thin slice of bacon over each breast. Add a half a cupful of water to the pan and bake in a quick oven for thirty minutes. Take from the fire and carve them, making eight pieces of each duck-the wings, legs and second joints together; two pieces of the breast and two of the back. Put two tablespoonfuls of butter in a sauce. pan and stir until a dark brown, then add the flour and mix until smooth. Stir in one pint of stock and continue stirring until it boils, then one bayleal, salt and pepper to taste and five mushrooms, chopped fine. Add to this the ducks and all the grave from the dish on which you carved them; cover and simmer gently for ten minutes. Take from the fire, and serve on a heated dish, with a border of tousted bread cut in triangles. -


