There is much less waste by manuring than is commonly supposed. If fresh manure from stables is drawn out as made and spread over the surface, the winter snows and rains leak through it, and whatever soluble fertility it contains slowly soaks into the soil. Unless the surface is frozen or the land is flooded from running water coming from above, there is never any washing of the surface soil to carry off its fertility. On the contrary, the manure is much better mixed with the soil than it could be if left until spring when if plowed under the rains seldom come heavy enough to thoroughly it was the star of the flocks of Africa, soak the manure in the soil.







WARRINGTON, D. C. (Special), -Presiden weland Wednesday afternoon, in a significant speech, formally recognized the new Greater Republic of Central America, composed of Salvador, Nicaragua and Honduras, by receiving in the East Room of the Executive Mansion the Envoy of the Diet of the new Government, J. D. Rodriguez, who was accompanied by his Secretary of Legation. Luis F. Corea, and his attache, J. D. Rodriguez, Jr. Secretary Olney presented the Central Americans, who wore full evening dress. Minister Bodriguez was in Washagton ten years ago as ag-nt for Nicaragua in a boundary dispute with Costa Bica, which the President decided as arbitrator. The delay in receiving Dr. Rodriguez was due to a desire on the part of the President to know what the nature of the confederacy was, and whether it was of such character as to justify the reception of an envoy to repre-sent all three republics, and whether the recognition thus established would in any way affect the status of the Nicaragua canal

Dr. Bodriquez said to the President that the Greater Republic, in sending him to Washington, instructed him to give assursees to the United States that the Greater Bepublic of Central America entertains the same sentiments of cordial good will toward this country that had always been held by he three Governments composing the new The President, in reply, spoke as follows:

"Mr. Minister: I take pleasure in recognizing, in the name of the United States of america, the Greater Republic of Central America, constituted pursuant to stipulations f the treaty of Amapala of June 20, 1895, between the republics of Honduras, Nicaraqua and Salvador and in entering into dipomatic relations therewith.
