



What has been described as the commercial death rate—that is, the ratio of the number failing in business to the approximate total number of those established in commercial, industrial and financial occupations—has increased sharply during the past year, amounting to 1.49 per cent., contrasted with 1.23 per cent. in 1895, 1.21 per cent. in 1894, and with 1.5 per cent. in the panic year 1893, which is the highest commercial death rate recorded. The significance of this is plain when it is pointed out that from 1883 to 1895, inclusive, omitting the panic years 1884 mile less than the total reported for 1895, and is the smallest mileage built in any year since 1875.
