





To Rival the Ferris Wheel. The department of concessions of the Omaha Exposition has received an application for space for the erection of a mechanical device which will equal, says the Bee, if not surpass, the great Ferris wheel in novelty and engineering ingenuity. It resembles the framework of a gigantic umbrella more than anything else which might be mentioned. The part corresponding to the stick of the umbrella is an immense cylinder, thirty feet in diameter, constructed of steel plates, firmly riveted, making a "standpipe" which rears its head 250 feet above the level of the ground. At the extreme top of this cylinder are fastened twelve long arms, resembling the ribs of an umbrella. These are steel trusses, reaching almost to the ground.
