

118,445 votes, running 2281 ahead of Foster. The Populists and Republicans wanted to go behind the roturns, but, after several hours' discussion as to the constitutionality of do-ing so, a vote was taken, resulting in a de-cisive viotory for the Democrats. The propo-sition to go behind the returns was rejected by a vote of 86 to 48, seventeen members elected by the Citizens' League of New Or-leans voting with the majority, the remain-ing eight going with the Populists-Republi-cans.
