The New York Journal thinks ecologists in rounding up the microbes are rather overdoing the matter when they discover a lurking danger in fresh eggs.

Fashion affects suicide as well as other things. "The time was," says the London Lancet, "when laudanum, morphia and opium were the favorite poisons, but now carbolic acid has taken their place, and according to the latest available returns (1894), the latter caused more than twice as many suicidal deaths as the three former combined, for whereas the opiate poisoned 82 persons, carbolic acid poisoned 167."

The Chicago Timberman estimates that the agricultural implement manufacturers of this country use a total of 1,448,293,750 feet of lumber annually, of which white pine, pine, spruce, fir, hemlock, yellow pine, poplar, mahogany, etc., are used. The value of the lumber produced in this country is estimated at \$2,200,000,000. The annual export of lumber is valued at \$12,763,600.

There is an increasing demand from the West for one-cent pieces, and the government is turning out enormous quantities of these coins. It looks to the New York Mail and Express as though the Western people were learning the useful lesson of taking care of the pennies and trusting the dollars to take care of themselves.

England has her color question. An Indian law student has been refused admission to the Inns of Court. Voltaire, London, because, though a British subject, he is ineligible to serve the Queen in an English corps. As a result Indian law students, of whom there are many, are finding much public sympathy in their agitation against the attempt to brand them as social inferiors.

The Brooklyn Eagle states one of the important issues of our day and generation in a comprehensive way. It says: "If we are to have honest municipal government the time must come when political partisanship shall be subordinate to the question of the honest and efficient conduct of the business of a city on business principles. Then men who believe in getting a dollar's worth of work for every hundred cents expended will be the men who believe that public work is necessarily more costly than private work and who have a share in the great profits which that cost makes possible."

New York tailors say they are not suffering from the wheel in the way the London tailors complain of. For a while, they admit, their business was hurt owing to the fact that men lived so much in their bicycle clothes. Now the riders spend so much on their wheeling costumes, the tailors say, that there has been no permanent loss of work. "While on the subject, by the way," it may be mentioned, "the walk heard in all quarters about the discomfit of the business of the wheel has been hushed this year, but whether because there is no longer cause for lament or because it has been found of no avail has not been ascertained."

The London Graphic is quite sure that the next summer will see a general revival of the fondness for quick croquet; in fact, says the reviewer, it is a decided renaissance of the game, and it believes that tennis and the bicycle will not suffer thereby, but thinks all three will flourish more than ever. The out-of-door freedom bred by the bicycle seems to make the most spacious and airy houses seem "stuffy," and contracted, and though an earnest cyclist might question as to the amount of exercise to be gotten out of a game that filled the air with its "click, click," back in the sixties, it certainly is one more way of enticing people to stay in the open, unwritten air.

With each recurring week the importance of the cathode ray is more distinctly emphasized. 50,000,000 Slaves in Africa. Heli Chatain, a traveler in the Dark Continent, declared before the American Geographical Society in New York on "The Internal Slave Trade in Africa."

"If any one thinks that slave trading is a thing of the past," he said, as quoted in the New York Sun, "it is mistaken. Among the 200,000,000 of people in Africa, at least 50,000,000 are slaves."

If a British estimate to which he referred was correct, Mr. Chatain said, 500,000 lives were sacrificed every year in the traffic. For every slave that reached the coast, eight or nine were sent to the interior. The idea is still prevailing that all of the slave traders in Africa were Arabs or natives was a gross error. In a large part of the interior, slaves were the property of the people.

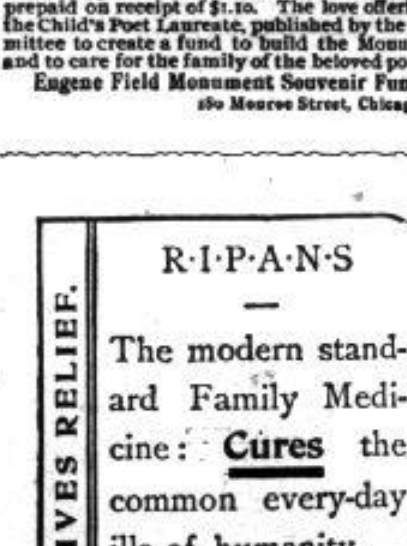
