Scottish Geographical Magazine. Some Antique Phrases.

Glasgow Christian Leader. "Conspicnous by its absence," we are told, is an expression used by Lord Russell in a speech made by him in 1859, but the expression is as old as Tacitus. having been employed by that historien in exactly the same way as by Lord John Russell, who, being a finished classical scholar, no doubt translated and adapted it to his own use. The phrase "to die in the last ditch" was first used by William, prince of Orange, who, during the war with France, was asked what he would do in case the troops of Holland were defested in the field, and who replied; "I will die in the last ditch." The "baker's dozen," meaning thirteen, lates back to the time of Edward L. when very rigid laws were enated regarding the sale of bread by bakers. The punishment for falling short in the sale of loaves by the dozen was so severe that in order to run no risk the bakers were accustomed to give thirteen or fourteen loaves to the dozen. and thus arose this peculiar expression.
