These pins are placed in V-shaped rows about six inches apart, each row containing about fifteen ourshaped pins two inches in height and about one inch apart. The operator presses a bunch of the whisks containng the seeds against the revolving cylinder, the teeth of which, traveling at the rate of 350 revolutions per minute, tear through the material, scraping off the seed from the whisks.

If the material is old, having lost its green appearance, it is dyed. The stalks are then clipped off and the whisks made of an even length. The



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


