

UNCLE BOB'S SUNDAY TALK. A DISCOURSE ON A TYPEWRITER-MACHINE, NOT OPERATOR, WHICH PINDS FAVOR.

By an ingenious change in the mechanism the ribbon is shifted sidewise every time it is reversed, so that the ordinary life of the ribbon is very much prolonged, rendering the machine much more economical to run, and giving a much cleaner and more uniform impression. The
