BEEBE STEEL SPRING BICYCLE TIRE.

A promising invention that will probably be manufactured in Bristol. Sketch of the tire.

Since pneumatic bicycle tires have come into use they have been very popular, but as they possess certain inherent disadvantages there has been a demand for a tire that had the desirable features of the pneumatic without its drawbacks...

The inventor, Mr. John D. Beebe, informs the Press that a plant will be quite established to do the work in place of letting it out by contract.

The weight of a set of tires complete is 2 1/2 lbs. and the cost will be a little less than the average pneumatic. They will be on the market as soon as they can be manufactured.

The beauty of the tire is that you will bend the rim of the tire when, long before you injure the tire, it will enable a rider to start out on a trip, without fearing of walking back on account of puncture.

The tire is free from compressed air and any sharp object cannot injure it.

As will be seen readily from our engraving the invention, like many another successful one, while simple is effective.

The springs of finely tempered steel are about two inches long and are set consecutively around the tire and are embedded in the rubber, thus making it impossible for them to get out of place or break.

The illustration shows a single spring on the right, and on the left is a sectional view of the tire showing manner in which the spring is enclosed in the rubber. The tire is in hollow.

Practical bicycle men who have examined and tested the invention believe it to be a promising one.
