of its use. If a hard a clear ruling were made on the issue, no matter how tough, the market place probably could adjust to it, for in the past it has discounted, ig-nored or accommodated itself to seemingly unpalatable news. But the ruling is unclear and confusing.

Analysts, among others are expecially disconcerted. The use of inside information could help make money for their custom ers; the use of inside informa tion might land them in jail. The confusion arises over sev-

eral recent decisions and cases involving the use of news not generally available to the public n order to obtain an advantage in the market. The first big case involved

Texas Gulf Sulphur Co., in which it was ruled that those in possession of information that is withheld from the public may not seek an advantage by trading on it.

The securities and Exchange Commission argued that em-ployes of Texas Gulf knew of a vast ore discovery in Ontario and used this news to gain profits in the stock market before

releasing it to the public. A federal court found the company and some of its highest executives guilty of violating the securities laws. Moreover, i indicated that any person reeiving an inside tip also should refrain from acting on the infor-

Now inside information, ac tively sought by 11,000 security analysts, is to a large extent the mergizer of the market. But what few in the market place to day are certain about is what,

As a result, millions of words of informal opinions have been offered. Financial public relaions firms have been divided in their advice: Some say their clients should withhold all infor mation from analysts; others ing anound be with Fraud charges brought by the SEC against Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith and 15 very large investors have brought little clarification of the inside information ruling. In this case Merrill Lynch is

accused of having received in-formation about an expected decline in earnings of Douglas Air-craft Co. and with having passed this news on to institu-tional investors but not to individual customers. A settlement was worked out under which Merrill Lynch, while not admitting guilt, agreed to close its New York inagreed to close its New York in-stitutional sales office for 21 lays and its West Coast under-writing office for 21 days.
