



Under the terms of the Greater new 1012 act, this Commission must prepare a charter for the great r city, and submit it to the Legislature by February 1, 1897, and shall cease to exist on March 1 of the same year.

The Commission has power to make complete investigation of the municipal corporations to be consolidated; to subposns and swear witnesses; to examine public records and documents of these municipalities, and to make any inquiry which they may deem necessary to the framing of a charter for the greater city. The Commission may employ greater city. The Commission may employ counsel and other persons that they may deem necessary for the prosecution of the work. The charter which the Commission is charged with framing must be one of uniformity, drawn upon the principle of uniform taxation for the entire consolidated territory. The expenses of the Commission are limited to \$25,000, which shall be raised by the cities of New York and Brooklyn.


