SCIENTIFIC SCRAPS.

Electric Fishes.

Some interesting facts have recently been compiled with reference to fishes which have the power of generating electric discharges. Of the fifty species of fishes possessing organs capable of giving electric discharges, three have a particular interest. These are the torpedo fish, which is found in the Bay of Biscay, and belongs to the skate family; the electric eel of the Orinoco, and the thunder fish, found in the Nile and other African waters. The change is developed by some chemical process occurring in the plate in which the electric nerve filaments end, and in some instances the discharge is from the head to the tail, while in the case of other fishes the reverse is true. In a full-sized electric eel or gymnotus, the voltage is probably from 300 to 800 volts, and is easily capable of stunning a man. The momentary currents are sufficient to deflect a galvanometer or magnetize generation and intensity of the discharge are under the control of the animal, which is apparently in no way affected by the action. Also, there are no insulating materials in the fish. and the greatest economy is shown in the generation of the electrical energy.
