

periment the governor of the Bank of France has now intrusted the work of detection of forged bank notes and of lebentures with altered numbers entirely to a special corps of women clerks. He declares that the keen sensibility of their finger tips enables them in handling a note to distinguish the difference, however slight, between the forged and he real article. The means adopted for bringing to light the falsified numbers on debentures are rather more elaborate and consist mainly in the distinction of the difference in the symmetry of the figures and of the ink used, magnifying glasses being used for the former and

chemical preparations for the latter. The German empress bestows a diploma with her own signature, accompanied by a gold cross, on all German female servants who have remained continuously in one family for 40 years. During the last eight years over 1,000 domestics have received this honor, which is naturally very much prized by the recipients. Her majesty is known to take the greatest interest in the servant question, and she has often pointed out to those about her the importance of reating domestics kindly and well. She is adored in the royal household, and her six sons and little daughters are

taught to be as considerate to their inferiors as to their mother herself. Dorothea Klumpke. Miss Dorothea Klumpke is one of the most talented of women astronomers. Five years ago she was admitted to the Paris observatory, the only woman who had ever been a pupil of it. She new has charge of the eastern tower of that observatory, with a staff of women assistants who are under her management. She is equally talented in her


