More than 2,000 East Germans flooded into the Prague mission on Friday alone, many voicing bitter disappointment with promises of reform from a new Com-

munist leader at home.

Harried diplomats tried to process the refugees. Thirty tents were erected and staircases filled with people to try to accommodate the influx.

Ship with 97 aboard capsizes in typhoon

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An oil drilling ship capsized during a typhoon in the Gulf of Thailand and rescuers sought to learn if any of the 97 people aboard were alive, a spokesman for the owner, Unocal, said Friday. No signs of life were apparent, although rescue efforts were hampered by 6-foot waves and 15 mph winds, said Barry Lane, a spokesman for the Los Angeles-based oil

Ships and aircraft had been searching for the 351-foot Seacrest, a Panamanian-registered vessel, following a severe typhoon that swept through the area with 100-mph

winds and 35-foot waves. The ship was spotted with its bottom up by a Unocal vessel Saturday morning, or about 5:20 p.m. PST, said Lane, who had received news of the sighting from Uno-cal Thailand Ltd. officials in Bangkok.

"They're in constant radio contact with our ships, planes and helicopters in the area," Lane said. The Unocal subsidiary had aircraft and ships searching the area, which were joined by ships and aircraft of the Thai navy and air force.

A drilling rig mounted in the center of the ship, reaching 60 feet or higher, was stacked with equipment and there was concern the ship might have been too topheavy to weather such a fierce storm, Lane said. "We expect to be putting some divers in the water to be looking at it, but I think they're a little leery of that because of the weather conditions," Lane said. Unocal officials said the crew included 67 Thai nation-

als and 30 people from other nations. Just before the typhoon hit, the Seacrest was in the Platong field, located about 270 miles south of Bangkok, and the crew was preparing to run casing into a recently drilled well, a statement from Unocal said. The well was secured as the storm formed.

Unocal lost contact with the vessel about 12 hours after the storm struck Thursday. The typhoon developed suddenly and the crew of the Seacrest had relatively short notice, Lane said. "This actually was a small storm, a squall, and it escalated very quickly into a tropical storm, and then a typhoon," Lane said.



Court employes strike in search of more security

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Court employees crip-pled the judicial system Friday with their third strike of the anti-drug war, led by judges who want guns and bulletproof cars for protection from assassins hired by cocaine barons.

A union of judges and court workers said this strike had no time limit. The first strike lasted a week and the second three days.

Also on Friday, all 42 of Medellin's federal judges announced they were resigning, according to the Colombian radio network RCN. They had begun an indefinite strike Thursday, demanding more protection from drug

The resignations are not effective unless accepted by the Supreme Court, which usually does not accept such Drug traffickers have killed three federal judges in



LOS ANGELES (AP) - A tiff over a master tape of a new Tiffany album has surfaced in federal court, where MCA Records is suing a producer for the pop singer. A federal complaint alleges that producer George Tobin threatened to sell to another company a master tape of a new Tiffany album containing songs, the copyrights of which are owned by MCA.

Tobin signed an exclusive contract with MCA in April 1986 under which the record company had sole rights to manufacture and distribute Tiffany's records, cassettes and compact disks, according to the lawsuit. Tobin said the lawsuit was a move by Tiffany and MCA to force a change in his recording agreement with



SEWAGE PLANT PERMIT ISSUE

When The Town was expanding its sewage treatment plant to meet Clean Water Act requirements, A controversy developed with the Federal Government. It almost cost Manchester millions. But the leadership of Democratic Mayor Peter DiRosa minimized the impact on the Taxpayers.

NEW HAVEN (AP) — The Big Red left the Yale Blue a bit red-faced Friday after wily members of Cornell University's student newspaper managed to replace Yale's daily newspaper with a parody. The spoof carried a lead story announcing tha Yale football Coach Carm Cozza, whose team will play Cornell on Saturday in New Haven, had been

nabbed for selling drugs. The mock edition of the Yale Daily News also featured stories on Yale graduate William F. Buckley Jr.'s acceptance of a new professorship of American elitism, Yale's purchase of the city of New Haven for \$14 million and a Yale researcher's findings that wearing black turtlenecks can cause

Lest anyone not catch the obvious joke, a correction on the second page of the paper reported that the entire contents of the newspaper were false. The Cornell Daily Sun announced its accomplishment Friday, saying the newspaper had pulled similar pranks against Harvard in 1959 and

Princeton in 1965. The Yale Daily News, the oldest college daily, i printed at the New Haven Register, Well before dawn Friday, staffers from the Daily Sun removed the real copies of the Yale paper from a loading dock at the Register and replaced them with the

A driver for the Daily News picked up the fake papers, put address labels on them and delivered them to the Yale post office - in the belief they were a joke edition put out by the Yale staff. But the office manager at the Yale paper immediately noticed something was amiss and alerted the daily's editors, who scrambled to retrieve the phony papers. Still, about 100 copies of the phony paper made it into circulation, according to Thom



He arrived at the prison system's Federal Medical Center here at about 11:45 a.m., said spokesman Gary Driver. He was transferred this morning from the Federal Correctional Institution at Talladega, Ala.

Bakker, 49, arrived at Talladega the night of Oct. 24, several hours after he was sentenced by a federal judge in Charlotte, N.C., to 45 years in prison and fined \$500,000. The Talladega facility often is the first stop for prisoners in the Southeast before they are sent to more permanent lodgings. While in Talladega, Bakker was visited by his wife,

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High court to rule on Fifth Amendment

BALTIMORE (AP) — The case of a woman behind bars for refusing to disclose the whereabouts of her son gives the Supreme Court an opportunity to refine how the Fifth Amendment protects people against self-incrimination, lawyers say. Ralph Tyler III of the Maryland attorney general's of-

fice plans to argue before the high court Tuesday that the importance of protecting an endangered child outweighs the constitutional claim of Jacqueline Bouknight, who has been jailed in Baltimore for 18 months for contempt

Her lawyers say the case could affect whether courts may use their contempt powers to persuade defendants to produce evidence that could help convict them.

"If Ralph were right ... we wouldn't need a criminal code. We could just hold people in contempt until they produce the evidence," said George Burns Jr., a state public defender who is representing Bouknight.
City social workers have not seen Bouknight's son Maurice, now 3 years old, for more than two years and

fear he may be dead. Maurice, born on Oct. 3, 1986, was hospitalized twice before he was 4 months old with pneumonia and a broken leg. Social workers said his mother was seen shaking the baby and dropping him into his hospital crib. According to prosecutors, X-rays revealed the child had previous bone fractures.

The state took protective custody of the child for several months, but his mother regained custody in July 1987, after promising not to physically punish him and to undergo training in parenthood.

Nine months later, after social workers said Bouknight had ceased to cooperate with them and would not show them her son, a juvenile court issued a civil contempt order that she be jailed until she revealed his

Bouknight, now 23, remains in the Baltimore City Jail. ler attorneys refused to allow her to be interviewed. saying she is hampered by severe learning difficulties, although she meets legal standards of mental competency. "She's sort of a lost soul," Burns said, noting that he from place to place."

Maurice's father, who had been jailed for distributing cocaine, was shot to death in March 1988, and Bouknight had a history of drug use, according to testimony injuvenile court. Defense attorneys say if the child has been harmed or

killed, Bouknight would be the most likely suspect, even if someone else were responsible. "If she said, 'I can't produce the baby, the baby's dead and gone,' it doesn't take a very imaginative prosecutor to add up the facts," Burns said. "... You can have suc-

cessful prosecutions of innocent people," The Fifth Amendment forbids authorities from compelling people to testify against themselves but does not prohibit courts from ordering them to perform certain actions, Tyler said. For example, courts have held that suspects can be required to provide samples of their blood, handwriting and voice, and to stand in a police lineup.

Shopping network, GTE settle lawsuit

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Stamford, Conn.-based GTE accepted an undisclosed cash sum to settle its two-year legal battle with Home Shopping Network Inc., with both sides saying Friday it was too expensive to keep fighting over a \$100 million jury

GTE Florida and GTE Communications won the libel and slander award in August after a Circuit Court jury rejected HSN's \$1.5 billion suit claiming GTE provided ineffective telephone equipment and

Under terms of the settlement, the companies agreed to end all litigation and release claims against each other. HSN had been mounting an appeal of the jury award, a process company officials say could have taken up to five years to resolve. "It's already been two years now that we've been knocking each other's brains out, and I think both companies realized it's time to put this behind us," said Nando DiFillippo, HSN vice president and executive counsel. "To take it through the appeal and possible retrial would have continued to tie up our top management and could have cost us \$1 million

to \$1.5 million." James V. Cariedo, GTE Florida vice president and general counsel, said the company had made its point and it was time to move on.

"This matter has been concluded with the in tegrity and reputation of GTE and its employees reaffirmed. Our vindication is complete," he said. "GTE believes it is in the company's best interest to eliminate any further expense and use of resources

While the amount of the settement was not disclosed, company officials did say it was negligible compared to the \$100 million jury award. "Remember this began with HSN seeking \$1 billion, and it became a matter of quibbling over a

relatively small amount," said Larry Gerbrant, an analyst who has followed the case for Paul Kagan & Associates in Carmel, Calif. "All that really matters to GTE is the fact that they won a huge moral victory," he said. "The ver-

dict in this case came as a stunning surprise." HSN had claimed it lost millions of calls and \$500 million in potential sales in 1986 and early 1987 because the GTE telephone equipment it contracted for couldn't handle the volume of calls. HSN merchandise may be bought by home

television viewers only while the item is being dispayed on the screen. HSN said it lost 42 million calls when as many as half of its incoming calls never reached waiting sales operators. The jury rejected HSN's claims and agreed with GTE's countersuit that the video retailer was blaming the phone company for financial problems that

were actually caused by mismanagement. In another development Friday, Clearwater-based HSN reported it lost \$26.1 million, or 29 cents a share, in the quarter ended Aug. 31 compared with net income of \$3.3 million, or 4 cents a share, a

year ago.

Its fourth-quarter revenue rose 11.5 percent to \$187.4 million from \$168.1 million a year ago. For the year, HSN lost \$14.9 million, or 17 cents per share, in contrast to net income of \$18 million, or 21 cents a share, in the previous year.

Revenue for the year rose 6.1 percent to \$774.3 million from \$730.1 million a year ago. HSN Chairman Roy Speer attributed the loss to reducing or eliminating subsidiaries to focus on video retailing.

NEW YORK - Among its many other afflictions, Wall Street lately has come down with a new and acute case of cyberphobia. The term, defined simply as the fear of computers, was coined decades ago when scientists first began to experiment with electronic methods of handling information and conducting business.

Now it is focusing on the computer-driven tactics, such as multiple transactions involving stock-index futures and individual stocks, that are collectively known as program trading, and are feared to be threatening severe harm to the inlegrity of the markets. The latest outcry began in last

Jones stars in pool hall story

NEW YORK - James Earl Jones, who plays a pool hall owner in "Third and Oak: the Pool Hall, has a pool table in his suburban home. He piles books on it. But in case his 6-year-old son ever

wants to learn to play, it's there. "Third and Oak: the Pool Hall," a three-characte play by Marsha Norman, will be shown on the A&E cable network on Sunday. It's the first of four one-hour plays by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwrights to be shown on A&E on the first Thursday of four months as "American Playwrights Theater," a GM Mark of Excellence presentation. At first, Jones wasn't sure he wanted to play the character, he says, since he likes to portray people who, whether or not they're poor, are worthwhile "That was the problem here. I had to accept he was

a jerk. I'm playing not a villain but not a right guy. had to readjust my thinking. "He is one of the blind ones. I defined Troy Maxson in 'Fences' (Jones played Maxson on Broadway) as a man who didn't distinguish his principles from his prejudices. This is such a man. He seemed gratuitously racialist if not racist when it came to references to people outside his race, particularly to the girl who visits the pool hall. She is blond. She qualifies, in his eyes, for derision.

"I had a problem with that. I don't like promote gratuitous racialism at all. "I had to understand that white people had never meant anything good to him. He can't understand how, on a romantic level, they can mean something good to the man he thinks of essentially as his son. He can't see shared genuine affection and love between people who come from different worlds. He can't see she is as desperate as the young man and their desperation is very similar. They resolve it without having a messy affair, as my character had

"My character, who's in a closed society, behaves as if he's a Mafia don. He expects obedience and the mantle to be passed."

Mario Van Peebles, star of the TV series "Sonny Spoon," and Debra Cole act with Jones. Marsha Norman won the Pulitzer Prize in 1983 for "'night Mother." The other playwrights in the series are Eugene O'Neill, Paul Zindel and Ten-

nessee Williams. "Having been around a long time doesn't mean good scripts are going to come flowing your way in excess," Jones says. "There are more good actors than good works."

But Jones stays busy. He was a poet in the film "Field of Dreams"; played civil rights leader Ver non Jordan in the first "Saturday Night with Connie Chung" docudrama on NBC-TV; and recently narrated "Ivory Wars," about African elephants, on the Discovery Channel. He has made several movies, not yet released,

since "Field of Dreams." "I have a 6-year-old. I have to keep working. I don't make multimillions per movie. I don't think anybody should, frankly. "I like the young crowd of actors coming up. The young man who played my son in 'Fences,' Courtney Vance, is in 'Hamburger Hill.' It's on cable this week. I've seen it five times, to see his scenes. He's a phenomenal actor. He ranks with young actors like Eric Roberts, Terence Booth, Alec Baldwin, Kevin Costner. They're strong without being macho bulls. They're strong as people." Next, Jones goes to Louisiana to play the man who runs the company store in the movie "Convicts." The wardrobe mistress told him to bring

clothes he wore in "Matewan," which was about coal miners in the 1920s. Some moviegoers recognized his voice as Darth Vader in "Star Wars," though the credits listed the actor inside the costume and helmet.

Social Security

OUESTION: I recently received benefit estimate from Social Security that said I would receive \$720 per month if I retired at age 62, or \$900 per month if I waited until I was 65 to retire. My calculations show that it would take until I was 80 before I got ahead by retiring at age 62 instead of retiring at 65. Is that right?

ANSWER: The average break even point is approximately 12 1/2 years. That means that you would be 77 1/2 when the total amount of money you receive from Social Security by taking an early retirement equaled the amount you would R receive by retiring at 65.

OUESTION: How long does it actually take to file for retirement

benefits, and can I do it by phone? phone and the process doesn't usually take more than 30 to 60 minutes, depending on the complexity of your claim. To make a teleclaim, call Social Security.

QUESTION: My 8-year-old daughter has been receiving SSI payments all her life because of a severe spinal defect. Recently, her checks were reduced because her sister, age 16, just began working. This doesn't seem fair. My oldest daughter still lives at home, but she isn't helping to pay for her sister's

ANSWER: Your 8-year-old daughter was eligible for assistance through SSI, based on your low income, and based on the fact that your income goes to support all of the children in your household. When your 16-year-old daughter took a job, the amount of your income that went to support her went down, leaving more to support your disabled daughter. That's why the SSI payment was reduced. If your older daughter stops working, or if her salary decreases, be sure to let Social Security know right away so that your other daughter's SSI payment can be adjusted accordingly.

Focus/Movies 'Baker Boys' is jazzy, sultry

By Robert DiMatteo THE FABULOUS BAKER BOYS (R) In the mood for a juicy, jazzy romance with three star performances and some hard-edged feeling to it? Then see writer-director Steve Kloves' comedy-drama about two brothers (Jeff and Beau Bridges) whose

career are cocktail lounge pianists is disrupted when they take on a sexy vocalist (Michelle Pfeiffer). Beautifully shot, the movie immerses us in the day-to-day (and night-by-night) world of glitzy, smoke-filled clubs where you're always likely to

hear one more rendition of "Feelings." What keeps the movie going is the charmed, uncanny chemistry between the three leads. The Bridges brothers are simply two of the best movie actors of their generation: You never catch them "acting," but when you think back on their performances, you realize you've witnessed rich, varied and distinctive characterizations. Here they bring their real-life fraternal relationship to bear on two very well-written roles.

As a musician who might have achieved great things had he struck out on his own, Jeff has never been so attractive, so intriguingly melancholy. Beau is equally fine as the pragmatist, the one who has

kept the act together. Best of all, there's Michelle Pfeifer as the exhooker whose sultry voice brings the brothers new attention, all the while unearthing an intense rivalry etween them. Pfeiffer is absolutely breathtaking in this movie. There's an already famous scene where she slinks around on top of a piano in a red dress

while singing "Makin' Whoopee." There are some problems, particularly in the second half when the movie seems to lose momentum and overdoses on mood. Pfeiffer does her own vocals, and it must be said that she acts the songs better than she sings them. But only hard-core musicians are likely to notice - or care. This is the most romantic movie we've had in a long time. GRADE: ***

LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13) This comedy about a single working mother (Kirstie Alley) with a baby whose thoughts are voiced by Bruce Willis is for people who don't mind spending money to see what they can watch for free on TV There must be a lot of them: The picture has opened big, and it looks like the first hit in years for John Travolta, playing a friendly cabbie who becomes a

baby-sitter for the tot. Travolta's performances in "Blow Out" and "Saturday Night Fever" are justly celebrated, and he's genial enough here. But it's time for him to grow up and stop trading on his boyish charm. He might consider a new diet, too." He's overweight

chunky in this movie. Written and directed by Amy Heckerling ("Fast Times at Ridgemont High"), and film is extremely coarse. There are breast jokes, sperm jokes and even senility jokes. The gimmick of a baby talking like a smarty-pants doesn't make sense, and it doesn't have anything to do with the movie's oth er subject- the mother's attempt to find a suitable

father for her child. George Segal turns up as the married cad who gets Kirstie Alley pregnant. Segal is all too effective in the role. (Whatever happened to this actor's charm?) Alley saves a few scenes with her easygoing sense of comedy. But why not just watch her on "Cheers," where the writing is a lot better than in this film? GRADE: *

Focus/Music **Boy George** is coming back

LOS ANGELES - Boy George, the androgynous former president of Culture Club, is trying to climb back up the pop charts after surviving the crushing downers of heroin addiction and the overdose deaths of two friends.

"I'm totally relaxed about my life," he says, declaring a new state of mind. "I'm totally relaxed about what I am and what I do and what I feel." Boy George has come to the United States on a temporary visa, the first time he has been allowed to do so since his 1986 conviction for heroin pos-

session in England. The conviction, which led to the disintegration of the hit-making Culture Club one year later, forced the singer into a rehabilitation program. Treatment was complicated by the drug-related deaths of two close friends, one at Boy George's London man-

During a recent visit to Los Angeles, Boy George - whose real name is George O'Dowd described himself as happy and healthy, with an understanding that life isn't always perfect. "I think a lot of the things that happen to me are

self-created," he said. "There are still days when I get out of the bed on the wrong side and everything goes wrong. That happens to all of us." His current solo album, "High Hat," was released to favorable reviews earlier this year but didn't get much airplay in this country. He hopes his U.S. visit will spur interest in a soon-to-be-released

single, "Whisper." The singles previously released from the album were "quite funky" and didn't appeal to Top 40 radio stations, he said. He also believes some radio programmers don't think the public can forgive him

for his past problems. But Boy George doesn't seem concerned that his popularity might have waned over the past three "I have a place in the music industry," he said. "

have a really good following - a loyal following. I think you really can't ask for more than that." Now 28, Boy George hit the music scene at the start of the decade as a backup singer with the British group Bow Wow Wow. In those days he was known as Lieutenant Lush. He eventually formed his own group, the Sex Gang Children, which later evolved into the internationally successful quartet Culture Club. Boy George assumed the role as the group's most visible member, attracting attention with gobs of makeup and a smooth-as-silk voice in

a 6-foot frame. "If you look at the pop industry, not a lot of people stick out as being particularly interesting," he said. "I think at the time we were the most colorful thing happening."

Culture Club's four albums — "Kissing to Be

Clever," "Colour by Numbers," "Waking Up With the House on Fire" and "From Luxury to Heartache" - quickly became top-sellers in the first half of the 1980s. This was largely due to a unique style that combined pop, funk, reggae and soul. Boy George, however, remains humble when it

comes to Culture Club's popularity. "We were really lucky. We were just in the right place at the right time," he said. "It's a bit like trying to catch a taxi." But the Culture Club's taxi took a wrong turn, In July 1986, Boy George was arrested in Lon-

charge, was fined \$370 and agreed to enter a treatment program for his drug addiction. Shortly after his conviction, Michael Rudetski, a friend and colleague, died at the singer's London

Bodies pile up in Clancy book

counterproductive." A tall, easygoing man who wears tinted aviator glasses, Clancy says he is not trying to send a message with his book. "If you want to send a message, use Western Union," he says with a laugh. "My job is to enter-

And he's certainly succeeded at that. Although he came rather late to writing - he had his own insurance business from 1969 to 1985 - Clancy has made up for lost time. His first novel, "The Hunt for Red October," was a popular megahit, as have been the books that followed it. Clancy, who lives with his wife and their four

children on an 80-acre spread in rural southern Maryland, says the success of his books more than surprised him. "Surprise is not enough of an emotion," he says "Better to say - amazed, thunderstruck,

NEW YORK (AP) - Over the centuries, garlic has been credited with a lot of powers having nothing whatever to do with pepping up food. As Carole E. Schneider notes in her fact- as well as recipe-filled book, "Fresh: A Greenmarket Cookbook" (Random House):

"For centuries, garlic has been prescribed for everything from backaches and epilepsy to frostbite and scorpion stings. A head of garlic hung on the bedroom door is supposed to guarantee the birth of a baby boy. But did you know that it could stave off vampires? Wear a cluster of this miracle herb around your neck and fear no more." Garlic, however, doesn't ward off gray hair. That honor goes to leeks, the national vegetable of Wales, and sometimes called "poor man's

Leeks "are so hardy they can survive winter underground. An Assyrian herbal says they will keep your hair from turning gray, something even garlic can't claim." Schneider's cookbook, which is nicely illustrated

and has a handy spiral binding, also has many other food stories to tell. Among them: · "The curly blue-green leaves of kale are especially popular in Scotland and the southern United States. The Scottish poet Robert Burns records a curious Halloween practice: couples walked handin-hand with eyes shut into the fields, where they picked the first kale plant they could find. Its size, shape and taste were meant to foretell the appearance and temper of their future mates." · "When Esau renounced his birthright for a dish of lentils, he showed wisdom in the ways of food, if nothing else. 

Bruce Newman, who runs the world's largest an-tiques store, specializes in "fantasy furniture" that draws clients including Jacqueline Onassis, Jane

Fonda and Dan Aykroyd. The fantasy pieces, according to an article in the current issue of Connoisseur, include vitrines adorned with starfish and sea horses, antlermounted Bavarian standishes, carved polychromed peacock chairs, a cradle in the shape of a swan, Black Forest bear lamps, a giant "grotto" mollusk love seat and cork furniture that looks as if it had some terrible skin disease.

Newman is the animating force behind Newel Art Galleries, and this month he will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the store his father founded by turning the National Academy of Design in New York into a seven-room fantasy showcase.

The five-story Newel Art Galleries in New York contains what Newman estimated as "several

hundred thousand" pieces.

Though most of his stock is of decorator quality, about 10 percent is what he calls fantasy. "I used to call it 'quality camp,'" Newman said,
"But if I call it 'fantasy furniture,' I can charge more money for it." Newman is heavily stocked with current

decorator mainstays - Biedermeier, art deco, art nouveau, Charles X, bentwood and bamboo. Now he is buying pearl-inlaid papier-mache furniture and 18th and 19th century Russian furniture. He trusts the decorators who make up 60 to 70 percent of his sales will follow suit. "If you're looking for something, he's got it,



Photography Czechs observe

anniversary

Photography is alive and well in Czechoslovakia. To celebrate the 150th anniversary of photography, the Czechoslovak Union of Journalists recently sponsored three large exhibitions and a symposium in Prague.

The largest show was a colossal history of photography that contained 1,200 photographs. Although its cramped layout made the prints difficult to appreciate, the large selection of historical works from Romania, Hungary, East Germany and the Soviet Union made the exhibition unique. Other exhibitions featured Czech photography from the 1940s and Czechoslovak photojournalism.

The photojournalism show was well-conceived and certainly well-done. Two large rooms held the exhibition, which was divided into five clearly In the first room, a history of Czech and Slovak photojournalism wrapped around the four walls,

defining the subject and placing the rest of the show within its proper historical framework. Work from World War II was particulary poignant. Josef Novak's 1939 photograph of the German army's entrance into Prague after the partition shows two soldiers in an open car passing in front of a crowd whose individu emotions of sadness, fury and defiance.

With the arrival of the Nazi government photographs showing the harsh realities of life in the occupied country and war photography were not permitted. To make this fact visually clear, the exhibition curator displayed a group of comparisons: typical magazine covers of the period showing such scenes as happy children in regional dress and grandmothers with babies were contrasted to a suppressed 1942 photo of a citizen shot dead in the street by the Nazis.

One photograph is especially significant and universally known in the region. Taken in 1945, when the Soviets liberated the country from the German occupation, it shows a Czech who has apparently jumped off his bike in his haste to embrace an arriving Russian soldier. Titled "Fraternity," it captures some of the obvious relief and joy at the end of the war. Like our own picture by Joe Rosenthal of the flag-raising at Iwo Jima, this photo was translated into a large statue, which stands in

Along with the photographs, the historical section incorporated photographs of magazine covers and inside pages showing the context and layout style over the years. While the exhibition dealt with the 1944 Slovak National Uprising and the 1945 National Uprising, no mention was made of Prague Spring, 1968 and its suppression by the Soviets. It seems clear enough why this aspect of more recent times was excluded - perestroika still has some way to go in Czechoslovakia. In the center of the first room were three other sections: reportage, feature and sports. In the

second room was a large section titled "Profiles," where about six photographs by each of 20 living Czech photojournalists were displayed. This allowed the photographers to demonstrate, among other things, that their one famous picture was not an isolated "lucky shot" but part of a life's work. This exhibition was superior to most shows of its kind. Many American exhibitions jumble small photographs on a panel with no attention to how

they interrelate.

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


