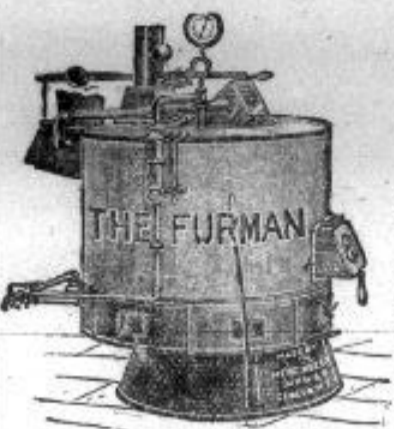

This recipe: One cup, each of molasses, sweet milk and seeded raisins; the meats from a pound of English walnuts minced fine; four ounces of chopped figs, one ounce grated, a teaspoonful of salt and one of soda; two and a half cups of flour; mix like a plum pudding, steam two and a half hours, and eat with the following cream sauce: Beat to a cream half a cup of butter and one of condensed sugar; whip a cup of sweet cream and stir into the butter and sugar; put the whole in a double boiler over the fire and stir until it looks foamy and smooth.

RECIPE.
Lemon Jelly Cake.—One and a half cups of sugar; one-half cup of butter beat to a cream; then add two and a half cups flour; one-half cup milk; two teaspoons baking powder; one egg beaten; bake in jelly tin.
To make the jelly, take in jelly tin: one egg; grated yellow rind and juice of one lemon; one teaspoon water; one teaspoonful of cream. Cook over hot water, and spread between the cakes when cool.
