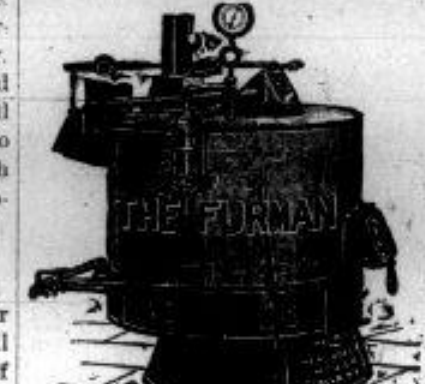

CREAMED POTATOES.—This dish is the best prepared from new potatoes, but others can be used. If new, rub the skins, but do not scrape; if old, peel them before cooking...

DUCHESS BISCUITS.—Roll half a pint of cold water or milk, two ounces of sugar and one ounce of white flour through a fine sieve. Then add one ounce of butter, one ounce of white sugar, four ounces of butter (which latter must first be dissolved) and a quarter of a teaspoonful of carbonate of soda...

CREAMED POTATOES.—This dish is the best prepared from new potatoes, but others can be used. If new, rub the skins, but do not scrape; if old, peel them before cooking. Cook quickly in boiling water. Have ready a pint of sweet cream and milk, mixed in equal parts. Drain the potatoes and roll the paste out thin. Cut in rounds with a plain cutter, put the biscuit on a well-greased pan and bake about twenty minutes.
