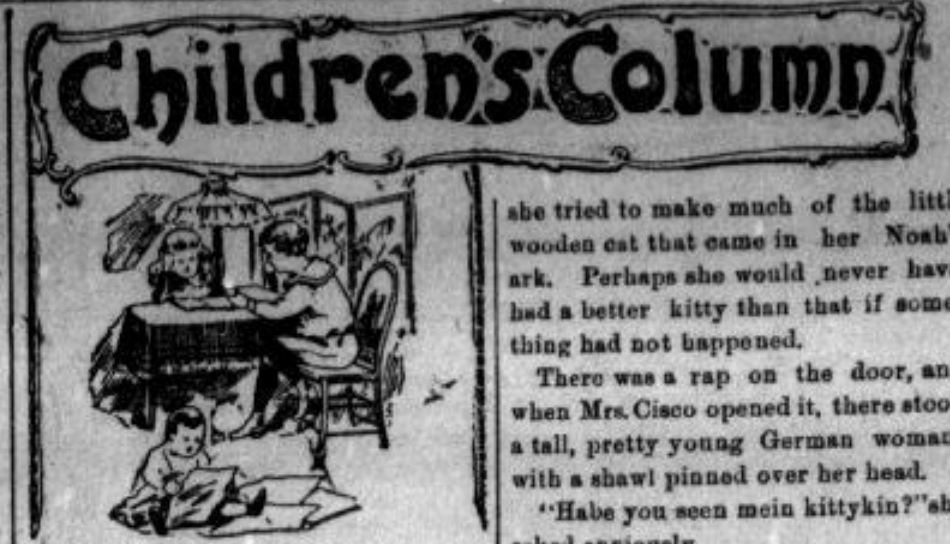

TO WASH BLACK THREAD-STOCKINGS.
