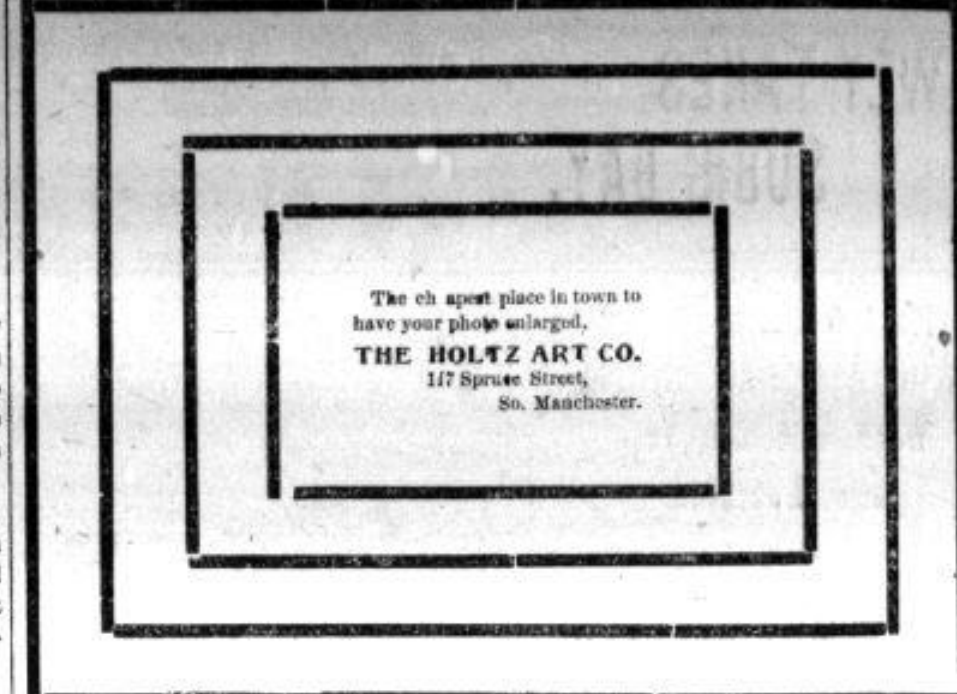

### MILES RAISES OUR FLAG OVER PORTO RICO

### OUR MEN ESCAPE UNHURT

### GUANICA, ON THE SOUTHERN COAST, THE SCENE OF THE LANDING—THE KINNY WAS SURPRISED—SPANIARDS RETREAT AFTER A HEAVY FIRE FROM THE BATTERIES

St. Thomas, Danish West Indies (By Cable).—The United States military expedition under the command of General Miles, Nelson A. Miles, commanding the Army of the United States, which left Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, was landed successfully Monday, at the village of Guanica, on the southern coast of Porto Rico, after a skirmish with a detachment of Spanish troops and a crew of thirty from the launch of the United States auxiliary gunboat Gloucester. Four of the Spaniards were killed and no Americans were hurt.

There were twelve vessels in the expedition, including five warships, among the latter were the battleships Massachusetts, the cruiser Columbia and the auxiliary gunboat Gloucester. These vessels and the transports conveyed 4,000 troops, artillery, horses, mules, etc.

At the council of war held on board the Gloucester, it was decided to land at Guanica, which is a small town, and to proceed to the west coast of Porto Rico, after a skirmish with a detachment of Spanish troops and a crew of thirty from the launch of the United States auxiliary gunboat Gloucester.
