

TO CLEAN ECBU LACE. To clean ecru lace, which has become too dusty and soiled for further use, give it a dry bath in flour. About a quart of flour should be put into a bowl, the lace dipped into it, and then rubbed and squeezed with the hands as if the flour were water. After it has received a good shaking, it will look as fresh and good as ever. Lace should never be ironed, for by so doing, it is robbed of its fine appearance. Black lace may be revived, and saved from the "rusty" look that is wont to come with wear, by washing it in equal quantities of milk and water.
