THE MILITIA WAS ORDERED OUT

The Marchers Refused to Disperse When the Riot Act Was Read to Them-The Sheriff Thought He Was In Danger and Ordered His Deputies to Fire-Deadly Volley Followed the Order.

HAZELTON, Penn. (Special) .- Twenty-two strikers were killed, thirty-six seriously wounded and nearly forty more or less in, pred near here Friday by deputy sheriffs, inder command of Sheriff Martin. The en_ ire region is wildly excited over the affair, and there was every indication that the seputies would be assaulted by friends of he dead and wounded.

Hazieton is in a turmoff. The streets are erowded with citizens of all classes, and are all talking of what they consider a terrible outrage. An indignation meeting was held, at which resolutions were passed denouncing the shooting of the miners, protesting against the sending of troops, on the ground that they are not needed, and demanding the prosecution of the sheriff and his deputies. The citizens also ask that the deputy sheriffs concerned in the affair be discharged from all authority disarmed. They say the local police pree is quite competent to take care of the strikers if any disturbance occurs.

Sheriff Martin, in giving his explanation of the shooting, said: "I fully realize that the foreigners were a desperate lot and valued life at a very small figure. I also saw that parleving with such a gang of infuriated men was entirely out of the question, as they were too excited to isten to reason, and that myself and deputies would be killed if were not rescued or if we did not defend surselves. Cost of Tunneling. About thirty years ago the Mont Cenis tunnel, nearly eight miles long, was constructed at the rate of one kilometer per year, and each kilometer cost \$1,200,000. Nearly ten years later the St. Gotthard tunnel, nine and one-fourth miles long, was constructed at the rate of two kilometers a year, and cost \$800,000 per kilometer. The burning gas had started the remaining glycerine in th partly empty cans standing in a wagon near the derrick. In another wagon near by were cans con-

taining another 120 quarts of the stuff, and this was exploded by the force of the first The second was blended with the first. and the town and surrounding country for miles trembled from the shock. Eight buildings are a total wreck and many others are damaged. The town has a population of about 1200. Many standers were wounded.
