TOWN NEWS AND NOTES.

The new loom was used for the first time last Saturday. Edward J. O'Donnell, one of the pipers at work on the automatic sprinklers in the silk mills, was the first man to be locked up there and he remained but a short time, as P. A. Reese bailed him out. He was arrested for being concerned in a disturbance on a trolley car last Friday night with Conductor Tanner, but the court did not find sufficient evidence to convict him, and on Tuesday, when the case was heard in the town court, he was dismissed, unopposed.
