### Merchants' Marks.

These marks appear to have been imitated from the Flemings during the reign of Edward III., and became very common during the fifteenth and early part of the sixteenth century, both on seals and signet rings; they offered a somewhat curious field for research, and are often very useful in identifying the persons by whom domestic and parts of ecclesiastical edifices on which they occur were built. They were more generally used in the great seaports of England than in the South, a fact which is readily accounted for by the frequent intercourse be tween those parts and Flanders. may be observed also that such marks belong chiefly to wool factors or merchants of the staple. - Archaeological




