Easter Lilies in Bermuda Usually the first drive taken by the stranger in Bermuds is to St. George. Old stone walls, covered with flaming blossoms in the spring, separate the road from tiny patches of Bermuda onions, and the fields of Easter lilies for which Bermuda is becoming famous. In blankets of white the lilies stretch out, too pure, too delicate, too beautiful, for adequate description. The luxuriance and perfection of the lilies are all the more surprising when it is known that not much more than ten years ago there were no Easter lilies in Bermuda worthy of mention.
