



Two Copies of the Treaty Signed by the British Minister and Secretary Olney dent and by Him Sent to the Senate for Entification ... It is for Five Years. Washington, D. C. - (Special) - Secretary of State Olney, in behalf of the United States, and Sir Julian Pauncefote, on the part of Great Britain, on Monday affixed their signatures to the new treaty by which for a term of five years the two Englishspeaking Nations agree to abide in peace and without resort to arms, all possible questions of controversy being referred to a ecurt of arbitration, with the single exception that neither Nation surrenders its honor or dignity to the judgment of arbitration. Later in the day President Cleveland sent the treaty and a message carnestly approving it to the Senate.


